CONFERENCE INFORMATION & UPDATES

- Registration you will receive your Registration Kit, including name tags and relevant meal tickets

- Late Registrations Anyone who is attending the Conference and has not forwarded their fees, please forward as soon as possible and/or notify CQSS of your intention to attend as we need to

allocate accommodation and the caters require numbers by the end of November.


- *Papers/Workshops* We still require more submissions. When submitting, please notify the time required for presentation and enclose a disk version or e-mail.

 Art from June Lucas. These prints will be available for auction at the Cave Man's Dinner. The art comes from Canada, UK, Jenolan and Slovakia.



VENUE:- Yeppoon Recreational Camp, Capricorn Coast, Central Queensland






Yeppoon Recreational Camp is situated at 170



<u>Matthew</u> <u>Flinders</u> <u>Drive</u> at Yeppoon on the Capricorn Coast 40 km north-east of

Rockhampton. The camp has been refurbished and is set in a tropical garden setting with a licensed bar. The camp is near some of the most picturesque and safe swimming beaches in Australia. The waters are warm and the tropical climate is similar to that of Hawaii. Lammermoor beach is just 200 meters away (there are 6 surf skis for use) and there is an Olympic Swimming Pool 50 meters from the camp. Aside from these there are excellent facilities at the camp including a flood-lit outdoor hardcourt area for tennis, netball, volleyball and basketball with a grassed area for sports and games. There is also a BBQ area and table tennis.





Outside Activities

If you hire a bus in Yeppoon or Rockhampton you could consider these: (Brochures will be provided in the registration pack)

• play golf - at either Yeppoon (18 holes), the Capricorn International (2 x 18 hole courses) or

Emu Park (12 holes)

- see the Singing Ship at Emu Park, 10 km away it commemorates Captain Cook's voyage up the coast in 1770
- go reef fishing charters available
- visit Causeway Lake 12 kms from Yeppoon. Great for picnics and barbecues and you can hire windsurfers, canoes, catamarans, paddle boats and aqua bikes
- play squash, racquet ball or volleyball at the Capricorn Coast Squash Camp
- visit Byfield State Forest 45 km from Yeppoon and walk, swim, picnic or BBQ or Cooberrie park 17 kms north of Yeppoon and go bushwalking, have a swim or BBQ
- go diving from Keppel Island or the southernmost reef island, even if you're a beginner
- see hundreds of freshwater and saltwater crocs at the Koorana Crocodile Farm (30 km) from Yeppoon.

Whatever you choose to do, we can guarantee a couple of things..... you'll be well looked after and you'll have a great time.

Outside Accommodation:

If outside camp accommodation is required, we can send a list of Motels, Caravan Parks and contact numbers so that you can arrange your own accommodation. Remember that the Capricorn Coast is a seaside resort and Christmas holiday booking are essential, so book early - like, **NOW**.

Meals:

For catering purposes, we need to know <u>as soon as possible</u> how many people will be staying at the Recreational Camp and how many may require meals at the Conference. For those who are unable to make a decision due to work purposes, please notify us of possible intention.



CAVING INFORMATION

Let's go Trogging on Mt Etna, Limestone Ridge to Johansens Caves, Valkaries, Fanning River, Broken River, Chillagoe and other beautiful caves. Don't forget to bring your caving equipment. No carbide lamps are permitted. Caves are fragile environments and have to be treated with care and respect. The weather will be hot and humid so be prepared to sweat it out! ID Cards will be required for Gated Caving Trips and only full members will be able to enter gated caves. There will be vertical and horizontal caving. ASF Insurance is a must for those wishing to go caving. Only accredited Trip Leaders will be able to lead caving trips.

PRE/POST CONFERENCE CAVING

Mt Etna Caves National Park

The National Park is situated 22 kilometres north of Rockhampton at The Caves township and adjacent to the Bruce Highway. It has two distinct areas - Mt Etna and Limestone Ridge. Mt Etna is a conical peak rising some 300 metres above the surrounding plain with the limestone exposed on its northern side. The tower karst limestone is one of early Devonian Age and contains some 30 caves. Once upon a time, there were a few more, about 10, but a certain cement company turned them into bags of cement powder. Most of the caves are tending vertical with rope work required in some sections. The average passage length varies from 100 to 400 metres.

The major attraction on Mt Etna is Bat Cleft cave. This is the major maternity site for the Little Bent Wing Bat Miniopterus Australis), between the months of November through to mid-February. Approximately 100,000 female bats use Bat Cleft as a maternity cave to rear their young and each evening around dusk, the bats emerge from the cave to forage. Towards the end of the season, the last two weeks in January, the young are flying and join with their mothers in the emergence flight. This is a very spectacular sight, with 200,000 bats emerging from this narrow cleft. Trips to view this emergence are controlled by the Department of Environment and bookings are essential. The Conference committee will be making arrangements with the Department of Environment for a number of viewing sessions, so please book early.

Limestone Ridge is a U shaped ridge approximately 1 kilometre long and rises some 200 metres above the surrounding plain. Unlike Mt Etna, the Ridge is not tower karst, but tend to be of a flatter nature. However, it does have some heavily griked areas with the limestone tending towards tower karst. It contains some 30 caves, varying in length, from 10 metres to 3 kilometres. A number of these caves are gated for reasons of safety and conservation due to the delicate nature of speleothems. Access is restricted to ASF members with a CQSS Trip Leader. There will be trips arranged into these caves, for post conference caving. The climate in Rockhampton at this time of the year will be hot and humid. So come prepared with adequate water bottles. You will also need a sturdy pair of overalls, as the limestone is very sharp.

PLEASE TAKE NOTE - THERE IS NO CARBIDE LIGHTS PERMITTED ON QUEENSLAND NATIONAL PARKS.

Broken River

This is the next caving area north from Rockhampton. Broken River is a 4 1/2 hour drive west of Townsville, 12 hours from Rockhampton. It is a ridge of limestone approximately 7 kilometres long and has received very little exploration. John Kersey, a CQSS foundation member, along with his family are currently residing in Townsville and has been exploring the Broken River area. He is willing to arrange an expedition to the area in the 2 weeks following the Conference. Access is by conventional vehicle and you will have to be fully self-sufficient, as the area is remote. There is an established camp site beside a permanent water hole (water is unsuitable for drinking). This trip is by arrangement. Please indicate on your Registration Form, if you are interested.

Chillagoe

Chillagoe is located approximately 150 kilometres west of Cairns, about 2 1/2 hours drive. Cairns is a 12 hour drive north of Rockhampton. The Chillagoe tower karst covers many square kilometres and has over 500 tagged caves. The Chillagoe Caving Club have a Clubhouse in the township with camping available. Facilities include: kitchen, toilet, shower, dining area with tables and chairs and a barbecue. Some equipment hire is also available. There is a charge for camping at the Clubhouse. Arrangements can be made with your Registration or at the Conference.

Mitchell-Palmer

Due to the climate and weather conditions at this time of year, there will be no trips to this area.
