Histoplasmosis.

Ron Anderson, I Bay Parade, Malabar, N.S.W., is anxious to collect data on recorded cases of histoplasmosis resulting from cave entry. Australian speleologists are particularly asked to watch for occurrences of this - a respiratory illness, resulting from being in caves where spores of certain fungi have developed and are inhaled along with cave dust. Any possible case of this occurring up to a fortnight after visiting a cave should be referred to a competent medical authority for diagnosis. Any medical record of sub infection among guanc whose would also be of great interest.

Survey instruments and techniques.
