Past Minutes: Minutes for August and October were mailed to members in the last week or so. As yet there are no Minutes for September's meeting - both Evalt and Robyn took notes and will collaborate produce September Minutes.

Correspondence: Bank Statement from Westpac; Circular from VSA re the Down to Earth Speleo Convention to be staged at Buchan on 6-8 March 1999 - see the attached flier. There was no corro out.

Treasurer's Report:

James advised as follows -

Nightly takings (October) \$8-00 Expenditure:

Fees to ACKMA (\$40-00)

Balance: \$337-60

It was noted that James is not yet a signatory to the club's bank account. This is with the Royal Exchange branch of Westpac in the City. Chris is to ascertain from them who the current signatories are (he is one himself) and we'll update the signatories. Our practice has been to have about five signatories with any two to sign cheques.

Later in the meeting Jim asked what

the situation was with the clubs books. Grace advised that it is only necessary for a group such as ours with limited funds to keep a Receipts and Expenditures Book. Books for Profit and Loss or for Assets aren't warranted. Jim offered to computerise our accounts if we choose. It was also emphasised that a receipt must be issued for all income and all expenditure should be paid by cheque.

Also later in the meeting, Grace Matts joined as a Member. She has been an ASF Individual Member for several years and is a longstanding member of SSS and Cave Rescue as well.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Trash and Treasure - Saturday 14th November

Joe reported that preparations are on track. We have confirmed sponsorship from SRT, Eastwood Camping, Wild Stuff, Julie Bauer Books and Choice Books. Catering is arranged. SUSS have booked some stalls. As for the other stalls... well, we all know how slack cavers can be. leaving things to the last minute.

Wombeyan Draft Plan Management

It was agreed that we should make a club submission to this Draft Plan -Evalt, Chris and Grace will discuss this further. Of major concern is the absence of any mention of Cave Rescue and a heavy emphasis on accommodating commercial adventure caving. This is linked to the availability of facilities such as the kitchen and dormers at Wombeyan, which aren't available at Jenolan, making Wombeyan more attractive to commercial tour operators. There is also little or no mention of speleo and recreational use of caves.

ASF Yeppoon Meeting - January 1999

Evalt asked if anyone had concerns

with the proposed changes to the ASF Diving, Cave Safety and Minimal Impact Caving Codes. There was some discussion of the Bolt Laddering debate – there has been a lot of discussion on the Ozcavers eMail list. Garry Smith's proposals to change the part of the Safety Code dealing with CO₂ was said to be mostly about wording.

SSS Annual Dinner

Evalt, Joan and Chris all went to Sydney Speleo Society's Annual Dinner. Guest Speaker was Elery Hamilton-Smith, a former ASF and ACKMA President and one of the founding fathers of both organisations. He gave a showing of old glass *Lantem Slides* of Jenolan and some of the early visitors and Guides, most dating to the later years of last century and the early years of this one.

NHT Grant for Karst Vegetation in the Macquarie Catchment

Chris gave a summary of this project which was mentioned in last month's Minutes. The NSW Speleo Council is to manage the \$27,330 grant and will be calling on clubs and members to be involved in field work to map the extent of karst and karst related vegetation in this region. It's an excellent opportunity to promote inter-club trips and improve our documentation of many small and some not so small caving areas in the Orange–Wellington–Mudgee triangle.

HCG's Web Site

ASF Conference

22nd Biennial Conference Australian Speleological Federation 1999

Taking Caving into the next Century with Fun, Unity and Fellowship

The 22nd Biennial Conference of the Australian Speleological Federation was held as the last Conference of this Century at the Capricorn Coast, Yeppoon Queensland from January 1999. The Theme of the Conference was highlighted in a relaxed mode covering a variety of topics. This was a national conference with participation from all over Australia. We emphasised Karst Management as well as Cave Management because they are very much interrelated. Although this seemed the primary theme of the conference, we did not limit papers to this topic and in fact strongly encouraged papers on other cave and karst related topics. was held at the Conference Yeppoon Recreational Camp with field trips to Mt Etna, Bat Cleft and Johansen's Caves. Pre- and Post-Conference trips were planned for Limestone Ridge, Mt Etna. Broken River and Chillagoe. Due the weather, the Broken River trip was cancelled.

One on the main attractions at the Conference was the Speleo-Art. Speleo-Art is an informal group of artists (based in the UK) with a particular interest in Caves and Speleology. They exhibit at caving conventions, organise exhibitions, workshops and so on. There were 41 pieces of art on display and a sculpture. Many pieces were sold on behalf of painters whose art came from places such as Canada, UK, Australia and Slovakia.

Another interesting segment of the Conference was the paper presented by Kim Henley, Principal Blasting Specialist - Quarries and Construction Orica Explosives and Chris White, Company Manager of Pacific Lime Pty Ltd on the Restoration Blasting near Limestone Caves at Mt Etna and Limestone Mine.

This was followed by a site inspection on Mt Etna to which all visitors attended gaining further insight into the processes for the Mt Etna Rehabilitation Strategy.

The Conference closed on an enjoyable note with a Seafood Buffet the Cave Man's Dinner. Presentation of Awards bought lumps to many throats and some tears (of too. There were two happiness) nominations for the Edie Smith Awards - Henry 'Cusec' Shannon and Norman Poulter. Certificates of Merit went to David Martin, Kier Vaughn-Taylor and John Toop of Department of Environment.

Overall, even though the attendance was not quite what we expected, and the weather was unpredictable, we have been assured that everyone enjoyed the week's activities and enjoyed the fun, unity fellowship. Positive feedback has made all the effort, stress and family strains over the past 12 months, worthwhile. One thing for sure is in 2001, at the Bathurst Conference, we are all going to relax and enjoy the Conference.



A Trashy Report!

It was a day just as any other, but in this case it was the day before the first outdoor 'Trash 'n Treasure' day. The forecast was not good with rain developing overnight and showers predicted for the big day. Driving home through the inner city traffic from Marrickville to Dural (1 .5hrs) I wondered how the day would be considering that only one club had booked a stall for the day. Frantic phone calls during the day from Highland organisers would ask 'how many bookings have we got' and I would reply only 'SUSS'.

Although, through the grape vine I had heard that many were coming to buy, only a few would sell!



Continuing the drive I looked south and could see the ominous looking wolf packs drawing closer and closer to Sydney. Just afier a crack of thunder, the radio blurted out reports of hail the size of golf balls with torrential rain coming across from Campbelltown, Liverpool and heading towards Bankstown. The omen of one stall holder, and hail the size of golf balls indicated that the gods were surely not pleased. I went to bed that night thinking they were right.

Early Saturday morning I awoke to the raucous sound of a visiting Channel Billed Cuckoo sitting on a tree outside my bedroom window. If you haven't heard one, they sound something like a semi-trailer at ten paces. Looking out the window I knew that the weather forecasters has got it wrong again, sunshine and it was already stinking hot at 6am! Beaut, it's going to be a great day! In time I connected the Cave Rescue trailer to the van and headed off towards Bankstown.

On arrival at the Cave Rescue HQ, I noticed a 4WD parked opposite but didn't see anyone so I ignored it. I

started preparing the Cave Rescue Headquarters and getting it ready for the day. Half an hour later Brian raced in and said 'why didn't you wake me, I've been sleeping in my 4WD for the last hour!' By 9am, we had our first customers but the show wasn't to start until lOam. From then on people would dribble in. I didn't recognise any of the faces from the speleo

community so I asked where they were from and where did they hear about it.. Many belonged to bushwalking clubs in the local area with a few from the central coast. It was reassuring to see that of the 80 notices that went out to speleo, bushwalking, outdoor groups and retail stores in and around Sydney that the notices were actually read.

Not long afier this, we had our first enquiry about wanting a stall. It was Andy and Cath all the way from Tallong near Marulan. Robyn had set up a registration point inside the HQ and booked in our first stall holder. Andy and Cath had heaps of caving and canyoning gear as Andy had an outdoor adventure tour business in Tasmania and decided to come to NSW bringing all their excess gear with them.

Soon afier SUSS arrived, then another stall holder and another. By 10:30am we had six stall holders with heaps of gear. A desk was put aside for Julie and Peter Bauer who set up a book stall selling their newly released 'Under Bungonia' book along side many other titles from JB Publications. They were even kind enough to donate a copy of the new Bungonia book for the 'big' raffie.





NHT PROJECT

You have heard, perhaps vaguely, of this proposed project, which is formally titled: *Macquarie Karst Vegetation Rehabilitation Project*.

Staying with the formal tone, the Aims are:

Raise awareness of the uniqueness of karst and karst adapted vegetation for groundwater sustainability. Quantify and prioritise karst areas in the region in respect of remnant vegetation in agricultural landscapes. Demonstrate strategies to rehabilitate karst related vegetation communities/habitat for long-term sustainability.

Prepare a Regional Karst Management Strategy.

Proposed Actions are:

Field investigation to identify karst preliminaru areas. conduct vegetation inventory and identify degrading the karst factors ecosystem in each area. Update the ASF national Karst Index Database. Prioritise areas by significance needs and practicality for rehabilitation. By use of a Demonstration Site highlight the importance of conserving, rehabprotecting ilitating and ecosustems.

The defined area is the upper section of the Macquarie River catchment, but the Mudgee region is now included - the Cudgegong River is a tributary of the Macquarie. (Don't ask why small bits of the Cox's and Talbragar catchments are included!)

The Project Co-ordinator is Peter Dykes, responsible to the NSW Speleological Council. Bruce Howlett (OSS) is the co-ordinator for the western portion, extending from Limekilns to Geurie. This includes Molong, Wellington, Baker's Swamp, etc. I am the co-ordinator for the eastern portion from Portland to Dunedoo, which includes such places as Coco Creek, Ilford, Cudgegong, Mudgee and many others.

These are boundaries of responsibility only. Any member of any participating club is welcome an any trip to any area!

While the project extends to some regeneration of remnant bushland, evaluation of effects and, in the

future, community workshopping, the main thrust as far as we are concerned is full documentation of all karst and its features within the region, using the documentation processes of the Australian Karst Index, with (new) inclusion of karst vegetation and possibly GPS positioning. And, of course, tagging (boring!) of all karst features.

The western portion has been reasonably well explored and a number of cave areas, and caves, are known.

Using Lishmund's *The Limestone Deposits of New South Wales*, possibly only a third of the limestone deposits in the eastern portion have been investigated - many of these contain known caves, Local contacts indicate there may be more, unlisted deposits and there are indications of caves known only to the local people.

The methodical approach of this project could lead to someone, at some time, discovering a new cave!

While it is not part of the NHT Project, it makes sense to extend the investigation of the eastern portion to include cave mapping, photography and possibly photo-tagging, and research into the history of discovery and use of the caves. There are postulated aquifers, and relationships between quarrying and cement manufacture/shale oil processing/gold-mining and use of limestone for roadbase.

Wow! This has all the indications of an exciting project!

For anyone who may be interested in Bruce Howlett's trip programme, it is:

Bruce has suggested that I might like to run my trips two weeks after his but this is not always possible - see later discussion.

I would appreciate hearing of any HCG members participating in his trips so that I can negotiate opportunity to participate in ours.

Just to confuse everyone except, say, Phil, my trip planning will be based on seamless integration of speleological investigation, picturesque camping locations and passive recreation opportunities. That is, most trips will suit families.

Angus McCoun (RSS) has indicated that some RSS members may assist with surveying. Apple Tree Flat is the logical site. (Or perhaps Coco Creek). We do not have the RSS programme nor do we have contacts for access permission for either site at this time. This trip may be substituted for another when details are available.

Forthcoming proposed trips.

13/14 March 1999. PORTLAND. This will be explorar tory, locating 10 listed limestone deposits and looking at access and whether they are viable. There may be an eleventh. They are scattered over a reasonable area and most likely include quarrying sites.

Propsed camping sites are Wallace Lake or Lake Lyell (good canoeing and yabbying). Toilets.

27/28 March or 10/11 April 1999. COCO CREEK (2 sites) and BLUE ROCKS + possibly GLEN ALICE. 2 known caves, rumours of more. Proposed camping at historic remains of Glen Davis. Toilets. Campfires.

8/9 May KANDOS-RYLESTONE. There are also other deposits nearby. Area has extensive quarrying. Access may be denied.

Proposed camping Dunn's Swamp (actually a beautiful clear pondage). Relaxed canoeing, wilderness walking, (Wollemi National Park). Toilets, Campfires.


- Cleaning in Restoration Cave Y50
