Trip Leader J.Seabrook

We left early on Saturday morning and headed for Jenolan Caves. Not having a permit we were limited to surface work. We were going to try out a new way of locating cave entrances and recording their position.

In essence this new system consists of a base where we can see the area that is to be searched this base is equiped with a base radio (27 megahertz) and two pair of binoculars (10x50). Two people man this station, one operates the radio and the other books the results obtained. Both of these people have binoculars to follow the searches and to spot possible holes. The searchers are also equiped with fadios and can report back any discoveries they make - these discoveries are then recorded at base (discription of entrances, location and the position on a sketch of the bluff). Through these radios the searchers may also recieve directions from base (where to go next, areas to search, holes that car be seen from the base near the searchers, if the cave is already known setc).

On Saturday morning we set up a base station on the saddle above the coach house and parties worked both sides of the george up stream from Wallaby cave and downstream from Rho-hole bluff. Saturday afternoon was spent on the Rho-hole bluff region with the base on the other side of thecreek.

Sunday was spent was spent on consolidating the data obtained on saturday. Roger and myself wandered down into the tourist area to investigate the range and cave penatration of the 27 meg radios with their use in S&R in mind. The rest of the group was looking closer at the caves that we discovered on Saturday. Acting on information gained from Ron NewbouldI went up to have a look at a pothole near the lookout. I droped 460° of rope down it and abseiled down. The cave consisted of of a few shafts leading to a 50' drop. At the bottom I ran out of rope and had to come back although the cave still went down. There were some side passages which seemed to go. There is some formation in this cave and the presents of unstable sections of this cave suggest that it has not been entered often, it is possibly Twin Shafts Cave.

In all this was a very successful trip, we relocated and/or discovered about 30 holes at least 12 had holes behind them (this does not include the better known caves in the area) The idea of using radios in surface exploration was an unqualified success, and we now know how 27 meg radios will behave in a S&R situation. Roger Lyle & Mike Richter will be presenting a paper on the use of radios for caving.

We completed a surface traverse from near clown cave to the east and west legs of the valley including both influxes. This was accomplished in one day with 'heuy' flat on our heels. We had just made it back to camp when it started to rain.

To our surprise, 50 odd National Trust tourists came through the Blue Water Heles region, much to the consternation of the ranger and some 27 cars had a 115010 trouble in the wet weather getting up Pepper Corn hill.

The rest of the weekend was spent fishing. Some nine trout were bagged.

It was generally dry at Cocleman with fine weather except for Monday and Tuesday when it began to wain.

About 4 hours was sport in River, Cooleman main, Murray and Barbers Caves, an hour in Frustration Cave and 12 hours in New Year Cave.

Fluorescene was placed in Frustration, New Year and Z Caves where the efflux was thought to be. The bags were taken out after 3 days and the results indicate positive results on New Year and Z Caves with a dubious result from from Frustration Cave probably due to contaminated charcoal.

A survey was begun in New Year Cave using two shifts and producing some 800 ft of surveyed cave. Most of this cave appears to be of river passage of vandose origin, little if any side passages, gibber floor and lots of water. The level of water in New Year Cave was down a lot allowing survey work.

It was a pleasent weekend with fine weather although it was cold and frosty in the mornings.

The caves entered were Frustration, New Year, Z and Bow (east and west) Caves.

Further fluorescene tests were carried out on the east influx and fluorescene was placed in Frustration Cave in order to comfirm the results from Easter.

After 8 hours the fluorescene put in Frusration Cave appeared in New Year and Z Caves. The fluorescene put in at the East Influx had not yet come through in Frustration Cave.

On discussion with R.Gurtis of CSS that evening around the fire it was found that this connection had already been found in Dec or Jan 1971/72. Subsequent testing of the charcoal should traces of fluoresene hence confirming the SSS results. It was also noticed that the creek beds were very dry and that only the East Influx was running, similar to Easter 1972.

S.U.S.S. AT LARGE.

From a Toreign Correspondent on the Remote and Inaccessible Places Committee.

Perth - capitol city of the Republic of Western Australia is vastly different when compared to the capitol of smog - Sydney. Most people who live in the Commonwealth of Eastern Australia believe that their country terminates at Port Augusta (S.A.). On the other side, most Westralions are firmly convinced that Australia finishes at the end of the bitumen road seven miles east of Eucha. The small patch of real estate inbetween called the Nullabor must be considered as Mio Man's Land.

This country, jointly owned by Japan and the United States has a plesent climate - especially so in winter. The nearly extinct natives complain bitterly about the cold while the more recent migrants (mainly from N.S.W. and Victoria) are lost for adjectives to describe the mildness of the weather and the noticeable absonce of clouds in the sky. An amusing comedy show on TV and radio is the periodic weather reports in which the newscasters refer to 20 point falls of rain over a 29 hour peroid as heavey rain. This correspondent, although still fresh from the snows of Tasmania and gales of South Australia has so far surveyed Perth's weather in shorts and T-shirts.

The economy of this country seems to be dependent on the blast furnaces of Japan. The recent Japenese dock strike cut deeply into the local mining community. The recent closedown of the small GMH assembly plant resulted in the local government leader being willing to fly to the ends of the earth (at public expense) in order to keep his precious constituents employed making money for the foreign bosses.

The majority of inhabitants of this country live in double brick houses built on giant sand boxes, hence the term sand gropers when referring to these strange people.

By N.S.W. standards the caves of W.A. with the exception of the Nullabor are quite small. The formation in caves south of Perth is quite good. Jewel Cave at Augusta would be about the prettiest tourist cave in Continental Australia. It must also be remembered that Strong's Cave at Margaret River, also south of Perth contains Ausralia's only world record holder in the form of a 20'6" long straw.

The vast and once remote area of the Nullabor has come under scrutiny of the men from BHP recently to see if the enormous quantities of limestone in the region is suitable for feeding the hungry mouths of the Whyalla blast furnaces. Could there be a 'Save the Nullabor campaign' in years to come ?
