TRIP REPORTS Selections from Jenolan NIBICON log book

"Scaling Emasculation Aven, Wiburds Lake Cave" (1/1/73)

Party: Jim Seabrook, Thea McIntosh, Peter Radcliffe, Wendy Mackenzie, "Spike" Milligan, Col Mathers, Start & Allan Newbould

We erected the guides' scaling pole in "Emasculation Aven" to a height of 40 feet. Discovered a high level passage opening into the aven connecting the North West Passage to the chamber at the start of the Western Passage. A southetn passage drops off to the eouth for perhaps 60ft and was very muddy. A chimney leads off from this passage. Neither was pushed today. A southern side passage sloping upwards at approximately 40 was pushed and found to be blocked. The North West Passage was entered from this new section by an 80ft ladder. Excellent decoration was found as well as plenty of mud.

"Mammoth Cave - Geomorphological Inspection" (1/1/73)

Party: J.R.Dunkley, J.N.Jennings, D.C.Lowry, H.Shannon, ARogers

We looked at Conglomerate Cavern, Cold Hole, Horseshoe Cavern, Railway Tunnel and the main route to Southern Section and Lower River. Debate centered about the origin and significance of the gravel deposits in this part of Mammoth Cave, especially those in Conglomerate Cavern. Scalloping was closely examined in the passage to the Cold Hole. There are current markings in both directions and even upwards. It seems likely that a stream sink at the site of the present entrance poured water and gravel north through the Cold Hole into the Railway Tunnel and possibly as far north as the Skull and Crossbones or even further. The scalloping definitely needs to be studies more closely to confirm or deny the direction of water movement (Albert Goede pointed out the same thing during his inspection in August last year). More heated debate then ensued on the origin of the flat roofs in Cold Hole and Railway Tunnel, on a possible roof channel 150ft above the Horeeshoe Cavern and its relationship to the entrance roof channel, and many other things. Henry Shannon was really in his element! We also went down to Lower River without much addition to knowledge. Henry estimated the flow at 5-6 cusecs. Some sand seemed to have been recently moved from the vicinity of the river. Returning to the Entrance Cavern we had no trouble getting Joe Jennings back up the pitch, he went up with barely a pause despite his advancing years (now 57 I think)/

Serpentine Survey 1/1/73

Party: Phil Toomer, Bruce Denney, Peter Downes, Jean Vick

Surveyed from the entrance tag on lower entrance of Serpantine Cave (J72) along the main "Serpentine Passage", past the first squeeze to the second squeeze. Permanent stations were put in through the entire traverse. The survey was done using tripod mounted forestry compass and fibreglass tape.

The long mudslide between the first and second squeezes was pushed to its end. It finishes with dead pink flowstone formation, extensive dry pool deposits of the dogtooth type, at the top of the mud slide.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following amendment to the Consitution was moved at the last general meeting following discussion on p. 71 of the last Bulletin. It will be debated at the next meeting:

In Clause 4(a), reword the first sentence to read:

"Government of the Society shall be vested in the Committee which shall consist of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, Safety Officer, Librarian/Records Officer and two Committee Members".

This differs from the existing clause only in the addition to the Committee of two additional Committee Members.
