RECENT TRIPS

Bungonia Freshers Trip: The Grill, The Fossil and the Drum Caves were visited, fairly heavy concentrations of foul air being found. A number of holes located on the shoulder of the Drum were investigated.

Jenolan Freshers Trip: One of the most productive Freshers' trips ever. A party of 6 under Ian Williams visited Central Level of the Mammoth and discovered a new extension past the "siphon" (dry) leading to the 2nd river passa ge. The extension is estimated at 400 ft in length but has not been fully explored. Good formation, both white and coloured, including excellent dog-tooth spar, is reported.

The Secretary is relieved to report that it is no longer necessary to go out of the Ian Carpenter cave via the squeeze, as the cave connects with the main section of the Rho Hole. A party under the leadership of Adrian Hunt fully explored this cave. Holes leading off the Mulberry Tunnel of the Rho Hole are to be investigated further. Henry Shannon reports that the wet passage of Ian Carpenter's does not go.

No SUSS record has been found of a cave north of the Serpentine which was also entered last weekend. The inscription "Hennings 1888" occurs on one wall. Any information from other Societies would be appreciated.
