SPACE-FI LARS

J.C.Coleman; The Caves of Ireland, Anvil, Tralee, Republic of Ireland, 1965 (courtesy Irish Tourist Board, Sydney)

This, the author believes, is the first book to be devoted entirely to Irish Javes. He has endeavoured to summarise briefly all the available information regarding caves and associated phenomena in Ireland, the scope apparently being similar to the proposed A.f Handbook onAustralian Caves. The caves of Ireland are surveyed overall as well as individually and it is interesting to note that none are Tourist Caves. Extensive archaeological excavation has uncovered remains of mammoth, reindeer, arctic, fox, bear etc. as well as man and various artifacts but Palaeolithic Man has not yet been proved or disproved. The bibliography is very extensive and apparently exhaustic

Missouri Speleology, Vol. VI, no. 3, July 1964

This issue isdevoted to Cherokee Cave, part of which is to be demolished to make way for an extension of Interstate Highway 55. The cave, situated under a building at 3400 South Broadway, South St Louis, Missouri ("10 minutes from the heart of downtown St Louis) has had a fascinating history. It served as the natural storehouse for myriad pleistecene bones, has been the laggring house for 2 different breweries and was a commercial cave from 1950 until purchased by the Highways Department in 1961. A similar cave in Sydney would be located on Broadway, near the University perhaps!!
