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## CONSTITUTION.

### 1. NAME.

The Society shall be called the Sydney University Speleological Society.

### 2. OBJECTS.

The aims of the Society shall be :

- a. To unite those Graduates, Undergraduates and Members of the Staff of Sydney University, and all other people, who are interested in the exploration and mapping of Australian cave systems.
- b. To foster Speleology as a Science and as a Sport.
- c. To develop interest in, and to encourage the preservation of Australia's natural subterranean regions, and have suitable areas declared Natural Reserves.
- d. To co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance of these aims.

### 3. MEMBERSHIP.

- a. Those eligible for Membership of the Society shall be : -
  - i. All Graduates, Undergraduates, and Members of the Staff of Sydney University, who subscribe to clause 2 above.
  - ii. Graduates of other Universities who subscribe to clause 2 above.
  - iii. Such other persons who subscribe to clause 2 above.
- b. Before admission to any grade of Membership, a candidate must have completed at least thirty hours caving in non-tourist caves on at least two Official Trips to the satisfaction of the Society, and be approved by the Committee.
- c.
  - i. Full Membership may be open to those satisfying clauses 3.a.i. , 3.a.ii. and 3.b. above.
  - ii. Associate Membership may be open to those satisfying clauses 3.a.iii. and 3.b. above, subject to the proviso that the number of Associate Members shall not at any time exceed 50 % of the total Membership.
  - iii. Persons whom the Society wishes to honour are eligible for election to Honorary Life Membership. The Committee will receive nominations for Honorary Life Membership from not less than five Members. On acceptance by the Committee, the nomination will be submitted to a General Meeting. The election of the nominee shall require the approval of 90 % of Members present and voting.
- d. Except as provided in paragraph 4.a., Associate and Honorary Life Members shall have the same rights as Full Members.

### 4. COMMITTEE.

- a. Government of the Society shall be vested in the Committee which shall consist of President, Vice-President, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Assistant Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, one General Committee Member, all of whom shall be Members subscribing to clause 3.c.i. above, and one Associate Committee Member who shall subscribe to clause 3.c.ii. above.
- b. The Committee shall hold office from the A.G.M. at which its election is announced until the A.G.M. of the following year, or until its successors be appointed.
- c. Any Committee Member absent from three Committee Meetings per year shall be deemed to have resigned from the Committee.
- d. Vacancies in the Committee shall be filled by a by-election at a General Meeting. Such Members shall hold office until the A.G.M. following their election, or until their successors be appointed.
- e. The Committee shall have the power to appoint sub-committees, enact by-laws, and do such other lawful things as it may deem incidental or conducive to the attainments of the Objects of the Society.
- f. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum.

### 5. ELECTIONS

- a. The Committee for the ensuing year shall be elected at the A.G.M. of the Society.

5. b. Voting shall be by secret ballot if three Members present and voting at the A.G.M. so request.
6. MEETINGS
- a. The President shall have the power to convene and act as Chairman at Annual General Meetings, General Meetings, and Committee Meetings. In the President's absence, the Vice-President shall carry out the President's duties.
- b. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held in Lent Term each year.
- c. The Committee, or five financial Members by written request, may direct the President to convene a General Meeting.
- d. Only financial Members shall be eligible to vote at any General Meeting.
- e. A quorum at any General Meeting shall be one fifth of the number of financial Members.
- f. Notice of any General Meeting shall be given at least 14 days in advance. Such written notice shall be sent to each financial Member, displayed on the Society Notice Board, and where possible, published in *Honi Soit* and the Union Recorder.
- g. A two-thirds ( $2/3$ ) majority of Members present and voting at any General Meeting shall be required to reverse any Committee decision.
- h. No proxy voting shall be allowed at General or Committee Meetings.
7. DISCIPLINE
- A Member alleged to have breached the Rules of the Society or whose alleged conduct may reflect unfavourably on the Society, shall be called upon by the C Committee, at a Meeting convened specifically for the purpose, to show cause why he should not be recommended for expulsion or fining. The results of such a meeting shall be presented to a General Meeting, convened specifically for the purpose, within twenty-one days, whether the Member be recommended for expulsion or fining or not. The General Meeting so convened shall have the sole right to expel or fine Members.
8. FINANCE
- a. The Financial Year shall begin on the first day of March in any year and end on the last day of February in the succeeding year.
- b. Subscriptions for the current year shall be fixed at the A.G.M. for that year.
- c. Members who have not paid their subscriptions within twenty-one days from the date of the A.G.M. shall be deemed unfinancial and shall, at the Committee's discretion, be assumed to have relinquished all rights of membership.
- d. All monies received by the Society shall be paid into a Commonwealth Savings Bank Account. All disbursements over the sum of ten shillings (10/-) shall be paid by cheque.
- e. All cheques shall be signed by any two of the following: President, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer.
- f. Duly audited accounts for the previous Financial Year shall be presented to the A.G.M.
9. CONSTITUTION
- a. Notice of any alteration of the Constitution shall be submitted in writing to the Committee at least 28 days prior to the General Meeting.
- b. Members eligible to vote shall receive at least 14 days notice of proposed amendments.
- c. Alterations to the Constitution shall be made by a two-thirds majority of Members present and voting.
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## BY - LAWS

### A. MEMBERSHIP

#### A. 1. APPROVAL OF MEMBERS

If an application for membership of the Society is received, the application

- A.1. continued. 5.  
shall not be considered at a Committee Meeting unless at least one of the Trip Leaders of the applicant's two Official Trips is present at the Committee Meeting.
- A.2. Deleted 6.5.59.
- A.3. BADGES  
Badges shall be hired out to members on a deposit of 5/- and may be recalled at the discretion of the Committee. The 5/- shall be refunded not automatically but only at the discretion of the Committee.
- A.4. BADGES  
A badge issued to any Member must at all times remain in the possession of that Member. Failure to take reasonable care will result in disciplinary action.
- A.5. PUBLICATIONS  
Non-members of the Society may receive Publications of the Society on payment of a fee to be set by the Committee. (reworded 6.5.59)
- A.6. PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS  
Prospective Members may receive the Society's circulars and other information for a period of six months after payment of a fee of 2/6. If a Prospective Member becomes a Full or Associate Member within six months of paying the fee then 2/6 will be deducted from his appropriate membership fee. (amended 2.4.59)
- A.7. DISCIPLINE  
The Committee may at its discretion, suspend the membership of a person, alleged to either have breached the rules of the Society or refused to have obeyed the decisions of the Committee and/or General Meeting and whose alleged conduct reflects unfavourably on the society, until the question of expulsion or fining has been dealt with within a period of 50 days after the suspension (5.3.60)
- B. MEETINGS
- B.1. MEETING PROCEDURE  
The procedure followed at meeting shall be that laid down by Joske in the current edition of "Law and Procedure at Meetings". (amended 6.5.59)
- B.2. COMMITTEE MEETINGS  
The Secretary shall notify Committee Members in writings of the details of coming Committee Meetings at least one week in advance.
- B.3. Deleted 10.12.59.
- C. DUTIES
- C.1. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
A Financial Statement shall be submitted at each Committee Meeting by the Treasurer. This statement shall contain details of all financial transactions and accounts for payment transacted since the last Committee Meeting. (amended 6.5.59)
- C.2. TRIP LEADERS  
The Duties of a Trip Leader shall be:
- i. To give full details of proposed trip to the Publicity Officer at least 14 days in advance of the departure date.
  - ii. To submit a duly authorised request for permission to visit the area, if it is under direct government control, at least 10 days before the proposed departure date.
  - iii. To make sure that any non-member attending the trip signs the agreement to abide by the Society's Rules, on the form approved at the 77th C.M.
  - iv. To be thoroughly conversant with the fire-lighting and other regulations governing the area he is visiting and to see that the trip abides by these regulations.
  - v. To reprimand anyone on the trip breaking the Society's rules or local regulations or behaving in any way that could discredit the Society.

C.2. vi. To forward a trip report together with trip and equipment fees within 14 days of the completion of the trip. (5.3.60)

C.3. TRIP REPORTS

When trip reports are handed in, they will be entered in a book kept for the purpose and a number allotted to them. Any redundancy in the present numbering system is to be compensated for by using a.b.c. etc..

C.4. REPORT OF RECORDS OFFICER

At each General Meeting the Records Officer shall be called upon for a report.

C.5. deleted 5.3.60.

D. TRIPS

D.1. OFFICIAL TRIPS

a. An Official Trip shall be defined as one for which approval of at least two Members of the Committee has been gained. Only on Official Trips may Members use the Society's name to gain any privileges. If proposing to visit an area under direct government or private control this approval must be in writing. (amended 6.5.59, 5.3.60.)

b. A limit on the number attending an Official Trip shall only be imposed where either the nature of the area or the nature of the proposed work make such a limit essential.

c. Provided that such a limit on any trip has not been filled, any Member of the Society shall be entitled to join such a trip up to that limit.

d. While on an Official Trip any Member of the Society shall obey the reasonable requests of the trip leader

D.2. deleted 5.3.60.

D.3. TRIP FEES

a. Participants other than Financial or Prospective Members will be admitted to Official Trips on payment of 1/- per day. (amended 6.5.59)

D.4. GENERAL TRIPS

a. A General Trip shall be defined as a trip organised by the Committee with transport arranged for all Members who wish to attend.

b. In the event of anyone withdrawing from a General Trip at such a late stage that no replacement can be found, that person may, at the discretion of the Trip Leader, appointed by the Committee, be required to contribute towards the cost of the trip, the contribution not to exceed 7/- per person.

D.5. LIQUOR ON TRIPS

No liquor shall be taken on trips without prior permission of the Trip Leader. (rewritten 6.4.60)

E. EQUIPMENT

E.1. BORROWING OF EQUIPMENT

The Society's equipment may not be taken on any trip unless the permission of at least two Members of the Committee has been obtained.

E.2. EQUIPMENT HIRE

Subject to By-laws D1.b, & c, all persons will be admitted to trips on which Society equipment is taken on payment of 1/- per trip. (amended 6.5.59)

E.3. LOAN OF EQUIPMENT

Society equipment shall be loaned to Members of the Society on lodgement of a deposit of 10/-; money to be refunded if equipment is returned to store within seven days of the end of the trip; 1/- to be deducted from refund for every day the equipment is overdue.



E. B.4. RETURN OF PROPERTY

Should any Society property fail to be returned within a reasonable time, a Member requiring property, may, with the permission of the Committee, collect the property at the expense of the defaulter. In addition, the defaulter will be required to pay a fine not exceeding \$1.

E.5. THE IAN CARPENTER EQUIPMENT POOL

- a. An Equipment Pool entitled the Ian Carpenter Equipment Pool shall be established.
- b. The Equipment Pool shall make equipment available to intending members, or Members of SUSS, when a deposit, fixed at a Committee Meeting, has been received by the Equipment Officer.
- c. Borrowers shall return equipment to the Equipment Officer in the condition in which it was received, when the deposit shall be returned.
- d. The Pool shall be maintained by grants of Society funds made at a Committee Meeting.

F. CAVESF.1. BLASTING IN CAVES

Any blasting to be done underground by a Member of the Society will require the approval of the Committee at a Meeting, before it is carried out.

F.2. NAMING OF CAVES

Approval of the Committee shall be required before the name is given to a new cave.

G. SUSS PRODUCTIONS

- G.1. A business known as SUSS PRODUCTIONS (under the proprietorship of Warren Peck) shall wholesale photographs of caves and caving areas.

- G.2. The proprietor shall be responsible for the overall running of the business and especially for the organisation of photographic trips when necessary to maintain the quality of the photographs.

- G.3. The Society shall appoint a Manager to conduct the wholesaling of the slides.

(11.6.59)

- G.4. The Manager shall be answerable for the conduct of the wholesaling business to any meeting of the Society.

(11.6.59)

- G.5. The Manager shall present a financial statement to any Meeting of the Society on prior request.

(11.6.59)

- G.6. The Manager shall present an audited Profit and Loss Account and an Audited Balance Sheet at the first General Meeting following the seventh day of August of each year.

### Presidential Address.

The retiring committee, because of the absence of its members from the University, has failed to maintain the interest of the undergraduates. This committee consisted of a President working in Sydney, Vice President working in Wollongong, Secretary (for the first half of the year) working in Sydney, Associate Representative working in Sydney, and three undergraduates. This was proportional representation, and the Society elected the people it wanted, but the Society chose unwisely.

Evidence of this is the fact that last year's record enrolment of prospective members failed to become members, all but the keenest being put off by the unwelcoming atmosphere of the Botany Lawn meetings and the failure to provide suitable activities at the University. Further evidence is the business of the misconduct and interference by non-members during Orientation Week, which could have been avoided if members of the Society had had leadership at the right time by the appropriate committee members.

The Society depends on the recruiting of undergraduates to maintain its membership, and hence proportional representation of the different classes of member may not be best for the Society: representation should be weighted in favour of undergraduates and at least the President or Vice President and two others of the Executive should be undergraduates.

### Secretary's Report 1959-60.

From the point of view of the Secretariat, reflection on the activities of SUSS during the last year gives rise to some satisfaction, but the dissatisfaction which it must also provoke will probably be far more valuable in the future if we do not look at things in the manner of the proverbial ostrich.

#### GENERAL MEETINGS.

Six General Meetings were held this year, equalling last year's record. They were well attended, and, due to vigorous participation by groups representing all shades of opinion in the Society, most meetings did not finish business before 11 p.m., and there was consequently little opportunity for social activities other than supper. Social Activities: However the social needs of the Society were far more adequately catered for officially than in previous years. There were 2 barbecues during the year and 2 Christmas parties, not hampered, as previously, by a preceding General Meeting. In addition Dave Drummond was subjected to a grand farewell before his return to England. Unfortunately the Field Day was abandoned because of wet weather, but the participants enjoyed a gathering at the Hinwood establishment instead. It is hoped that Field Days will be held during 1960, and that they do not clash with Open Day in future.

The weekly lunchtime meetings were less enthusiastically attended but their value is apparent, and it is hoped that they will be given



support throughout the coming year. These meetings were initiated for the purpose of promoting discussions concerning caving rather than constitutions, votes of censure, finance, etc. For the same reason the Committee planned to sponsor special evening programmes. Only one of these was actually held, to discuss the recent Nullarbor expedition. The organization and success of this meeting was a credit to all concerned, and we hope that as such it will serve as a precedent for more activity along these lines.

The above is a fair indication of the work done for the Society by the Committee. The achievements of the Society throughout the year seem barely attributable to the Committee. Certain individual members carried out the work of the Society and it is obvious who they are.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

SUSS now has 68 full members, an increase of 9 on last year. This increase, however, appears larger than it is, since 11 members became or remained unfinancial, and 3 resigned. Prospectives number approximately 43. The category of Corresponding Member is proving its worth in maintaining contact with members who have left Sydney.

#### BADGES

Approximately 4 badges and a rude letter were the result of the Committee's campaign to redeem badges of ex-members. However a new set of badges is now on sale.

#### 11th ANNIVERSARY DINNER

The SUSS Dinner was held in July but unfortunately was poorly attended and resulted in financial loss. It is recommended that future dinners be better publicized.

#### PUBLICATIONS

Ten circulars were sent out, a yearbook was distributed to all members, and the Prospective Members' handbook edited by Warren Peck proved its worth to fresher members. Special handout leaflets were printed and distributed for Open Day and Orientation Week. Journal 5,2 had a rather stormy passage, and was eventually edited by Adrian Hunt. It appeared on the market in January 1960 and has been distributed to some 46 societies and correspondents in Australia and overseas. Copies of all SUSS journals are now available, 1,1, 1,3 and 3,1 having been reprinted to meet the demands of corresponding members.

#### LIBRARY

The library is shortly to be moved to the University. The cata-

logue has been brought up to date and new exchanges have been initiated by Yugoslavia, the Speleological and Prehistorical Society of Bordeaux and a Czech group.

#### A.S.F.

The A.S.F. Committee meeting was attended by three members. In addition SUSS has provided the treasurer and librarian since the last A.S.F. Conference.

#### TOURIST BUREAU

Relations with the Tourist Bureau have never been better. This is chiefly due to the work of Warren Peck, SUSS liason officer.

#### EQUIPMENT

The equipment pool is languishing, and has been kept going by the generosity of Ted Faunce, Jim Jackson, and those who have lent their equipment in emergencies. We strongly recommend that a minimum set of new equipment be bought as soon as possible, and all equipment brought into fully usable condition. A first aid kit should be added to the pool which could be maintained by proceeds from carbide sales. We should remember that this pool is also a memorial and see that it is a fitting one.

Up till recently ladders have been the subject of much wrangling but little constructive activity. Steps have now been taken by Jon Hinwood and Tom Landecker to produce new ladders. Society members are urgently required for ladder making work parties.

The sale of carbide to members at reduced cost has been highly successful. However for the convenience of all concerned it is recommended that 1 or 2 drums be stored up at the University in future. Storage is available.

#### CORRESPONDENCE

For a society of its size SUSS carries on a lot of correspondence and this increases every year. The whole of SUSS's correspondence is now consolidated into subject files. In addition a card index is kept of all correspondents and publications exchange partners. This has cut down the work of mailing publications considerably, and should make things much easier for the incoming Secretary.

#### CONCLUDING REMARKS

The office of Assistant Secretary had a trial run this year and proved of definite value in relieving the burden on the Secretary. The division of labour depends greatly on who is acting as Secretary and Assistant Secretary, but a definite division should be made at the beginning of the year and maintained. This will make the job much easier for both people. Provided that one of these officers is readily accessible and at the University, the other could be any member who is willing to keep the work up to date.

SUSS Productions Report

The following financial statement only deals with assets and liabilities and not with the trading account and the photography account. Some explanation of the large amounts of money expended in photographic and electrical gear is called for. Nothing was bought that was not essential to the success of the cave photography trips. Steps are being taken to hurry some retailers who owe money, but all businesses like ours must not expect to collect payment the day after delivery of the goods. Also we must carry stocks sufficient to meet orders reasonably promptly without waiting one month while slides are being manufactured and delivered.

The reason why no more than £20 has been paid over to SUSS is that the business has expanded to such a great extent that all profits so far have been absorbed by the business. We now have 59 different slides on sale and sales have passed the 10,000 mark. We have no need to buy any equipment or go on any photographic trips for two years, and all future profits will reach SUSS. On the basis of our sales over the last six months, approximately £700 will have been paid to SUSS by the next AGM.

Records Officer's Report

The last twelve months have seen a decline in our caving activities. Compared with former years the number of official trips has sharply decreased, the attendance generally has been less and the percentage of SUSS members actively caving is lower.

At Jenolan the squeeze at the end of the Ian Carpenter Cave was forced last October when the final obstruction was demolished. Access was gained to a series of decorated passages totalling 300 feet in length, which after three subsequent trips were connected with the Rho Hole. Only mapping remains to be done in this extension.

In Central Level of the Mammoth an extension 400 feet long about a mile from the entrance in the Northern River Section was discovered in March. The formation, particularly flowstones and pool crystals, is amazingly good for the Mammoth system.

At Bungonia, after a climb round the lip of the main shaft in the Drum, a second shaft approximately 150 feet deep was descended. Although parallel with the main shaft it is unconnected with it, and the two give access to different sections.

Cliefden was visited twice with considerable exploration being carried out in the Murder and Taplow Maze Caves. As with Jenolan, much remains to be done, and there are good possibilities of further discoveries.

Two trips to Bendithera have reminded members of the extreme roughness of the surrounding district, but no new information about the caves has resulted. No new work was reported from Yarrangobilly, Wombeyan, or Wee Jasper.

In the Mt. Fairy district south of Lake George two small parallel small parallel sets of limestone outcrops, each about a mile long, were examined. Extensive erosion and quarrying have severely limited the area that could contain caves, and the only known cave is a

small maze situated in the largest outcrop.

No field work on the foul air project was carried out. Some information on cave fauna at Wombeyan was published in the latest Suss journal, but bat banding is still in the discussion stage. Although hydrology and radio communication in caves have been former fields of investigation, nothing further has been done.

No formal meetings of the survey subcommittee were held, but surveying has been continued in the following areas:

Jenolan - Ian Carpenter Cave and Mammoth Cave.

Nullarbor - Weebubbie, Koonalda, N31, N32, N33 and various surface areas.

Cliefden - Taplow Maze.

The following suggestions are made for increasing SUSS's caving activities:

1. A planned trip programme.
2. Every trip to have some definite purpose.
3. Trip leaders to show some enthusiasm about their trips.
4. Members to be more co-operative in making society activities successful.

Lack of co-operation, more than anything else, has contributed to the low number of trips in the last twelve months.
