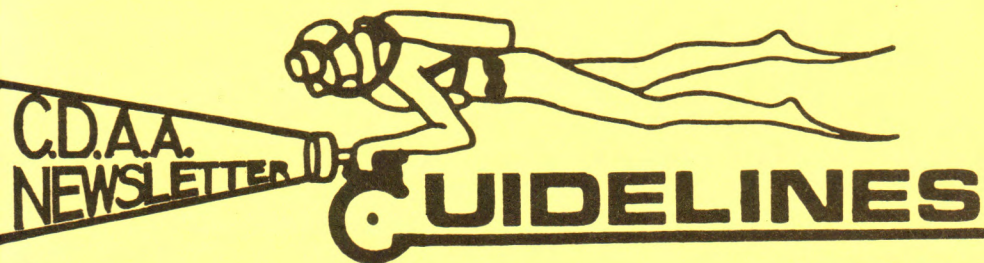

This 27th edition of Guidelines, the first for 1987, sees the C.D.A.A. approaching a critical time in its 13 year history.

In 1986 the South East Review Committee set a number of criteria upon which the continued existence of the C.D.A.A. as a self regulatory body, controlled by its own membership, depended. These criteria were the production of a new constitution, a set of regulations and an examiners manual. It is a considerable credit to those involved that the documents have been compiled, and are ready. Once ratified by the general membership, these documents will provide a single unifying set of rules and policies behind which all members can join forces. It is paramount for the survival of the C.D.A.A. that this occurs, as further faction fighting will only continue to reduce the credibility of our organisation in the eyes of the landowners, government employees, politicians and the general public alike.

Those members with time, energy and constructive ideas to contribute should come forward. Others, which most probably include the majority of the membership, who wish for less involvement and more cave diving, should provide the moral support necessary to encourage those who are putting a lot of time and effort into running the C.D.A.A. There is no room in the present scheme of things for the knockers, those that find it easier to destroy than to build.

Many members are currently concerned at the number of sink holes not available to cave divers at present. We ask you all to have patience, it is only by the continued liason between the landowners and the C.D.A.A. that these holes will reopen and to do this the credibility of the C.D.A.A. needs to remain high.

On that note the Editor of Guideline
wish all readers a Happy New Year
and lots of good cave diving for 1987.

CDAA NEWS

1 AGM

The date of the AGM has been changed to 12 September 1987. The 5 September 1987 date previously advised conflicts with 'OCEANS', so the Committee has altered the date to ensure maximal attendance, maybe even a quorum!

2 Independent Examining

The official CDAA policy resolved in conjunction with the Committee for Future Directions of Management of the Freshwater Sinkholes of the South Eastern Region (ie. the Review Committee) is that the Examiner testing members at Category 2 and Category 3 level will be independent of any Examiner who may have trained that member.

3 Cave Diver Training

As a service to members, training courses will be advertised in 'Guidelines' in the 'CDAA News' section. People, clubs or shops who are offering to train members or potential members are invited to send (in writing) dates and venues of such courses for publication to the Editor at PO Box 2161T Melbourne 3001.

The CDAA is not responsible for the content of any such courses advertised, but obviously to obtain categorization a diver will have to be tested by an independent Examiner.

4 Cave Diver Training Courses

Adelaide - none planned, but contact CDAA at PO Box and when there are sufficient members a course will be arranged.

Melbourne - In Depth Scuba Education - courses will run on 13 Mar 87 and 19 Jun 87. Telephone 328 3217 or 328 3218.

5 Committee Members

6 Hells Hole

It may be possible to arrange a Hells Hole trip on Sunday 3 May 87 for all you cave divers who are wondering where to dive. It's certainly worth the climb at least once.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Review Group Meeting - January 1987

The purpose of the January meeting was to submit the Association's new Constitution and Examiners Manual (Part 2 - the practical working part) before the landowners. David Bird, whose time and talent produced the new Constitution, attended the meeting to answer and advise on any changes the representatives may have required. Both documents were very well received and all present expressed their congratulations on the Association's responsible approach to the production of all our documents.

Part 2 of the Examiners Manual will be kept with Ron Jeffries, the Police Diving Squad representative who, after deliberation with our National Testing Officer, will give the Review Group his OK on the functional parts.

At this stage the CDAA Committee is preparing the final draft of the Constitution and the Regulations (which required ten or so changes, as discussed with members at previous meetings). These will be sent to all landowners with the Examiners Manual, for their approval. We expect to get their approval at the March Review Group meeting.

I have no doubt that once these documents are approved and accepted by the membership, the landowners represented by the Review Group will announce their support for the CDAA continuing on as the body responsible for controlling cave diving in the South East.

The Constitution, like the Regulations, will be sent to all members. The Examiners Manual will be sent to anybody, on request.

The General Meeting to adopt our new documentation will be on 2 May 87. If you do not attend in substantial numbers to achieve at least a quorum, then I can see that the landowners, after seeing all the work put in by the CDAA and themselves, finding out that the members just won't pull together, will seriously question why they should bother to grant access to anybody to any sinkhole fullstop.

*** Englebrechts and the Three Sisters Caves ***

Recent correspondence with Mt Gambier and Millicent Councils over access agreements (which were originally signed in 1983 and 1986), gave rise to great concern. It appears that when the agreements were signed both councils were under the impression that the CDAA had financial indemnity to protect them against being sued as a result of diver-related activities in their areas. The CDAA has never had such cover. In fact, it was felt that being incorporated and not having any financial indemnity cover would discourage any idea of a law suit.

As a sign of goodwill, and considering that the Englebrechts agreement is due for re-negotiation in November 1987, the Committee will be withholding the access keys until the matter is resolved to our mutual benefit. Whether the keys are or are not available in the near future, when you plan to dive, approach the Committee representatives as normal.

Barnoolut Station - Reg Watson

The situation revolving around Barnoolut Station is one with which no member is at ease. It was certainly not planned that this Committee would be seen to be responsible for the closure of Barnoolut. Unfortunately, we were unable to meet Reg's requirements in time, and this, combined with incidents which involved him that he believes the Association has not handled satisfactorily, has resulted in the situation we now have.

Reg had sent a letter to the CDAA requesting that independent examining be written into both the Constitution and the Examiners Manual, and required a confirmation of this by 6 Oct 86. It was clearly not possible to do this in the time scale set by Reg, since the Review Committee Meeting to finalize the independent examining issue was not due until 22 Nov 86.

Although the draft Constitution now has independent examining in it, until members have seen the new Constitution and voted to accept it, independent examining cannot be assumed as part of it.

The Committee therefore pursued an open and honest approach with Reg by informing him that his wish could not be acceded to in the time allowed.

The Committee regrets any actual or implied criticism of Mr Watson by any CDAA member. We are in total agreement that Mr Watson has done much to assist the CDAA over the long years of his association with us, and we are most grateful for his help and support up to this time.

As a landowner/manager he will receive all our new documentation along with everyone else. I hope he will be able to see in them that we have addressed many of the areas with which he was concerned.

One matter which concerns me greatly was brought to my attention by Councillor Brian Rowley of the Review Group. Many people are convinced that the Independent Examiner issue was being pushed by Reg alone. I can assure you all that every landowner representative at the Review Group stated at each meeting their requirements for independent examining. The Committee felt it had until the March deadline to debate the matter, it was just regrettable that with respect to Reg, we judged wrongly.

Independent Examining

As the request for your opinion on Independent Examining was placed in the previous edition of 'Guidelines' before the Committee's decision to adopt it was finalised, there was some confusion as to whether members needed to reply or not. Well, several people did respond, and apart from a few minor sarcastic lines, the bulk of them were sincere and in common. The general feeling expressed was that the survival of the CDAA depended on co-operation with the landowners' requests, irrespective of what the issue may be.

I thank all those who cared to respond.

Once again, thank you for your patience in all these matters; I appreciate that it is begining to strain.

Category Tests and Examiner Information from the NTO

Sinkhole Usage Pressure

With the continued closure of Piccaninnie Ponds and the current restricted access to Barnoolut Station, great pressure has been placed upon the rest of the cooperating sinkhole landowners until these matters are successfully resolved. Consequently there has been pressure among Category 2 people to apply for Category 3 tests, and the numbers have steadily been increasing over the last six months. Unfortunately, the limited Category 2 sinkholes currently available reduce the range of experience that a Category 2 diver can gain. The CDAA continues to negotiate to regain access to these holes.

More Category 3 Tests

To cope with this situation and to reduce the intensity of a very long, cold day for Examiners and candidates at Category 3 tests, I have reduced the size of these tests and am running them in tandem - so we had September and November tests last year, and have March and May tests this year, with at least two more to come later in 1987. This has been appreciated by all concerned and allows a better, more manageable test, giving candidates and Examiners good working conditions. Thus our standards are able to be maintained and in fact, become improved.

Costs of Category 3 Tests

The CDAA can no longer afford to subsidise Category 3 tests as it did in the past and has directed the National Testing Officer to make sure that a Category 3 test covers the expenses of the Examiners involved. The cost for a Category 3 test will now be \$55 per head, which includes \$5 for a card update, with \$20 payable upon acceptance for the Theory test, and the \$35 balance due in cash on the Practical test date. (Cash allows me to distribute petrol money, etc to all the Category 3 Examiners at the end of the job, on the day). \$55 is a very cheap price for one of diving's most well respected performance certifications. Remember, we require sufficient Examiners from both States to run a valid Category 3 test - hence the expense.

Next Category 3 Test

The next Category 3 test is planned to be held on 2 May 87 in conjunction with the CDAA Special Meeting in Mt Gambier to ratify all CDAA documents submitted to the SA Government Sinkhole Committee (Review Committee). Applications listing all pre-requisites, including Category 2 dives and hours, should be sent to the National Testing Officer, PO Box 11, Burwood Vic 3125 (telephone 882 7652 - late hours to 1.00 am or so are your best bet). The deadline for applications is 30 Mar 87. A scheduled Category 3 test for March is already completely booked out.

Examiners Manual and Independent Testing

Twelve months ago I volunteered for the position of National Testing Officer with the specific aim of getting the Examiners Manual finished and establishing better dialogue between Examiners and the CDAA Committee. However, I found myself unwillingly plunked onto the SA Government Sinkhole Committee (Review Committee), representing the Examiners' viewpoints to landowners and various Government representatives.

It has been a very tough 12 months for the CDAA Committee and for the NTO. We have suffered some quite persistent opposition from some groups within the membership, and from outside. However, the CDAA Committee have produced the Regulations, the Constitution and a new Information Bulletin as promised, while I have completed the 40-page Examiners Manual.

All of these documents have been submitted to the Review Committee in January 1987 and have met with sound approval. The Constitution and the Examiners Manual are being polished up in accordance with the Review Committee's advice, and they will all be presented at the upcoming Special Meeting, for ratification.

The Examiners Manual consists of two parts:

- Part 1 - Structure and Management of Examiner Matters; and
- Part 2 - Cave Diving Examinations - Standards and Procedures.

Part 1 of the Manual will be made available on request from interested members from early March. Part 2 of the Manual contains procedures for all levels of Category testing and Examiner instructions for assessment, so it will not be available to the general membership. It contains a direction from the Review Committee that "Category 2 testing shall be conducted by an Examiner independent of the training of the candidate". Sinkholes thus remain open to CDAA members, except where individual landowners impose other extra conditions on diver access. The Independent Testing directive does not eliminate courses run by two Examiners, but states that candidates trained by one Examiner must have their Category 2 test examined by the other.

I am looking forward to working with the new Manual in 1987 and onwards. It, and the other documents construct a very solid framework for the CDAA for future years.

ADVANCED CATEGORY 3 LEVEL

Introduction

A number of members have requested clarification of the Advanced Category 3 level which has been in existence since Nov 83.

Holes currently categorized as Advanced Category 3 are the Western side of Englebrechts Cave and the Three Sisters.

There are pre-requisites for becoming an Advanced Category 3 diver, rules for carrying out Advanced Category 3 dives and additional equipment recommended. Advanced Category 3 divers will have their CDAA Card endorsed.

Pre-Requisites for Becoming an Advanced Category 3

- You must have held Category 3 certification for at least 12 months.
- You must have logged at least 20 Category 3 dives.
- You must have experience in most of the Category 3 holes.
- You must have dived at least twice in the popular Eastern side of Englebrechts Cave.

Applying for Advanced Category 3 Certification

To apply for Advanced Category 3 certification you should send your CDAA Card along with a list of 20 Cat 3 dives, including at least two dives in the Eastern side of Englebrechts, to your State Records Officer.

If you have previously supplied evidence of your dives and have been registered informally as an advanced Category 3 diver, then there is no need to send a list of dives, but your Cat Card must be sent in to be endorsed.

The inclusion of a stamped addressed envelope will assist in quick processing of your card. Don't forget to send your card!

*** A card processing fee of \$5 applies ***

Rules for Carrying out Advanced Category 3 Dives

- All divers in the team will hold Advanced Category 3 certification.
- A Dive Leader will be appointed.
- The Dive Leader will apply in writing at least two weeks in advance, stating the dive site and the names of all the divers involved.

4. The Dive Leader will be responsible for the key and will be held responsible for the replacement costs of a new lock, chain and keys, if the key is lost.
5. A \$20 deposit will be required for the key.
6. The Dive Leader will ensure that only Advanced Category 3 divers enter the cave.
7. The Dive Leader will be responsible for the locking of any access gate and the prompt return of the key (within one week of issue, unless otherwise arranged).
8. A responsible adult will be appointed to act as a surface member who will hold the key at the dive site until all divers in the team return safely.

Additional Equipment Recommended for Advanced Category 3 Diving

Because of the special nature and difficulty of Advanced Category 3 dives, the use of twin independent first stages is recommended. This means that as a minimum, a Y-Valve would be required. Twin cylinders, either independent or with a manifold would be even better. A pony cylinder is acceptable.

Synopsis of Letters

A breakdown of the opinions expressed in the letters is as follows:

Those in favour of independent examining - 9
Those against - 1

Those in favour of doing whatever the landowners require ie. independent examining - 6

Those in favour of the Committee doing all in its power to keep open or re-open sinkholes - 2

Note: Not everyone commented on each matter

Other matters of concern which were noted included:

- a. Many members expressed concern over the closure of the Barnoolut sinkholes by Mr R Watson. Four letters disapproved of the way in which the Committee handled the matter.
- b. Concern that commercialism and dive shop run courses resulted in a lowering of standards.
- c. The new Constitution should enable members to be expelled for 'badmouthing' the CDAA.

- d. The CDAA is a 'standards' organization and shouldn't be involved with testing.
- e. Three members found it unacceptable that the CDAA 'Oceans' stand should have advertising material for commercial courses on it. (We agree with you and have told the people concerned).

REPLY

I think the question of independent examining for Category 2 and 3 is no longer an issue. There can be no doubt in anyone's mind that this is the only course for the CDAA to pursue, and it has been written into the Constitution and Examiners Manual, so be there at the Special General Meeting to vote it in.

In defence of the Committee's stand against independent examining, I have to say that both the General Meetings of March and September 1986 voted against independent examining, and the Committee was pursuing the wishes of the membership in opposing it. If YOU the majority weren't there to vote in favour of it, then YOU know who is to blame.

The closure of Barnoolut is a great loss to the CDAA. The reasons behind this, from the Committee's point of view, are stated in the President's report. Mr R Watson has undoubtedly been a great supporter of the CDAA in the past and the withdrawal of his commitment to the CDAA is deeply regretted by all.
