

#### Letter to the Editor ... 'STAR DROPPER AT ENGELBRECHT'

Dear Sir.

I am a member of the Cave Exploration Group SA and a volunteer guide at Engelbrecht Cave. As a long term project I have been monitoring water levels in the cave. When the steps were installed in the East side the divers who assisted moved the guage board to deeper water adjacent to the steps to enable levels to continue being read. Recently the readings have been fluctuating. Apparently some divers have been slinging their guideline round the board to keep it clear of the steps. As it was not possible to securely fix the guage board due to the depth of silt it is now moving. To overcome this problem I have placed a star dropper next to the guage board. This can be used as a sling point if needed instead of the guage board.

Will you please advertise the placement of the star dropper as sling point in Guidelines so all divers are aware of it and use the dropper instead of the guage board.

Dear friends,

The Italian packaging and publishing company "Colophon" has entrusted us with the editing of a photographic book on the wonders of the underground world. It will be a 200 page, large size book containing images of the most interesting and amazing caves of the world. The book will be subdivided geographically, so as to show underground features of all continents. It will contain 50 caves/karst areas, for a total of approx. 160 photographs. #### Letter to the Editor ... 'KILSBYS SCOOTERS'

In a recent dive at Kilsbys, two divers used scooters during the dive and the thrust from the scooters and their poor kicking technique behind them caused 2/3 of the sinkhole to silt out. The visibility went from the usual 40+ m down to less than 5 m in some areas. These two divers were not aware of the problem that they were causing as they traversed through the sinkhole until they had made a complete circuit. We do not want to limit the use of scooters, it is only a common courtesy of those who wish to use them and that they think of others diving in the site and be aware of the devastation that the thrust from a scooter can have on the visibility within the dive site. Using scooters a reasonable distance above any silty areas and staying a reasonable distance away from other divers is not an unreasonable-request.



### The Management of Diving Medical Emergencies in the Mt Gambier Area

Specialist Anaesthetic Services & Hyperbaric Medicine Unit, Royal Adelaide Hospital.

Concern was raised last September at the landowners forum, about the level of awareness and education of hospital staff in Mt Gambier when it comes to treating the injured diver. As a cave diving doctor I decided I might be able to help and so set out to help bring the hospital up to date, and at the same time check the arrangements for retrieving divers to either Adelaide or Melbourne.

A talk is planned for March 1st as part of an Emergency Medicine Seminar at Mt Gambier Hospital. At the same time I'll be presenting the hospital with a management flowchart in the form of a poster developed by John Lippmann (DAN SEAP) and I. This poster will see wider use in many hospitals in the South East Asia Pacific region. Finally protocols for management and retrieval of sick divers will be left with the hospital.

Having been through all the protocols, it seemed a good idea to pass them on to the CDAA members by way of a bit of a refresher!

Diving injuries occur as a result of both salt and freshwater activities around the south-east. In addition to the risks of salt water diving, caving has the additional hazards associated with access and exit from sites, depth, hypothermia, silting, entrapment and the overhead environment. But hey, at least there are no sharks! Once injury is recognised, management is the same whether diving in the sea or the sinkholes.

The role of effective first aid is so clearly recognised in diving medicine now, that all groups of divers are strongly advised to carry appropriate equipment and be familiar with its use. "D" cylinders of oxygen (which contain 1500l of gas) can be rented from Air Liquide or BOC and a DAN O2 Provider Course will give you the nec-



essary skills to administer it. Together with keeping the victim flat and maintaining hydration, rapid transport to hospital and retrieval to a hyperbaric facility will maximise the chances of a full recovery from decompression illness (DCI). The crucial steps are listed below for a diver suspected of DCI.

- Remove the diver from the water to a safe and stable environment.
- Perform basic life support if required (D.R. A.B.C.).
- Administer oxygen at as close to 100% as possible
- ~ 1. Via an oxygen clean demand valve/ regulator or
- ~ 2. Through a plastic reservoir mask at >15 litres per minute
- Keep the diver lying flat AT ALL TIMES.
- Remove wet exposure suit and keep victim warm.
- Give oral fluid (water) if diver is conscious. Intravenous fluids if qualified to do so.
- Call for help and transport to Mt Gambier Hospital (MGH).

On arrival at the MGH the staff should continue with the first aid, perform a thorough history and examination then call a hyperbaric physician for further

# This year marks the 30th Anniversary of the CDAA.



advice. If DCI is thought likely then retrieval to the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne (Victorian divers) or the Royal Adelaide Hospital (SA divers and others) should be swiftly arranged. Early treatment is associated with a better outcome than delayed. Hyperbaric treatment is covered by Medicare, but retrieval by fixed wing aircraft may incur a cost to those without ambulance cover though a retrieval to a diver's state of origin should now be the expected norm.

Don't forget that divers break legs, suffer heart attacks and get bee stings so a general update on first aid is a good investment. If you have minor symptoms that might relate specifically to diving, call one of the doctors at the Royal Adelaide Hospital on the Divers Emergency Service telephone for advice. For more severe symptoms, get thee to the hospital! D.E.S. 1800 088 200 or RAH 08 8222 6000 The Alfred Hospital - 03 9276 2000. Mt Gambier Hospital - 08 8721 1200.

# NATIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT

It seems that the summer season brings with it our fair share of troubles. I can't remember a period when we have suffered so many problems with members not following access agreements. I have received so many calls from Landowners and volunteers just trying to do their job, it makes me want to scream. How hard is it to do the right thing?

The Directorate has been working on "cross-certification" for some time now and although closer to an agreed settlement within us, that doesn't mean the "other" agencies are happy. We have a lot of work still ahead on this matter so I can't see it being resolved in the short term

It will be election time soon so it's time to put your hand up and be counted. I will not be standing for re-election for another term so the National Directors position will be open along with Site and Publications/Records. Chris and Rob have not indicated to me that they will be nominating for the position.

The new Standard AS 2299.3:2003 has been released and this covers mix and rebreather diving. It has been a long wait but now that we have it it's just a matter of adapting our Regulations to suit. This project is being started now. A few have queried why we need to use an Occupational Standard when we are "Sport" divers. It becomes clear when you realise that we dive in sites that are owned eq. Government and private land that are Workplaces. If you set foot on/in a Workplace you are bound by a number of regulations. One is that the owner has a "Duty of Care". To quote the Standards Australia guide "...provides those involved in recreational diving .....at a workplace with a set of requirements and guidance to prevent and control risks arising from these activities. Includes the use of air, other nitrogen/oxygen mixtures and

mixed gases as breathing media, the use of rebreather units and the conduct of decompression diving." Obviously some people are not going to like it but should an accident occur you will be asked to justify why you did not follow the Standard. If you think you can present an argument that will "stand-up" in court against the "experts" that took three years to put the Standard together - go for it! I would not like to be in your place. Remember I was on the advisory sub-committee along with three other CDAA members (Barrie Heard. Richard Taylor and Stuart Canon) and we did not get what we wanted and had to compromise. One of my objections was the use of snorkels as mandatory equipment. My request for a waiver as Cave Divers was refused although it was pointed out that we could list it under special equipment requirements and solve the problem that way.


I have been reflecting on my time as National Director and feel very frustrated at not having achieved all of what I set out to do. The mixed gas situation looks like it will finally happen and our qualified Tri-mix divers will be able to check out the bottom of the Shaft, a pity it has taken so long and as I fade into the sunset it's still not finalised by the Directorate. Arguments over manifolds are now a thing of the past and hopefully will never become an issue again. Politically apart from one or two who will never give it up the CDAA is solid and supportive. Tank Cave once looked at as the realm of the "Exclusive Few" has more divers than ever before and more access to go with it. Sure, there are still hiccups sometimes but what system doesn't have its problems. Our web site has proven to be the best communicator we have ever had. When we need to get information out there quickly this is







The following statistics have been provided by Terri Allen as information relating to current Membership, diver certification levels, gender and location of members throughout Australia.










the place. The recent closure of Pines for instance was announced immediately on our site. Cross-certification or recognition of other training agencies certifications has been a major thorn in my side and this to will go unfinished, unfinalised and be a rock around the new Directors neck. Sure we've got more money in the bank than ever, but we achieved that the last time I was on the Directorate (3) in the early 90's when we were broke, not to the extent of 100 thousand odd that we have now, but from 20 grand in the red we went to 25 or so in the black at least. Given that the membership approved of my "wish list" I had plans to purchase our own dive site with part of that money. Having seen how successful this has been in the USA I knew we could do better. What's to stop us building our own training site? Why not have CDAA office on site? When I have suggested this, I have been amazed at the outcry by Instructors, some who seem to be worried that they may lose some advantage. When I took on this job I did



so making sure I received no advantage. after all I am in the dive business and teach CDAA courses. This has been to my detriment most of the time and has been a financial and time burden. The CDAA has come first but it's time I moved on and changed my priorities. I will still be a Tank Cave Guide, still teach CDAA Courses and if things don't work out I'm sure to stand again and beat myself up 'cos that's my

This won't be my last National Directors Report as we have one more issue to go, so I am looking forward to some interesting times. Let me finish with some guestions for you. Do you think officers of other Training Agencies should be allowed to hold Directorate positions? Should we buckle under pressure from Training Agencies to accept their divers as CDAA members? Just how far do we go with cross-certification, do we accept every Training Agencies Cavern Divers given that they attend a CDAA access/standards updates and can present SRT qualifications? How do we control mixed gas divers and make sure that they are following standards as set by the CDAA? Do they need control? Why should the CDAA get involved with who's doing what, surely if we have a Standard eg. AS 2299.3:2003 then if we have CDAA requirements to go with it, it's up to the individual to follow or pay the penalty if an accident occurs. Law in Australia is interesting, not only will the DLI go through you and Workplace Australia (or similar body) but the Police will perhaps charge you as well (see recent cases in Sydney) Personally I don't want manslaughter charges brought against me as a Director of the CDAA or for that matter ever! But don't officers of the CDAA have a "Duty of Care" as well to make sure that Standards are being followed? Regards, Warrick McDonald









