New Cave Explored in the Solomons

A new cave, "Split Cave", has been explored in the Solomon Islands. In August 2004, a previously-unexplored cave was investigated near the popular diving resort of Uepi Island in the Solomon Islands. Richard Servadei explored the cave on the Island of Matiu in the Solomon Islands. A sketch map of the cave dive was produced, and some photographs were taken.

The cave, which had been previously explored once only by the owners of Uepi Island Resort, contains crystal clear water and decorations, and seems to be connected to the ocean. It is a full penetration dive of about 100 metres, at a depth of about 20 metres, although parts do go deeper. Although the main body of the cave is clear and open, parts of the cave system are very silty and contain restrictions. The cave has been named "Split Cave" as it is accessed though a large split in the ground on Matiu island....

The Adventure begins...

During a scuba diving holiday to the Solomons, taking in Gizo and Uepi Is, the opportunity presented itself to do an exploratory dive on a cave on the nearby island of Matiu.

The cave had been explored only once before, by Grant and JII, the co-owners and operators of the Uepi Island Resort. It was hoped that, if suitable, the cave dive might become a draw-card for future divers from Australia and elsewhere. Richard Servadei (CDAA 2251) a Melbourne-based cave diver was asked by Grant and JII to do an investigation of the cave.

Richard, using full cave-diving equipment including sidemounted cylinders, a helmet, a reel, and lots of lights, carried out an exploration of the cave. One of the aims was to produce a sketch map and photos of the cave, and another aim was to see whether the cave connected to the ocean.

Where is this place?

Uepi Island is in the part of the Solomon Islands called the Morovo Lagoon, the largest lagoon in the world. The waters around Uepi are warm and dear and contain an abundance of fish life, including a lot of diver-friendly sharks. Uepi Island contains a Resort catering mainly to divers, and the Resort is the only habitation on the island. The island of Matiu is accessible from the Uepi Island

Pesort by a 40 minute boat ride. On this exploration trip, the boat from the Pesort was under the control of Divernaster "Deliva", a 20-year resident of the Pesort. The boat was driven by Edley, one of the drivers responsible for getting Uepi Pesort divers to and from the various sites. Matiu is a small island about six km long, also in the Marovo Lagoon, and falls under the control of local Solomon Islanders. We met the local representative, "John Wayne", from the village of Telina on the main island of Mbareke, and he dimbed on board our boat and directed us to Matiu Island.

Preliminary Dive - Wishful Thinking John Wayne, who knew the location of the cave on the

island, mentioned that he had followed the fault line on the island right out to the island's edge. He indicated that the fault continued down into the water, and suggested that it may be worthwhile checking it out from the ocean side. We agreed, and thus was born "Plan B". This involved doing a short exploratory dive from the ocean. Nick Jones (using twin back-mounts) and Fichard (using side mounts) entered the water and dropped down to eight metres where a huge triangular-shaped underwater split was apparent. Richard entered the split but it rapidly became very narrow and impassable, even using side mounts. So after a few brief minutes, the ocean dive was abandoned. and a new plan-of attack was determined. We reverted to "Plan A" which called for us to traipse across land, transporting our equipment, and entering the cave from a pool at the bottom of a large solit in the ground.

Access - Getting to the Site...

Once the boat was safely moored on a beach on Matiu, Richard's diving equipment was carried over land for about 200m, to the edge of a giant split in the ground. The surrounding area was uneven and full of sharp volcanic rocks, and the tree-life was fairly dense. In addition, there were many large red spiders, which we were assured were harmless!

Divers can dimb down a steep, sharp, rocky slope to the bottom, where there is ample room to assemble equipment. Because the water is so warm, wet suits are not necessary, but lycra suits are good as they provide protection from the sun and any stingers.

Diving equipment can be lowered using a rope, although care will need to be taken in this. The split in the ground has a sheer side, and is about 10m deep.

Once deep inside the split, access to the water by a fully geared-up diver is simple - a giant stride into clear water. There is a pebbly bottom at about 3m, which could be useful in case anything falls off or is dropped. Exiting the water after a dive is a bit trickier; it may be best to take off the diving gear and pass it up to a helper. Climbing out is then quite easy, although care is needed as the volcanic rocks are very sharp.

What was found - was it worth it?

In general, underwater caves can be classified as ones which were always wet, and ones which were, at one time, dry. Split Cave was once dry. How do we know this? Well inside the cave Flchard discovered many stalactites and

other decorations. This is a clear indication that the cave was formed above the water level, where it remained for many hundreds of years, and then subsequently became flooded.

After exploring the cave, Flchard determined that it did, in fact, connect to the ocean as had been suspected. This was evidenced by several things. Firstly, the water temperature in the cave was recorded by Flchard's dive computer was exactly the same as the ocean around the island, a balmy 29 degrees C. After a two metre layer of brackish, run-off water in he entry pool, the cave contained salt water, as determined by the well-known taste-test. However, the most telling evidence was the discovery of sea-life towards the end of the cave, in the form of fish and sea stars. As a final dincher, the end of the cave was determined (by dead-reckoning) to be fairly dose to the edge of the island, right near where the preliminary unsuccessful ocean dive was conducted.

After the dive, Flchard's equipment was quickly hauled up and our return journey, by land and sea, was uneventful. Some photographs of the cave entrance were taken, and it is hoped that additional underwater photos will become available in the not-too-distant future.

According to Fichard, because of the warm, dear water, and the beauty of the underwater decorations, this site is one of the "top ten" cave dives he has done.

How to arrange a dive in "Split Cave"

If you are a diver planning to do a diving holiday to the Solomon Islands, then you may consider doing a dive in "Split Cave". However, be aware that the cave dive should only be undertaken by suitably qualified divers. The exact policy on this has yet to be determined, but will rest with the owners of Uepi in consultation with the villagers of Telina. Any prospective divers will need to arrange their diving, in advance, with the operators of the Uepi Island Resort. Be aware that as the site is remote, and under the control of the local Solomon Islanders, there will probably be additional fees and "oustom fees" associated with the dive. Divers will also have to be prepared to carry their equipment over uneven terrain and dodde big red soiders!

DIR 2004.

A review by Andrew Bowie

3 DVD set. GUE Productions, 2004. Available as a CDAA Product RRP \$99.

I should say at the outset that I approached this as a diver with a healthy degree of scepticism about both GUE and the "Doing it Fight" philosophy.

There is a lot (eight hours) in these DVDs and I would recommend them to anyone who has an interest in "technical" diving.

You are taken through all of the equipment components of the DIR system and they are discussed at length.

Most of the DVD features an "interview" with

George Irvine 3 and Jarrod Jablonski of the Woodville Karst Plains Project and GUE

These two really are extraordinarv men. Thev are Hillary, Exley or even Mawson (read "Home of the Blizzard" if vou don't understand what I mean). They've worked out how to get there, been out there and come back alive The opportunity to witness a "fireside chat" with these two is remarkable and

shouldn't be passed up. There are a lot of fascinating insights into both their personalities and the genesis of what is now called "DIR".

They are very different personalities. George was pretty much what I expected. He fidgets, his speech and ideas jump about and he interrupts Jarrod. You can, however see his enthusiasm for diving in everything he says.

Jarrod on the other hand is quiet and very cool, almost withdrawn. He's patient, organised in his thinking and speaks very clearly. With

George you sometimes need to review what he's said to understand it, but with Jarrod it's all there for you. This is possibly related to the amount of teaching Jarrod does

I, like most people reading this, had heard a lot about "GI3" before but it was interesting to hear it from the horse's mouth. When compared to the internet "legend" that he has become, George was surprisingly tame and whenever he started to go off on a tangent Jarrod managed to rein him in.

The greatest single criticism I have about this 3 DVD set is that the technical quality of the recording is really substandard. Sadly, the quality of the lighting, audio and set organization was pretty "Wayne's World". All the video is very amateur and is seemingly shot in George's lounge room.

Next time they will hopefully employ a professional studio team rather than propping

And if you don't know where the Bellum Hotel is, it's that pub on the road to Port McDonnel just next to the turn off to Little Blue! George's "video-Gavin" aka "Mini Me" up on an empty Kool Aid crate. At one point where they are demonstrating how to fit a backplate they have obviously stepped a couple of metres (feet?) to the left of the main set. Pity no one thought to adjust the lights so they are actually on the presenters.

The sound is particularly annoying, with George bumping the mike with every wiggle and fidget, and a terrible 50hz hum overlying a significant proportion of the video.

Disc 1.

There was a lot of useful information and I found myself strangely compelled to go and get my backplate (yes, I really do have one) out and start fiddling. George's Uri Gellar impersonation (D Fing bending) was pretty funny.

I did cheat at this point and watch the 18 minutes of Wakulla at the end of DVD 3. This is the only diving footage on the DVD and is absolutely breathtaking.

Disc 2.

We move out to, you guessed it, George's garage. Looks just like my garage except:

- It's a lot deaner but there are a lot more jets taking off next door
- There's substantially more helium
- There's a veritable forest of Gavin scooters in one corner

Again it's predictable but interesting. George does some simulated trimix blending (gets a bit confused with the labelling) and gives us the Cook's tour of the Gavin scooter, which is interesting if like me you've never seen one before. He keeps on going on about how simple they are, and like a lot of the other DIR stuff (backplates, canister lights and spring straps) he's right. There is more on the evolution of the Gavin on DVD 3.

Disc 3.

There is a long (50 minute) discussion about the benefits of a "team approach" in this sort of diving, which contains some interesting pearls.

It did leave me with the impression that George and JJ do a lot of their diving "on the backs" of a huge number of support divers, who like Hillary's sherpa porters, never get to see the summit.

The discussions about decompression (also about 50 minutes) were tantalisingly interesting but don't give anything of substance away about WKPP's methods

In summary:

My verdict? Great entertainment.

Comparing the diving that the WKPP do to virtually anything 99.9999% of recreational divers will ever do is like comparing the space shuttle to a paper plane. Once you realise that,

the rationale behind DIR becomes somewhat dearer.

I can see that if you've gone to so much effort to develop a system that lets you go 10,000ft into a cave on a 300ft dive that takes 6 hours plus 9 hours decompression you'd think that you had something worthwhile to tell the world. And you'd be perfectly justified in wanting to make some money out of those you're telling about it too.

Whether that systematic rigidity needs applying to lesser forms of diving is a question that only the individual diver can answer.

I highly recommend this DVD. Andrew Bowie.

Tank Cave Progress Report and Map Update.

The latest release of the Tank Cave map is now available for download as a high resolution JPEG image from the CDAA web site.

The map has been significantly revamped to a new baseline and reflects the significant ongoing efforts of the Tank Cave Mapping Team and the countless individuals who have stepped in to help out along the way.

The team has been busy with the refinement of the pingers & thumpers and the techniques used, and have now accurately located and positioned 164 reference points within the cave.

A comprehensive adjustment of the entire previous data set into the Map Grid of Australia has been completed. This alone took 3 man weeks of effort, and whilst the results may appear subtle, it has allowed all subsequent work to be added straight into the map with precise fit.

Techniques have also been developed to utilise simple low cost technology to plan, record & transfer detailed information quickly, directly and accurately into the map data set, thereby avoiding translation errors for better accuracy & retaining the original information. Common & free GIS software tools are in use for online collaboration amongst the scattered team members.

As a result of this the significant changes in this release are:

Wall and other details have been progressively

added over a number of additional areas of the cave where previously only lines existed.

As wall details have been added, "Line Removed" and "Line Unmapped" features have been removed from the map to better reflect the actual site and minimise confusion.

Additional tunnels have been located and added such as the new S12 extension.

A number of connections have been identified. These include the location, re-alignment and additional details for the goat track connection to the G tunnel.

Some tunnels have been relocated.

A number of existing tunnels have been reviewed and wall and other details revised.

Commenced adding 'Low Areas' & 'Window' features.

There is still a great deal of work to be done. There are numerous areas currently being worked and refined for addition to the map and there are other tasks on the schedule to enable completion of the plan. Primarily these involve adding the outstanding wall details to the currently 'line only' areas, and adding the remaining known tunnel details. There is also a great deal of work to be undertaken to complete the 3D model, and the surface terrain model is also currently undergoing a detailed review with additional areas being added.

- Pictures saved from digital camera or scanned from photos must be at least 200 ppi at 15cm wide or equivalent, and saved as Greyscale as JPEG's.

The size and complexity of the cave and the limited access for the mapping team combine to prolong the effort. However spirits remain high and we continue to push on. As always any assistance is welcome, particularly from divers on-site on non-mapping weekends.

The new download map image release at V5-01-29 prints by default at A3, and has good resolution up to A1 if you have access to a larger format printer. Another option is to use software such as the Mapmaker application which can use small format printers to print across multiple sheets that can then be joined together.

In addition, this map image has also been geo-referenced and comes with a separate calibration world file (.jgw). This file should be kept in the same directory as the image file. Many GIS & mapping applications including free viewers will sense, load, position and scale the image based on the calibration file. The applications tools then can be used over the image, for example for coordinate display, distance measurements, compass direction, drawing lines and adding text overlays etc. Note that the coordinates used in this image are

unique to this particular public release and are in metres relative to the lower left corner.

The MapMaker Gratis application has a suite of tools which can be used and also allows any added overlay information to be saved for re-use, or emailed to others for viewing. Anybody considering joining in the mapping effort should give this a try out as it is a good introduction and a very useful collaboration tool. An updated version of the on-site laminated map used for dive planning has also been created. This has the same simple look and feel as the original and has been enhanced with the new wall details. This will be on-site shortly.

A big thank-you to everyone who has helped so far, especially to those who continue to work on the project. We look forward to providing further updates later in the year.



RE: CDAA ACCESS TO CAVES IN FOREST RESERVES


Following several recent incidents involving members of the CDAA, it seems appropriate at this stage to restate the terms and conditions of access available to CDAA members. ForestrySA values it partnership with the CDAA in facilitating access to cave for your members and is keen to ensure that they understand their obligations.

ForestrySA recognises that the South East of South Australia is an important place for the sport of cave diving and that a number of unique sites are situated within Forest Reserves. Given the dangerous nature of the sport, access to these sites needs to be carefully managed to ensure adequate protection is in place for divers, ForestrySA and the environmental values of caves.

ForestrySA is allows members of the CDAA recreational access to diving sites under amangaments documented in the "Agreement between ForestrySA and the Cave Divers Association", any additional terms imposed by the "CDAA - SA Landowner Lisison Forum", plus ForestrySA's entry conditions for recreational users.

In summary, cave diving is permitted provided that -

- Cave divers are suitably trained and qualified for the respective diving sites as per CDAA requirements
- A Forest Permit is obtained prior to entering any cave or sinkhole located within Forest Reserves
- All Permit conditions are met (for example specific conditions may relate to individual caves or parts of caves)
- Entry is not permitted on Total Fire Ban days, or when ForestrySA determines that extreme weather requires a Forest Work Bans to be issued
- · Entry is during daylight hours unless otherwise specified






