It was speared by Craig Buckles of the Makos club.

We now have the results of the first two quarterly competitions. For the first quarter, Keith Bush was the winner, second Harold Wilson, and third Warren Jackson. For the second quarter the same three people in the three placings only in different order: First Keith Bush, second Warren Jackson, and third Harold Wilson.

For the South Grafton Scouts the Makos club organised a film night which was held at the Scout Hall. A safety talk was given by our safety officer, Wayne Austen, and our president, Harold Wilson, explained the rudiments of spearing to the boys and demonstrated the different types of skindiving equipment on the market. The following Sunday an outing was arranged to introduce the Scouts to the practical side of skindiving. They acquitted themselves very well, in fact several out-scored their instructors, and if their enthusiasm will continue, only good could accrue to any club with members of their calibre.

On 21st September a party of Makos journeyed to South Solitary Island. The sea was calm and visibility 50ft. There were great schools of Kingfish sighted, but these fish were much easier to shoot than to land. Harold Wilson speared one which weighed in the vicinity of 60lb. However, it put up a very good fight and managed to free itself before it could be landed. There were other species besides Kingfish: Bob Davis and Warren Jackson between them landed several Black Cod, the smallest of which was 10lb. Three Hammerhead Sharks were also sighted but disappeared before anyone could get close enough to spear them.

On Sunday, 8th September, our competition was held at Emerald Beach. The scarcity of fish, combined with deteriorating conditions in the afternoon, made the competition a failure. Nevertheless some good fish were caught. Bob Davis set a club record when he landed a 3lb. 12oz. Leatherjacket and Grahme Carr speared another Rock Blackfish. It is almost uncanny the way in which Grahme can consistently spear fish in an area declared by fellow club members to be absolutely devoid of all marine life save shellfish.

We are looking forward to the return competition with Lismore club to be held at Evans' Head at the end
