South Pacific Awards

The Annual South Pacific Australasian Photographer of the Year Award was held on Friday, 18th July at the Bankstown Sportsman's Club.

More than 800 people attended what turned out to be an entertaining night.

Kim Kohen won the title of the Australasian Underwater Photographer of the year and his prizes were handed over by none other than Ron Taylor who was also a judge at the event.

Visuals by Lyn and Pat Manly, Ron Taylor and Mark Somewere also presented.

The South Pacific Divers' Club has been in operation more than 25 years and the last 5 years have seen some pretty spectacular entries being shown in the annual photographic competion nights.

Each year, sponsors have given away incredible prizes such as overseas trips, diving equipment and photographic accessories.

The great prizes tend to lure the majority of the underwater photographers to the contest and as the years have rolled by the competition has got better and the standard of entries has improved.

This year, Bob Baldwin of B.B. Diving Services has set a precedent in the competition by announcing two new categories with the prizes being 2 complete sets of diving equipment.

One is for the most promising entrant under

the age of 18, and the other is the most encouraging slide by a novice.

Bob believes in the young and up and coming photographers and hopes that these prizes will encourage them to participate

The Judging

Apart from the enormous temporary this competition generated, it has one important difference from most other photographic competitions.

Entrants must submit five slides, and prizes are awarded to the highest overall scores for each set of slides. If you submit one or two stunning slides, and a couple of only average quality there is almost no chance of winning against an entrant who submits five good quality slides.

In this way the competition is designed to select winners who constantly achieve a high standard of photography, instead of entrants with 1 or 2 lucky shots.

Of the 10 prizes in all, 4 are restricted to "Novices", there is one prize for the highest scoring single slide and the balance including two Honourable Mentions are classified as the "Open Section".

The Novice section is open to anyone who has never won any major underwater photographic competition or who has never earned any income involving photography.

The actual judging this year took up most of the day on Sunday, June 15 at

the Bankstown Sports Club function room. Only 8 people were present. The Judges, Ron Taylor, Pat Manly and Martin Coleman. John, Terry and Audrey Mansfield of South Pacific Divers, and counting the scores Carol Taylor (Wilderness Sea 'n Ski) and Jacqui Purse (In Depth).

The morning started with one quick run through all 430 slides to give the judges an idea of the overall quality. The Novice section is shown first, and each set of slides is screened strictly in the order in which they were received.

Each entrant's set of 5 slides is then screen twice, once through quickly, and szain slowly for judging.

With each judge
awarding a score out of 10
for each slide, it makes 150
the maximum possible
score for any entrant.

The second round of judging included the eight highest entries in each category, with much more attention to whether the entrant complied with all rules and conditions of entry.

It was interesting to note that Robert Mansfield who eventually won the Novice Section was actually judged 3 times — once in the 1st round, then in the Novice finals where his score was high enough to be included in the judging of the Open Secion finals.

The entire judging process was very professionally and confidentially arranged as all entries were referred to by number—names were never mentioned. Having been there I find it hard to imagine how anyone could influence the results, even if they had wanted to. The judges never saw the totals until the winners had been decided, each total was checked twice, and the scorekeepers were too busy most of the time to even watch which slides were scoring the highest.



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From the earliest days, the primary interest in the South Pacific Divers Club has been photography. With many early S.P.D. members being pioneers in the underwater photography field, competition in the club has always been spirited. This was so until about 6 years ago when a group of members felt that more competition from other clubs (and individuals) would improve their own standards as well as others. They decided to show their work for all to see, in an effort to generate more interest in underwater photography. Generate interest it did. In February, 1980, the club held an audio visual spectacular at Revesby Workers Club and to the amazement of all, nearly 400 people crammed in and we had to turn more away at the door. Those who were present will remember the occasion as heralding a revival in underwater photography as not only a collection of slides, but also as an art form by means of an audio visual presentation.

After this early success, we were confident that there was a real need for interclub competition and so launched the N.S.W. Underwater Photographer of the Year in July, 1981. Again we were overwhelmed by the response with over 650 people packed into the Bankstown Sports Club to see five audio visuals produced by Bob Smith and Tim Long. The production included almost 2000 slides which represented many hours of work from the photographers involved. The standard achieved was a credit to the skill these divers had developed.

The title was changed to "Australasian Underwater Photographer of the Year in 1982. That year the format was somewhat different. A variety of films, including Ron Taylor's latest "The Wreck of the Yongala" together with updated audio-visuals by Bob Smith and Tim Long were shown. Presentation of awards were made by Ron Taylor and Neville Coleman, both of whom also judged the competition. Valerie Taylor was also our guest for the evening with Mr. Pat Manly taking out the title of "Australasian Underwater Photographer of the Year" winning a diving trip to Vanuatu.

Our 1983 Australasian Underwater Photographer of the Year was Bob Halstead, 1984 - Gert De Couet, and in 1985, Pat Manly again took out the coverted award.

As you can see, the expertise and enthusiasm for this competition and presentation has always stemmed from South Pacific Club members spurred on by their interest in underwater photography and their willingness to compete with other divers in this field. As a dive club, completely unaffiliated with any other dive body or organisation and with limited funding, we take pride in the organisation and presentation of our underwater photographic competition. The judges donate their time graciously and our sponsors, some of whom have been with us from the beginning, get more generous every year enabling us to offer the great prizes our winners receive.

As we gain experience, our efforts will not remain unrewarded and we thank the entrants for their willingness to compete in our competition from which we trust all will gain the experience to constantly better ourselves in the demanding field of underwater photography.
