PHOTOGRAPHIC OFFICER'S REPORT.

Neil, in his report as Photographic Officer, requested that the slides promised for the Stage Connections audio-visual, be given to him for duplicating as soon as possible. The slide entries in the October round of the George Roberts Trophy were to be shown at the end of the Club meeting. (This was again won by Noel Taylor).

PUBLICITY OFFICER'S REPORT.

The Publicity Officer, Neil Koos, requested that members contribute articles for use in the Wet Rag. Also, the December and January issues would be combined, with this magazine being posted in January.

DIVE REPORT AND GENERAL BUSINESS.

Numerous dives had taken place during the month, including:-

- . Larry King and Graham Wakeling spent a week at Fitzroy Island. This was the trip Larry won for Novice Photographer of the Year. The diving was disappointing, mainly due to the windy weather on the Island and the lack of fast transport to the outer reef. However, Peter Bounty and the others at Fitzroy Island Dive Shop went out of their way to ensure both had a good time and the best possible diving under the conditions.
- . Brian and Vicki Colwell dived on Mike Ball's new boat, "Supersport" (Brian's prize for second place in the Novice Section). Reported some very good diving with over 80 ft. visibility but a few disappointing dives occurred in areas denuded of good coral growth by the Crown of Thorns.
- . Jim Smith went with Port Hacking Divers to Montague Island. With 23 divers, each dive was a "shit fight" (the President's own description). Conditions were made worse by the strong N.E. wind and silty water. Also, a few paper nautilus' were seen.
- . Martin Kandelas dived the Tuggerah. An exceptionally strong current was encountered and with difficulty Martin finally reached the wreck. On the wreck he found some gauges connected to a 4 ft. pipe, but this was "torn" from his grasp as he surfaced. Must have been a bloody strong current for Martin to lose part of a wreck - especially the Tuggerah!

Lyn and Pat have experienced some good diving at Jervis Bay. One one dive they saw a sunfish and were able to get very close. (However, Pat was set up for macro!) Lyn did not quote Pat's comments on his choice of photographic equipment.

Entries in the second round of the George Roberts Memorial Trophy were shown and slides by Graham Wakeling of his recent trip to Fitzroy Island.
