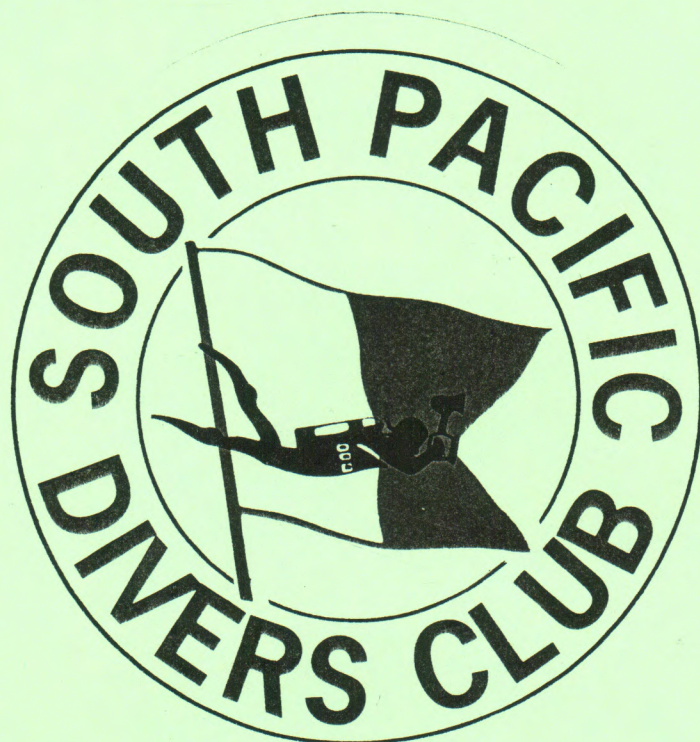

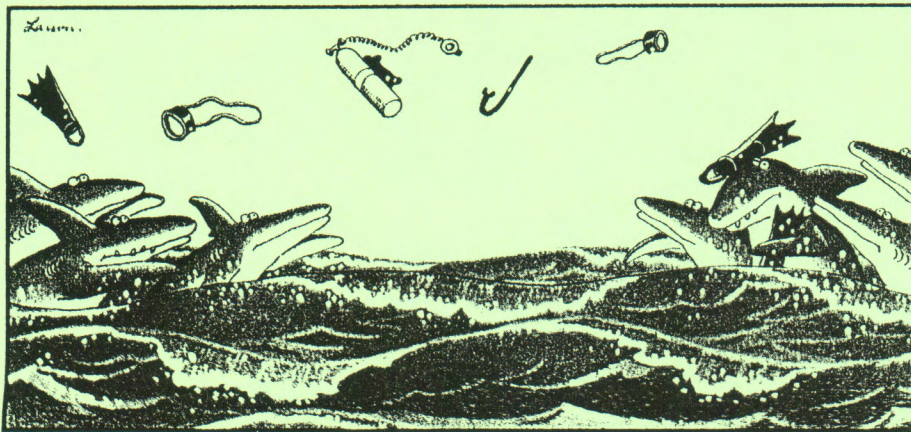

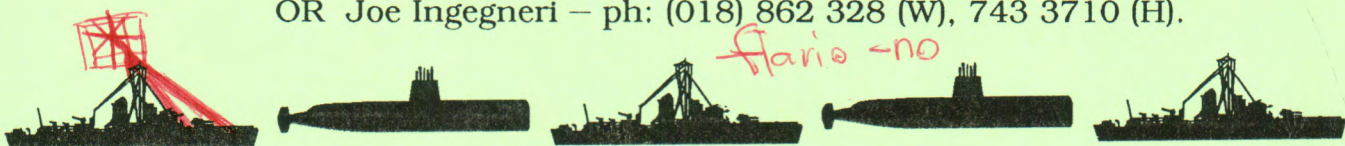

EHC180 Proposal for the Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine
Protected Areas
File No: N1

Introduction

Report by Director - Environmental Services (SW).

The National Parks Association of NSW Inc. (NPA) has presented the NSW Government with a formal proposal for the establishment of Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine Protected Area (Curracurrong MEPA) which incorporates marine and estuarine waters adjacent to Royal National Park. It has requested by the NPA that the proposal be brought to Councils' attention.

Summary of the Proposal

Under this proposal the Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine Protected Area would incorporate:

- The Curracurrong Marine National Park comprising the marine coastline of Royal National Park, Shiprock and the mangrove and seagrass habitats along the southern shores of Port Hacking.
- The Curracurrong Marine Recreation Area comprising Port Hacking with the exclusion of Burraneer, Gunnamatta, Yowie and Gymea Bays, North West Arm, easements for navigation channels and the areas given national park status.
- The Curracurrong Marine Nature Reserve which covers Osborne Shoals.

The proposed boundaries are indicated in Appendix A.

Major reasons for the NPA advocating the establishment of Curracurrong MEPA include:

- The diversity of estuarine flora and fauna.
- The diversity of marine flora and fauna.
- The need to preserve a representative temperate marine and estuarine ecosystem for future generations and scientific purposes.
- The importance of the area as a habitat for commercially and recreationally important fish species.
- Archaeological features including wrecks.
- Its close proximity to Sydney makes the area important for educational, scientific and recreational purposes.

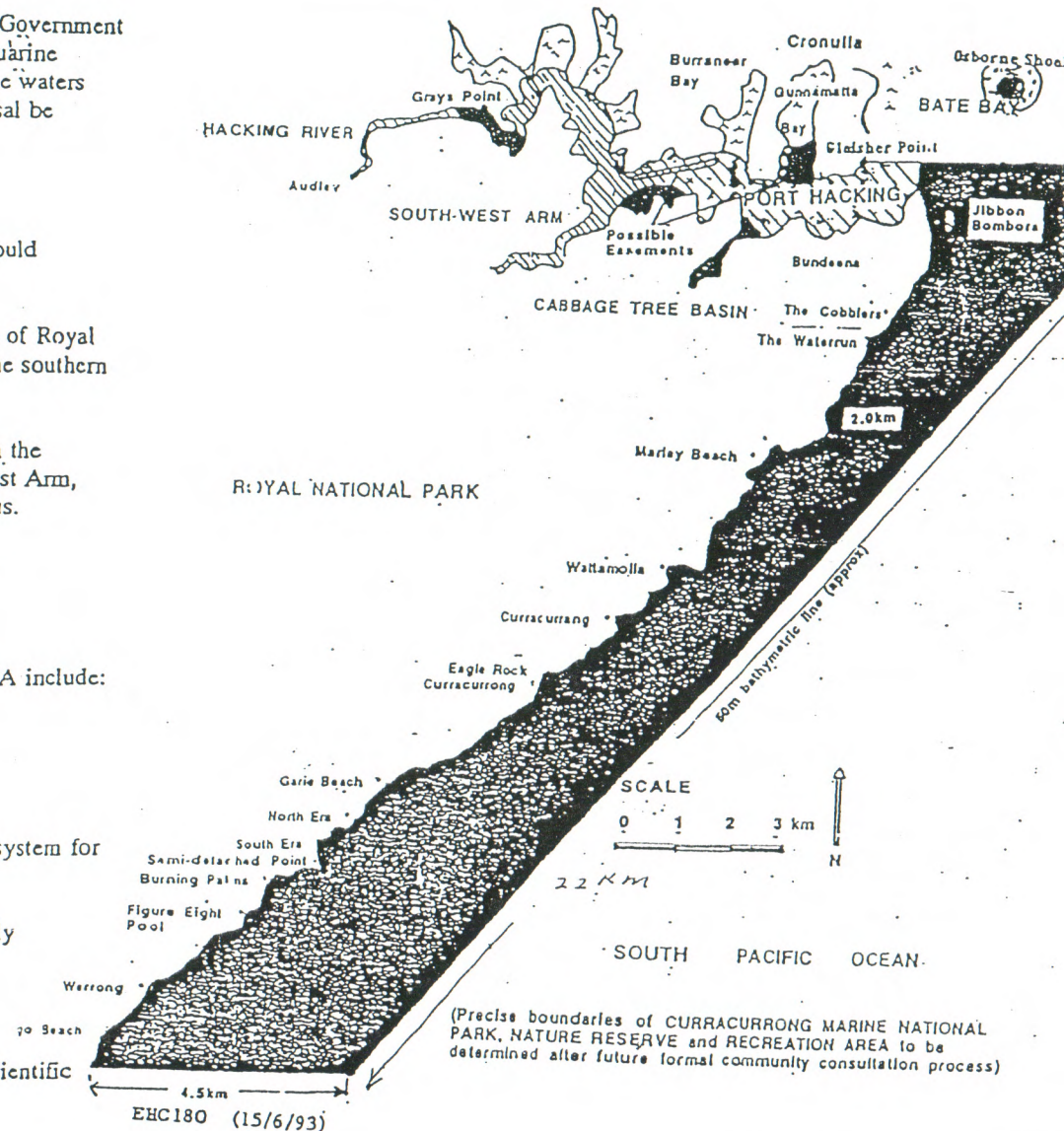

- It is adjacent to an existing national park.
- The presence of fauna covered under Schedule 12 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 or international conservation agreements.

Under the NPA proposal the areas given marine national park status would be reserved for the joint purposes of ecological conservation and appropriate non-exploitative and non-consumptive recreation. All collecting, taking or killing of fish or other organisms, whether animal or plant, living or dead would be prohibited. Hence, both commercial and recreational fishing would be banned in this area.

However, recreational fishing would be allowed within the marine recreation area comprising most of Port Hacking.

Areas given marine nature reserve status are accorded the highest level of conservation and are reserved for ecological conservation, scientific, educational and reference area purposes. In such areas recreational activities would not be allowed.

Commercial fishing and extractive industries would not be permitted within the Curracurrong MEPA. The NPA recognises the requirement to maintain navigation channels within Port Hacking for recreational craft and has accordingly excluded these areas from the proposed Curracurrong MEPA.

The NPA outline how the proposed Curracurrong MEPA satisfies all of the criteria which are used to assess the suitability of areas to be reserved as national parks. This criteria includes ecological, archaeological, scientific, geological and landform values and proximity to centres of population.

Problems

The major problems the NPA has identified concerning its Proposal are the legislative framework and resourcing.

Although the authority to establish MEPAs rests with the New South Wales National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS), it does not have jurisdiction over areas below the mean high tide mark. The Department of Conservation and Land Management is responsible for the intertidal areas, whilst New South Wales Fisheries has responsibility for the waters below mean low tide mark.

The NPA suggests that the legislative problems would best be solved by making the NPWS the controlling body for the management of MEPAs.

If the NPWS was given the responsibility of managing the proposed MEPA, funding would have to be sought for additional trained staff and upgraded facilities.

Another problem, not identified by the NPA, is the potential public rejection of a ban on recreational fishing along the marine coastline of Royal National Park. Conceivably, a more balanced approach, in which recreational fishing is restricted in some areas and tighter controls for the protection of intertidal communities are enforced, would satisfy the requirements for environmental protection and recreation.

The Proposal in relation to the Port Hacking Management Plan

The Proposal has similar objectives to the Port Hacking Management Plan. Both aim to protect significant aquatic ecosystems and to enhance the value of Port Hacking as a recreational resource.

The Environmental Science Unit strongly supports, in principle, any proposal which aims to enhance the protection of the natural environment within Sutherland Shire. Nevertheless, it is understood that specific details of the Curracurrong MEPA proposal will require consultation between Council, State Government and the community (in particular, the status of recreational fishing within the proposed Curracurrong Marine National Park).

NPWS Assessment of the Proposal

NPWS is responsible for the assessment of this Proposal. In February we requested a copy of their assessment, when it becomes available. NPWS have not yet finalised their assessment

RECOMMENDATION:

1. That the report from the Director – Environmental Services on the Proposal for the Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine Protected Area be received and noted.
2. That the report from the Director – Environmental Services on the Proposal for the Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine Protected Area be referred to the Port Hacking Planning and Advisory Committee, for further consideration.
3. That a further report be prepared on the proposed Curracurrong Marine and Estuarine Protected Area when the National Parks and Wildlife Service's assessment becomes available.

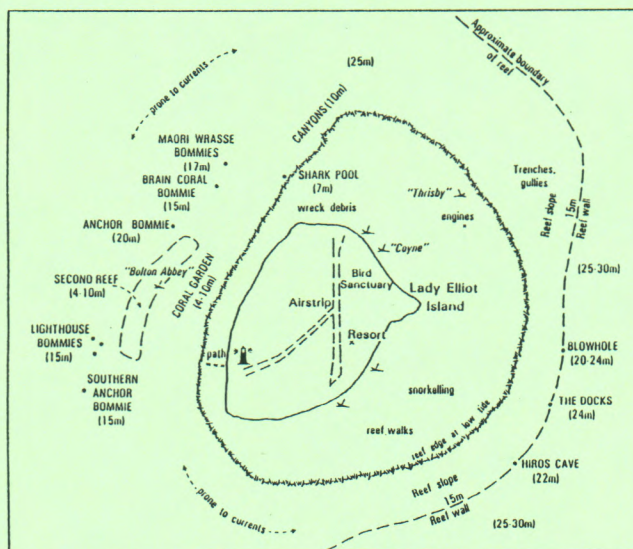
