

Acting Newsletter Editor's Message

As indicated above, quite a few of the club's members are away in the Solomons, including Russell Stoker, the usual Editor of this erstwhile newsletter. I have been asked to finish the editing this month as the crew left last weekend and Russell did not have the time to put the *Wet Rag* to bed.

As Leo mentioned, we dived the SS *Bombo* two weekends ago and had a great dive. If you have not yet dived this wreck, I urge you to get down to Wollongong and give it a go.

The day after the Bombo, Eddy Labour and I dived the SS *Tuggerah*. The weather was also perfect and the seas quite good, although the north-westerly did chop the seas up a little. There was a slight current as we descended and the visibility was not fantastic. However, when we hit 30 metres it opened up and we could see the wreck. On the bottom at 45 metres the visibility was at least 25 metres. As usual, there was prolific schools of fish hovering over the boiler/engine/stern. At the bow where we were anchored, there were more than 50 Port Jackson sharks lying everywhere. On this dive I also saw at least 10 numbrays on the sand around the wreck. Despite the current, which extended right to the bottom, we had a fantastic dive.

The current picked up after we ascended and by the time we surfaced after our decompresssion stops (30 minutes) we were more than one kilometre south of the wreck. Another boat which dived the Tuggerah after us said that the current was at least 1.5 knots when they got in but totally gone by the time they left the water. Very strange considering we only had 0.25 to 0.5 knot at the most while on the wreck and descending.

The weekend before last was a total write-off with cyclonic winds and huge seas. Did anyone dive? If so, they certainly qualify for the keenest diver of the year award. On the Saturday people were surfing at the mouth of the Georges River in Botany bay, at least seven kilometres from the ocean.

This past weekend has been excellent, although the water is still a bit dirty from the rain and huge seas of the previous weekend. Together with Scott and Debbie Eggerton, Rebecca Davies and a couple I did a drift dive from South Tumbledowns down past The Gullies (Underwater Wilderness) off Royal National Park. I had not dived most of this area for at least six or seven years. After this dive, I do not know why? We all had a great dive and I plan to do it again as soon as possible. The site consists of heaps of gullies/canyons, huge boulders and in the shallows, numerous overhangs right under the rock platform. It was so calm we could dive right against the rock platform. We found a huge cave, with five or more entrances and a few PJs inside. I did 60 minutes and only got out of the water because I was starting to feel the cool water (16°C). The next day I dived north Bondi and as it was so came, we went in right off the very end of Ben Buckler Point. Once again, an excellent dive with heaps of caves and swim-throughs. Get out there now and dive, you won't regret it.

HAVE THEY GOT THEIR SIGHTS ON YOUR FAVORITE DIVE?

You can pick a person who's been to South West Rocks. They will, unaided, waffle on about the peaceful, restful atmosphere, the beautiful beaches and if they're a diver - Fish Rock Have you been there? If you have then this will be near and dear to you.

Recent events in our beloved South West Rocks have raised in me the indignities and outrage that I never believed were in me.

Recently a Sydney spearfishing club set up camp and competition in South West Rocks and devastated the Fish Rock dive area. This area, well known to all dive enthusiasts for its beauty and marine life has subsequently been irreparably damaged, the marine life destroyed, the locals disgusted and the spearo's declaring that *they will be back* just like the had guys in the movies, to wreak havoc on the environment.

Fish Rock is considered one of the ten best dive spots in Australia by Australians and overseas tourists alike because of the marine life that is in abundance in this area. But sad to say, the majority of fish that we once saw there is now happily resting in the stomach of a pelican. It was the hauls made by this competition included such things as Garfish and Red Morwong that were consequently fed to these very happy pelicans. Ten spear fisherman alone are alleged to have killed between 300 and 400 fish everyday. The majority of fish killed in this competition were sedentary reef species, resident fish, if you like who live in an area regardless of tides currents etc. If these fish are killed off it could take years for their numbers to be replenished, if ever.

Another fact of the matter is this. These people left their own area (either because they've already ruined it or because they don't want to ruin it) and drove about 5 hours and ruined someone else's backyard. At the very least that's rude isn't it boys and girls?

"... You (the Argus) must bear in mind the dive shops interest (in Fish Rock) is totally selfish. A great number SCUBA divers forget if it had not been for spear fisherman they would not have their sport. Spear fisherman pioneered the gear in the early days and formed the first scuba club's.... " Macleay Argus ©19/08/96.

This long held view of Spearos that claims that scuba enthusiasts owe their sport to them was completely shattered in the 1950s by a well known gentleman by the name of Jacques Cousteau. Remember him?

But this was not an isolated incident. The number of spear fishing clubs visiting South West Rocks to hold their competitions is increasing, raising questions as to why they can no longer hold these competitions in their own waters.

FISH ROCK NEEDS YOUR HELP.

We need you to help preserve Fish Rock.

- 1. We need a ban on all spearfishing activities immediately so that the wildlife can have at least a chance of regenerating and For the ecosystem to correct itself
- 2. We need sedentary fish to be removed from the AUF (Australian Underwater Federation) competition score sheet immediately as they are being killed solely for points and being wasted.
- 3. There needs to be a ban on the killing and/or taking of sedentary reef species as they are under threat and their reduced numbers cannot sustain the pressure being placed on them.

DIVE REPORTS

MY DIVE AT JERVIS BAY WITH SOUTH PAC DIVERS......

It is often said that winter is the best time for diving....It is a sweeping statement. It is a statement that is most often said by people that haven't been diving very long...That is another sweeping statement.

About seven days prior to South Pac's pilgrimage to the Gods Country of Jervis Bay we had a good westerly blow. You know the kind of 'screaming banshee' winds that tears the roofs off of houses and uproots trees. The king of winds which some people will tell you flattens off the sea and brings in the clear water. Only 'offshore' it produces mountainous seas and big swells just like any other winds. When the wind drops off, the swell comes back at you on the coast around 12 to 18 hours later.

The sea presents against the coast with a huge swell of long wavelength (far apart), often with a smooth surface which is very comfortable to ride on. (If you find this boring it gets worse it I write about the dive) These swells travel very fast, often in the region of 40 - 60 Knots. Trying to keep up with them in a fast dive boat is an exercise in futility. One minute you are surfing the boat down the face of a swell, and the next minute the swell has overtaken you and your are clawing your way down it's back trying to catch it.

Many of you have been diving in shallow water and have been tossed around by wave action. A big swell produces wave action which penetrates down deep...and stirs up the bottom a long way offshore. It makes for dirty, rotten, filthy water which makes Jervis Bay diving weekends nothing to write home about...(Getting the picture?)

Want to hear a cock and bull story? On said Jervis Bay diving weekend, on the way out to the dive site I spied Geoff Cook cleaning his teeth with a toothbrush and paste whilst riding aboard a fast attack semi-submersible all weather dive boat. Upon further interrogation Geoff furnished me with one of the best cock and bull stories that I have heard in a long time. He told me..."That one day someone might collapse on the deck of the boat that he was on and that Geoff would bend down over them in a classic resuscitation pose. Geoff then told me that he doesn't give mouth to mouth to anyone. The poor victim lying on the deck would look up into Geoff's eyes thinking they were going to be saved....but the last thought that went through their grey matter before they passed into oblivion was "No.... He's not going to save me, but Gees he got fresh breath.."

Yes the diving on this day was going to be worse than that sad tale. We dropped anchor on the wall which runs North from the Arch towards Crocodile Head. John Earl, Geoff and myself entered the water and couldn't see anything. We went down the anchor line and bumped into the bottom at 100 feet and couldn't see anything. All was not lost however.... Geoff clipped off a 'come home line' to the anchor chain and off he went into the gloom and doom. Following Geoff, we swam along the line until were we still couldn't see anything. Eventually by the light of my 100 watt torch I was able to ascertain our depth at 130 feet, it was then that we came across a large leatherjacket clinging to a rock. It told me that he was hanging onto that rock for dear life because the viz was so bad that he didn't know which way was up and if he let go he might fall off the face of the earth.....Bubble, bubble.

We Followed the line back to the anchor, ascended, decoed and safetied and jumped back in the boat. We all agreed that as far as this boat was concerned that the weekend's diving was over.....!

That night we had 24 heads at the Vincentia 'Chop Meow' for dinner, which was the high point of the day with plenty of talk and food. That pretty well sums up the great weekend that almost was...Company was fine but the viz was not quite at it's best. You should have been here the week before...It was perfect.

WONIORA - SYDNEY'S DEEPEST AIR WRECK

The wreck of the *Woniora* lies off Botany Bay in 64 msw making it Sydney's deepest wreck that can be dived on air (66 msw being the recommended limit for air dives). It sank on the night of October 28th 1882 in what was described by the only surviving crewman as the worst sea he had seen on the Australian coast. The wreck was discovered by Max Gleeson and Mae Elliot in May 1987 however it is not dived regularly because of its depth.

Being only relatively small and in such deep water, the wreck can be quite difficult to anchor on. Although often swept by strong currents, on my last dive to the wreck there was no current at all and this, combined with flat seas, sunny weather and 20 metres plus viz made for a great dive.

The wreck lies on sand and forward of the boiler it is mostly covered by the sand except for two winches, a donkey boiler and a small section of the bow. The ship was one of the NSW coast's 60 miler colliers and large chunks of coal can be found about the wreck site. The boiler has a large hole in the top, probably where a funnel once stood, and moray eels and large decorator crabs have made their home amongst the boiler tubes. On the port side just forward of the boiler lies a large spare anchor. The engine is behind the boiler and a large gauge can be found still attached. Aft of the engine is the flat rear deck and the stern rises five feet from the sand. The propeller is exposed showing only one of three blades. Various fish can be seen on the wreck as well as cuttlefish and other sea life. After exploring the wreck you begin the long haul to the surface and it's then that you appreciate how deep it is. After 18 to 20 mins on the bottom you can look forward to approx. 60+mins of deco on an Aladdin Pro. However when doing this sort of square profile dive, custom tables with deeper stops and oxygen for the final stop are usually safer as I find that the Aladdins first stop is usually only 12 or 9 metres.

An exciting dive, the Woniora should only be attempted after gaining considerable experience on the many other shallower wrecks in Sydney.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL CLUB MEMBERS...

On Thursday the 29 August 1996 after making several phone calls to Narooma it was been confirmed that the 1880 wreck of the LADY DARLING, a 230 foot steamer, about 890ish tonnes has finally been located just off Mystery Bay just south of Narooma and Montague Island.... Amazingly the first report of the wreck is that it has collapsed around itself but is mostly intact...(for now)...and in less than 100 feet/30 msw, lying upright on the sand and is covered with fishlife. News travels fast and the operators that I spoke to were very surprised that anyone knew about it yet. But they will take us there. Come and see history before the *Myola* syndrome sets in. [Acting Ed's note: this has now been reported in the SMH on 6 September]

The weekend at Eden already had to be cancelled as Peter Hall had other commitments with a whale watching festival that weekend and we will reschedule a trip later in the year. Accommodation has been organised at the Oakley Farm at Mystery Bay, just south of Narooma, which has several bungalows and farmhouse accommodation great for divers and other family members or non divers. It's also a great place for the kids as our hosts Max and Jenny have their own mini zoo of farm animals. The facility also has a covered common room full of dive nic nacs and a BBQ for Saturday Night. Non Divers and Spouses,

don't forget that Tilba Tilba and the vineyard are just down the road.... plus a great view overlooking Montague Island and now from reports the actual wreck site.....!

Accommodation and bums on seats for dive charter boat MUST be confirmed prior to, or at the September Meeting. I Make No Exceptions! First in best dressed.

WRECK UPDATE by the Phantom Wreck Rat

The magnetometer has been getting a workout lately and one wreck we are after is the SS *Toncurry*. Built in 1903 and 160 tons, it was lost on the morning of Sunday 22 October 1916 approximately five kilometres off Broken Bay straight out from Barrenjoey.

It was carrying 1,500 bags of cement, 1,100 cases of explosives, 100 cases of whisky and 60 cases of jam. A leak in the forward chain locker was found to be above the waterline. However, at 3.15am, the vessel was found to be leaking badly. The pumps could not prevent the rising water so the ship was abandoned and sank 20 minutes later. The vessel was diving into a north-east sea and a pint of water was said to be coming in at each dive.

No reason for the leak was given, but there was a four foot gap between the cement and explosives and the mate stated that he fancied he saw the masts come together as she sank.

Thanks to the legacy of Rick Latimer, we have a position marked on the charts that is possibly the *Toncurry* at approximately 33° 35′ 60″ and 151° 23′ 60″ [Ed note: this is actually 33° 36′ 0″ and 151° 24′ 0″ - is there an error here?]. according to the Naval Charts, the depth is around 47 metres and lies about 5 kilometres off Barrenjoey, north of the Birchy. This wreck would be a great find. While only small, about the size of the TSS *Wandra* off JB, it would certainly be impressive if the 100 cases of Scotch were preserved by the cement! Boat owners interested in mounting a search can contact the committee for a map and info.

Rumour has it that a number of wrecks (including the *Nemesis, Nimbin, Comboyne, Rosedale, Wollongbar, Sumatra, Kielawarra, Bega* and *Corio* have either been found or could be quite soon. There are also a number of deep hulked wrecks to be found off Sydney Harbour, a few of which have already been rediscovered and dived.
