

# INTERNATIONAL GUEST AT NEXT MEETING.

While attending the UNDERWATER SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY CONFERENCE in ISTANBUL recently "The Galloping Greek" was introduced to their guest speakers.

One of these speakers Jean Claude LE PECHON (with one of those `on the top of the PE) is coming to Australia and will make a presentation on High Altitude diving at our next meeting. The particular dive was in 1993 in Chile at Lake Chungara at 4517m. This is technical diving in extreme conditions. The dive was carried out on Nitrox, with automatic semi-closed U.B.A., and was computer controlled.

Jean Claude has spent 13 years planning platform in various countries (mostly using Trimix) and now is a well known consultant for work requiring compressed air breathing. He has worked on space programs requiring compressed air and diver training is an expert on commercial saturation diving and now works mostly with tunneling operations.

Jean Claude is coming out here for 2 weeks to advise Transfield on the Airport Metro Project.

### **DIVE REPORTS**

# THE LADY DARLING Barjumpa

Reports that the Lady Darling had been located by Bert Elswyk on the 17th August, just off Mystery Bay were true and a trip was hastily organised by the club diving with the opposition charter operation, Kato Dive, operated by Peter Tinsen and staying in the luxury of the Mystery Bay Farm accommodation. We had a big turn out by the club with 15 divers and 9 children and 5 non diving wives. But in the week immediately prior to our proposed weekend trip on the 18-20 October, the Heritage Department still hadn't issued permits for anyone other than 'Bert Elswyk Inc.' and his charter operation to dive on the wrecksite... What's more perplexing is that in that week (Mid October) the Heritage Dept had only logged one dive on the wreck. Isn't it amazing that with all the red tape they create that when it gets down to the nitty gritty of someone finding a new wrecksite in reportedly pristine condition and within their diveable limits that in two and a half months they log one whole 20 minute dive. They continued to allow a charter operator to take commercial dive charters to the site but do not allow anyone else to dive the site. Well after much pushing and shoving and finally correspondence from aggressive solicitors the Heritage Dept backed off and issued permits to the three commercial charter operators at

South Pacific Divers were the first (Non Burt Elswyk) charter group on the wreck. But alas the reports that the wreck was pristine were grossly exaggerated. There were no brass or copper objects to be seen anywhere on the wreck..... Looks like the mice have been there some 15 or more years ago.... All things aside this is an exciting wreck to dive on and very pretty with it's marine growth. Camera buffs with go mad with the growth and size of the wrecksite. Wreck divers will still be impressed although not frothing at the regulator as was

originally indicated. The PADI divers down there still consider it to be a deep dive and don't believe in decompression diving profiles (yet)so 33 metres and 20 min bottom time are the limits.

The weather in the area is so often not kind to divers as was the case on the second day so we had a fun dive with the seals from the colony on Montague Island and on route back encountered a pod of three whales that were putting quite a show breaching and slapping their tails. The one more surfaced on the other side of our boat some 25 metres away and passed right under our boat.

A great weekend away with the club and family was had by all and another with be planned early next year in the calendar so be there.

### HI-TECH? NO FRILLS! By Scott Leimroth

I was recently invited by the 'No Frills' dive club from Long Reef to join them for a weekends diving at Seal Rocks. As usual I jumped at any chance to dive the Catterthun and my buddy Ian and I set off late Friday night for the camp site. And what a campsite it was. Great accommodation in luxury huts with ocean views and only mins from the beach. This was a great find and will be a must for the next SPDC weekend up there. We set out from the beach after much fun launching the boats with the 4wds and were soon over the Catterthun. A large turtle was seen on the surface and when he descended we could see him disappearing for ages the water was so clear. We also spotted 3 humpbacks playing on the surface and watched them before anchoring. This was a great dive with virtually no current and 30m viz. No frills were impressed as it was their first dive on the wreck being unable to find it on previous trips. We dived at Big Seal that afternoon and although the viz wasn't as good as on the wreck we saw the large resident turtle sleeping under his ledge, numerous lion fish, one grey nurse and a heap of large crayfish.

The next day we dived the wreck again and the viz had even improved slightly. We explored the stern and the areas around the engine and boiler finding large swimthroughs on the port side where the hull has collapsed and a large anchor from the Briggs and May salvage in 1896 lying between the engine and boiler. We had a magical view of the wreck as the anchor drifted off the port side near the engine and in the clear water could see and appreciate the true size of the vessel that lay on the ocean floor before us. Ian and I had some apprehensive moments on deco as we were engulfed by large schools of bait fish which suddenly disappeared but we didn't see what had frightened them. We had spent 20 - 25mins on the bottom and were in the water decoing for ages longer than the other divers. No wonder these guys call themselves 'No Frills'. They don't dive with BCDs and only ever wear single tanks. On top of that they did 15 mins on the bottom and only 15 - 20 mins deco. They do, however, have many years experience between them and were very competent divers. And I thought the Catterthun was a 'technical' dive. Doh!

# Helmet Fetish Dive Day. Barjumpa

On the 2nd November, South Pacific Divers went back into the diving past. Peta Williamson, Peter Flockart, Bob May, Mark Deitz, Gordon MacDonald and I went and learnt to dive in hard helmet dress at the Helmet Fetish at Manly wharf. Bob May considered that there would be parking problems at Manly and came by boat although we all walked the 23 metres from the car park to the wharf with little or no difficulty. Don't ever let it be said that Bob May doesn't do things with style.

The course included a history tour of helmet diving and its evolution onto scuba. Then down to the technical side and all indications were that this was not going to be as comfortable as the recreational sport diving that we do today. Formalities over it was time to suit up in these one size fits all diving dress. We had two different types of helmet for the course. The U.S. Navy Mk 5 helmet circa 1917, and a Japanese pearling helmet circa 1950. Each type of helmet having their own advantages and similarities except the Jap Helmet had an extra 25lbs of lead weight over and above the 60lb waist belt and 30lb lead shoes that you already had to wear....I was first so the decision was easy. I chose the lighter Mk 5 helmet. Getting suited up would have appealed to several absent committee members who are regular 'Whipme Beatme Niteclub' patrons. Being manhandled while climbing into a rubberised 'full body condom' suit, lubricated hands....and more... What have I got myself into ..? Insults and innuendo from my colleagues followed by the

customary photo session complete with the true divers beanie. Well I was already exhausted and I was still 15 feet from the bloody water! So this is what Briggs and May felt like prior to salvaging the Catterthun.

When the helmet was on we had diver to surface communication which could be just heard over the constant flow of air. Standing up with the full dress with the extra 120lbs I felt and looked like Robbie the Robot (Hollywood circa 1960) shuffle, shuffle, giant stride and into the water. Once in the water it took on a whole new aspect and apart from my hands I was totally dry which was not so bad, and overall it was almost comfortable. Vision out of the four windows was not bad either. After one or two minutes regulating your buoyancy everyone is an old time expert and off I went shuffling around the bottom. I suppose as far as the divesite was concerned this area was pretty shitty but not without it's own little gems like pygmy leather jackets, a blue ringed octopus and the wharf piles to rat around. 45 minutes passed in seemingly short time and it was time to return.

In summing up our nostalgic Helmet Fetish dive experience, although very cumbersome in and out of the water, it was something that I have always wanted to try and may even try again in the future and would recommend doing the course. After the course we considered the feats of Briggs and May working at the then record salvage depth of the Catterthun at 60 metres, obviously they were motivated by money and gold but having worn this type of outfit we know that they must have been absolutely crackers!!!!

# PS KOPUTAI - DOES IT REALLY EXIST?

We vowed to try one more time as we just had to find out if it was possible to do fin pivots at that depth carrying four tanks. And besides the sponges did look lovely on the reef down there, particularly if you changed back to air for a few breaths.

# Report From Scan Meeting Peter Flockart

On Wednesday 6 November several members from S.P.D. attended the SCAN meeting at the St George Rowing club. Also present were representatives from: Lo Tech Divers, DOUBTS, Ryde Underwater Group, St George and Underwater Research Group.

The nights agenda opened with the reading of the previous meeting's minutes. When queried as to why no meetings had been held since July it was because there was no quorum. The only business arising from these minutes was the discussion on Scans letter re Fish Rock Cave that was still be sent off. It is hoped that the letter will be sent to both the Fisheries Department as well as the minister for the Environment, Gabrielle Harrison, suggesting the area be designated as a Marine National Park.

It was decided to draft a letter and table it at the next meeting for evaluation by club representatives.

In general business, discussion was given over the eight page document tabled by John Chad. This paper was from a Rod Waski who is a community representative from the Port River Catchment Management Hacking Committee (PHRCMC for short). organsiation is proposing a management plan for Ship Rock and Port Hacking and is looking for comments from Scans in the hope of gaining further support for their plan. The plan makes interesting reading in that looks at the increasing pressures being placed on the Port Hacking area by both residents and visitors alike. Its major goal is to maintain and enhance the ecosystem and natural recreational attributes of the area. If you want to read further Leo B has copies of the paper available.

# **MAG UPDATE:-Scott Liemroth**

Magnetometer success! Well maybe.

The magnetometer has been used twice in the last few weeks in an area south of the Undola and we believe we may have found something. The first day it registered something and a GPS position was plotted however no diving could be done due to the rough seas. A few weeks later we took it to the same vicinity and it registered something again and a GPS position was plotted, again the seas prevented us from diving. Upon returning to shore to plot the area we had searched it was found, to our amazement, that the two GPS positions we had detected something on the two different days were only 30m apart. We are almost sure this is a wreck and have planned to meet on the Undola at 10am on Sun 24th Nov to dive this spot and see what it is. 
