DIVE REPORTS

SEVEN DAYS AND SEVEN DIVES ON THE CATTERTHUN By Martin Atkins

(continued) Dive number 6 we were not meant to do but did it anyway. Mark's wife had decided that he should spend a day with the family. This left just Geoff Howell and my self to dive. Firstly Geoff dropped a dive bucket in the surf loosing one of my dive computers. he then took 3/4 hour to find it again, the steering broke on the boat and I had to lash it back into place. Then when we were anchored up Geoff stood on and broke off a tap on a spare drum of fuel. I looked up with twin 95's on my back to see petrol pouring over the deck from a one inch hole where the tap had been. We had oxygen gear, regulators, masks, you name it, on the deck of the boat. I managed to roll the drum on its back stopping the flow and we eventually poured the remaining petrol into the main boat tank. Luckily none of the oxygen gear, regs or masks were contaminated but we were now slipping and sliding on the oily residue which petrol leaves. Not to mention the risk of fire or explosion. The Nautical definition of a boom is the noise made as a well insured dive boat turns into a liquid asset. An then there was the current, 2 knots today. Having anchored into the wreck it was immediately apparent that it was running much too strong to dive. We decided to give it a miss. We had to send someone down to unhook the anchor, and of course he couldn't go without a buddy could he?

At the end of this dive (see dive No.3 for details), after pulling the anchor from the wreck and dropping it clear in the sand, it caught on something solid well away from the main wreck out to the S/E, and now did we have to hang on against that current for the next 40 mins of decompression. Most uncomfortable!

Geoff s finance's surname is Wolfe. We all think that she should keep her surname and hyphenate Geoff s surname to it to become Wolfe-Howell. Any way Howl she did and Geoff went home leaving Mark "Got to eat", and myself for the dive on Thursday.

Thursday's specs. Divertime 59 mins., depth 59.2m., current 3 knots. Weather now turning threatening. The current was so strong on this

one that I was having real difficulty getting down the anchorline. Mark, who was right behind me, was in my wake and was able to get his head right up against my twins (Tanks!) and push me as I pulled. In this way we were able to traverse the 350 feet of anchor line I had out. As we came down over the wreck I was feeling quite warm and breathing so hard that the air started getting noticeably colder with each The air got colder and colder and colder due to the rapid rate of decompression from tank pressure to ambient due to workload and depth. 7ATA It felt like a cool cocktail on a summer evening and was actually quite refreshing It had taken 8 mins. and half a tank of air to reach the anchor, and after switching tanks and pulling out the anchor Mark and I started our final tour of the rear half of the wreck. We commenced our 40 mins of decompression to a rough sea.

Normally the boat lays bow in to the sea but because of the strong current it was now stern in. We would look up to see the words "Johnson 140" which are written on the side of the engine cowling, underwater and the next minute the whole engine prop. and all was out of the water and we were being pulled forward like crazy.

All this time things go through your mind about how much water the boat is taking on and whether it might sink or how much flotation it has and will it keep afloat if it's swamped. As it happened it didn't take on a drop but Mark said it was the most uncomfortable deco. he had ever done. He should have been there yesterday when the anchor caught on something, that was even worse.

So far during the trip the weather had been fantastic and now it was turning sour. Even though I still had one more day to dive, I told Mark that I was going to make the run north to Forster now. He suggested that I wait and see what the next morning brings but I said No. The weather had been too good for too long and I felt that something big might be on the way. So we put the boat back on the trailer at Forster that afternoon and towed it back to Seal Rocks for the last night. I was going to leave a day early. The next day the sea was up. It was much rougher than the day before and I towed

the boat through torrential rain storms as I went home arriving at 3pm on Friday 30th August. That was the start of one of the worst storms I can remember in years

BSAC NEWS by Adrienne Hill

As advised in the December wet rag, There will be BSAC Oxygen Administration course held soon, open to BSAC and other SPDC members. The course will be conducted by Barry Hallett The course will be over two evenings Tuesday and Wednesday 18th and 19th of March 1997. A small fee will be charged for BSAC members around \$20-25 which includes registration fee. A slightly less small fee of around \$40-50 will be levied for non-BSAC members. this money will go to South Pacific. For your efforts you will learn how to administer oxygen, and if a member of BSAC receive a certification. If not a letter can be supplied saying that you have completed a course etc. Either way, you will have developed the skills and knowledge about administering oxygen.

Other courses- the BSAC committee intends to draw up a training calender for the year to give all an idea of what is coming up. TECHNICAL DIVING BY THE CLUBS MOST ACCOMPLISHED TECHNICAL DIVER (or so he thinks)

FIGURING DECOMPRESSION ON THE FLY - By The Bubblebrain Diver (typists comments - could this also mean Airhead)

A large number of divers do decompression diving. In fact it could be said that every dive is a decompression dive some way i.e. we must ascend slowly or do safety stops. Most divers use computers in this modern age and with their advent there are many decompression divers who have no idea of the tables for their profile. Should their computer fail or, if using tables, they should overstay their bottom time, most divers would not know what decompression schedule to follow. Someone once told me they would simply stay on deco until their air ran out as this would be all they could do but that may take hours if they have a lot of gas and it seems a very hit and miss solution at best.

A recent discussion on the internet came up with this concept. It involves using the Fibonaci series for figuring deco on the fly.

The Fibonaci series is a series of numbers generated using a formula. It goes like this:

Start with any two numbers (typically 1 and 1, not 0 and 1, according to Webster). The next number in the series is the sum of the last two numbers:

N(1)=1

N(2)=2

N(3)=N(1)+N(2)=3

N(4)=N(2)+N(3)=5 etc etc

the formula is N(m)=N(m-2)+N(m-1)

To use this series for deco you would just have to know what the basic deco look like for different depths or what you like to do for deco.

For example on a 60m dive for 20 mins I would stop at 21m for 1 min then using the sequence I would get

60m 20 mins

21m 1 min

18m 2 mins

15m 3 mins

12m 5 mins

9 m 8 min

6 m 13 mins

3 m 21 mins

This is not far off the tables and a lot safer than most. Better still if you know the 6m stop for your time and depth you can use the formula to work forwards and backwards to work out other stops. You'll find it isn't too far off what most tables will give you. If you're not comfortable with it just pad it out a little and do some deep stops.

Another interesting peculiarity of this series is the ration of N(m-1)/N(m) converges very fast towards the number 0.618 regardless of the two original numbers. But we'll leave that one for the mathematicians here to think about...
