MARCH MAGNETOME TER UPDATE.

FASTFORWARD.

Do you want to record the action under water? Do you want to show what the rest are missing out on like the colour of the corals, varied underwater life and fabulous shipwrecks from another time? Then read on.

OK you want to buy a video camera, and you want to take it diving. There are a few decisions you will need to make when you are making an investment of this type. You want to make sure

that you are making the right decision before handing over your hard-earned dollars. Over the next months I will cover subjects like: Video format, Camcorders, Waterproof Housings, Lighting systems, and what do you want to do with the video.

VIDEO FORMAT

Choosing the right format is one of the first considerations when purchasing a new or upgrading an existing camcorder. The format you choose will determine the camcorder you end up with from physical size to the quality of the recording. Remember what camcorder you choose it will have to have an underwater housing. Physical size is a real consideration for both using the video underwater and travel, especially overseas travel

What formats are on the market:

Low Band- Not to get carried away with the technicalities, the quality of a video signal can be measured by what is called horizontal resolution (definition: the more horizontal lines the better the resolution). The lower band signal is called 'composite'. The two separate components in the video signal chroma and luminance are combined in the low band signal. VHS (VHS and VHS-C are identical 1/2 inch tape size) The VHS format is the one that you will be most familiar with. Full size VHS

will be most familiar with. Full size VHS cassette will house videotape offering a recording time up to five hours. For durability it is recommended that you use the shorter tapes in you camcorder e.g. E120 (2 hour).

What is a plus for the format, you can take the

What is a plus for the format, you can take the tape from the camcorder and put it straight into the home VCR. What the drawback is especially for under water application, is the large size of the cameras and the underwater housing that would be needed for the video camera.

<u>VHS-C:</u> The cassette is about one third of the size of a VHS cassette. This means that the camcorder is also much smaller. (That's better). Tape lengths are EC3O and EC4S (30 and 45 mins). To play the VHS-C cassette in your VCR you will need an adapter cassette this will allow the VHS-C tape to be played. You can also use the VHS-C camcorder as the VCR and connect straight to the TV.

<u>8 mm:</u> Where as the VHS format has been around for about 25 years the 8mm tape format is about 10 years old the cassette sizes are the

size of an audio cassette and the tape is about 1/4 inch in width. Tape lengths are from P30, P60, P90, P120 minutes (P stands for PAL, our TV system in Australia). The smaller cassette size means that the 8mm camcorder tends to be smaller than VHS-C camcorder

8mm tapes use a special formulation called "metal particle" (MP) that tends to give better image quality and colour rendition end definition.

Audio quality (mono) tends to be of a higher quality that VHS/-C. HiFi stereo recording is offered on some VHS & C camcorders this feature is also available on certain 8mm camcorders.

VHS and 8mm formats are incompatible and you need to use the 8mm camcorder as the play back machine with cables between the 8mm camcorder, VCR or TV and the signal is transferred via the RF or AV connections.

Want better quality? Then we will look at High-Band formats

Better picture quality can be provided by enhanced or high-band versions of the three standard formats - Super VHS, Super VHS-C and Hi8. The image quality is far superior and usually incorporates other features like HiFi sound coupled with the enhanced picture. We mentioned earlier about quantifying the quality of a video picture by its horizontal resolution.

High Band formats delivers 400 lines plus. A broadcast picture contains 300 line plus and low band formats are between 240 to 260 lines, (remember the more lines the better the picture). S-video is often called Y/C, which refers to the individual video signal components. "Y" for luminance and "C" for Chroma. An S-Video socket allows the signal components to be received separately, retaining picture quality.

Now lets look at compatibility between these formats.

S-video (VHS) recorded tape cannot be played in a normal VHS /VCR. An S-video tape recorded as VHS (low band) can. be played in a normal VHS VCR

To get the full potential of S-VHS you will need to play the tape in S-VHS VCR and a TV with S-video inputs. Playing the high band on a TV with only composite input (low band) will show some improvement of picture quality.

Remember to play 8mm formats you will need to use your camcorder or a specialised 8mm VCR connected to your TV. We will cover later the different options of VCRs on the market.

Now if you want even better quality and really blow your audience away, (and I mean that in the nicest possible way)

Lets go DIGITAL format.

A new format all together. The new format was released in December 1995 and exceeds S-VHS and Hi8 formats by some: 25 to 30% in terms of resolution. The new DV tapes are much smaller than 8mm and 'represent a new format all together. That word compatibility. These tapes are not compatible with any other format.

Tapes for the new camcorder (now there are cameras call Palmcorders, even smaller) and digital VCRs are DVM30ME, DVM60ME (30 & 60 minutes recording) and DV270ME for use in the digital VCR. Signal from the tape is in the order of 500 lines plus of horizontal resolution. ('ME' is the formulation used on the digital and well as Hi8 tapes - Metal Evaporated) The digital tapes employ high. picture output levels with low video and audio noise and excellent tape durability. The output of the camera is in digital format and is connected via what is called FireWire or IEEE-1394 socket which is the digital standard for the transfer of video images to a computer or other digital equipment like digital VCRs. The digital cameras and VCRs will also output in S-video or composite formats so they can be connected to VHS or S-VHS or 8mm VCRs or TVs.

What ever format is chosen the thing to remember always use the best quality tape in your camcorder. The quality of tape will directly affect the image and audio results. You see the difference when you edit and dub your videos. {Another story}

What Decision ??????

Choosing the right format for "YOU". This article may not have solved the problem, but I hope that you can make an informed decision, or at least generate more questions. The following articles will build the information that you use to get the whole picture and to make your choice.
