During the course of the weekend we took the chance to speak with and thank many of our club sponsors in person. When we spoke about the planned trade fair on the awards night things really did start happening.

The club was given yet another major prize by Mike Ball to be used as additional door prize, this prize and the trip to Western Samoa from PADI Travel Network gives us approx \$ 6000.00 worth of door prizes. Some major highlights of this trip will be a dive on the SS Quetta, which sank in the Mount Adolphus Channel, Torres Strait. This vessel sank in Feb 1890 with the loss of 133 souls. The next wreck dived on this trip will be HMS Pandora, which sank with the mutineers of the HMS Bounty on board August 1791. The remains HMS Pandora were located in 1997, what a dive this will be!!!!

After this you will visit Raine Island just off the Cape York Peninsula. You will see places like Lizard Is, Cape Tribulation, Cooktown and then the Flinders group on your way to Thursday Island. This trip must be one of the best trips on offer at this years awards night. Oh!! Did I forget to mention this prize is the first place prize in the raffle. So if you wish to go buy your raffle tickets on the night.

As a direct result of the exposure we had at Expo a major sponsor came forward with an offer to print a full colour souvenir brochure and sleeve. DIVE REPORTS

A Week In Borneo part 3

Our last day at Laylang Laylang has arrived, both Liam and I were up early to check out the seas, we had decided if the seas were up we would call a rest day. We were fairly gased up by this stage and were flying out the next morning. Other members of our group decided to do the first dive of the day. The dive boat returned extremely late, fearing the worst Liam and I waited anxiously at the wharf. We suspected what was wrong and were pleased to see all divers had returned. One diver was put on report, and was later sent to the "sin bin". The rest of our last day here was spent packing and just lying by the pool.

We left the next morning and flew back to Kota Kinabula. A tour and lunch was organised for us at the Pan Pacfic Hotel. This hotel was in the final stages of its construction, and was this a hotel or what. Walking through the front doors we were confronted with a lobby that would have been the size of a football field. Staff were everywhere, willing to attend to any request required of them. Every facility you require was here. Ladies only gym, men only gym, mixed gym, computer access, private office rooms, small conference rooms, medium conference rooms, huge conference massive ballroom. rooms. and a complete with hand painted murals on the walls. The grounds included an 18hole golf course, a man made beach, marina, and of course a huge pool, with a bar right in the middle of it. The grounds also had a sports club, facilities including more gyms, snooker room, cinemas, a chart room, childcare facility, complete with swings for the kids. By the way lunch here was as dazzling as the hotel.

Our flight to Kula Lumpur uneventful; our flight as to Melbourne. The service was excellent, I have become to expect this from Malaysian Airlines, but in transit in Melbourne we witnessed an ugly yank at his best. He was fortunately lucky enough to get back on the plane, but couldn't help himself, he belted an elderly passenger and was greeted by security on his arrival at Sydney.

DIVING THE BOMBO

Well the run of bad weather finally had to come to an end and let us get some decent diving in. Saturday the 30th of May turned out to be the day. Despite some cancellations due to the flu we had the better part of two boatloads at Wollongong harbour early in the morning. The first dive left at 8 o'clock in sunshine and flat seas. The water temperature was a pleasant 19 degrees and visibility 15-20 meters. New member Heinz Bendinger took his 8-mm movie camera along, so perhaps he

can give us a screening sometime. Interestingly, despite the number of divers who have pored over the Bombo over the years, one long time club member noticed a brass gauge still on the wreck. Unfortunately despite the cooperation of the weather the shipping traffic was less than helpful. The second dive was scheduled for the top of the tide and three ships decided to make this the time to move in or out of Port Kembla harbour. The result was an hours sitting around for the next dive crew while we waited for the shipping channel to clear. Still on the boat ride out we were entertained by a small biplane doing aerobatics overhead. We finally dropped our anchor in the wake of the last ship and got into the water. I had only dived the Bombo once since the stern was ripped off and rolled over last year, on a club dive, and, as those who were there will remember, the visibility that time was pretty poor. This time however the viz. was great, giving an excellent view over the reconstructed stern. Large numbers of fish were schooled over the wreck with a big school of pike around the mid sections, a school of trevally in the stern and the usual masses of nannygai inside. We also saw a large squid and a couple of large cuttles. There were plenty of cuttle eggs on the wreck, especially inside the boiler. Sarah and I spent most of our around the stern dive photographing the propeller, engine and boiler. It really is a much more interesting dive since the stern has been opened up. Even the exposed ribs give the impression of the skeletal remains of some ancient sea monster. So if you haven't dived the Bombo recently it is

certainly worth a look. If you would like to see it organized as a club dive again let me know.
