DIVE REPORTS

Night Dive at Shiprock 18th September

September's night dive at Shiprock turned out to be one of the best dives I have done at this site, and I have dived here dozens of times.

Nine divers made it on the night and we had nearly ideal conditions with warm air temperatures, little wind and very clear water. Being in the channel of the Port Hacking river, Shiprock can be prone to silty conditions but on this occasion the viz was great. Interestingly the number of sea pens seems to have increased in the shallow area of this dive. There were also several sea cucumbers with their tentacles extended feeding. The soft coral did not have its polyps open on this night. I don't know if this was because of the relative lack of particles in the water but there was no moon at the time of the dive. We did see plenty of decorator crabs, two of which were mating. Some divers also saw an anglerfish.

Our dive coincided with the top of the tide so we didn't have to contend with any strong currents. In the clear conditions the powerful torch beams of some of our companions could be seen well off along the wall.

If you haven't dived here before, or not in a while, it could be worth doing so soon. The water is still very clear without the summer plankton blooms and the amount of life at this site is probably the greatest of any spot in Sydney. It does need to be dived at slack tide however.

Give it a try sometime.

Sunday Double Dive 11th October.

Being the tale of a pleasant Sunday morning spent diving off Sydney Harbour.

On the Saturday prior it looked like there wouldn't be any diving at all. The southerly was blowing hard enough to blow a dog off a chain. Tom Byron rang me and told me the sad tale of their attempts to dive the Tuggerah that day. With the feeling that the effort was probably futile I strapped together Sarah's and my double tanks and put the camera in the housing ready for the planed dive. We'd made our plans to go out for lunch anyway so we may as well be ready in the unlikely event that the weather improved.

The unlikely happened. Sunday dawned clear and calm. The 6:00 am surf report said the seas were low so we headed off to the Spit to meet our boat. It was a small group that headed around south head for the first dive on the Annie M. Miller. There was no swell to speak of but the day before's wind had left behind a sloppy sea. After picking the anchor in on the second try we headed down the line in very clear viz.

Unfortunately once we got below 30 metres the viz was more like 5 metres, making things a little dark on the bottom. The darkness lent a bit of atmosphere to the wreck however, making it seem more grave like.

At least there wasn't much current. The anchor was positioned close to the stern, caught in a large mass of fishing net that covered the area. The engine and boiler are exposed and towards the bow there is a very nice area of exposed ribs sticking up above the more collapsed centre section

Peter Flockart had discovered a small Wobby caught in the fishing net and had cut the unfortunate shark free, although with the amount of netting on the wreck it will probably end up re-entangled.

Bottom time up, we unhooked the anchor and dropped it in the sand before spending our obligatory half-hour hanging around under the boat. There were a large number of salps and other plankton floating past, which gave us something else to look at apart from each other.

Back on the boat our companions took turns following the boat skipper's example in donating their breakfast to the fishes while we re-anchored under the cliffs at the place of the Durbar's demise. The water here was very clear with the bottom clearly visible 15 metres below. Conditions were a little surgy to be grovelling in holes on the bottom so Sarah and I cruised around over the reef top enjoying the vista. Hearing Sarah yelling into her reg, I looked up to see a huge school of tailor circle her in mid water. There were a lot of fish in the area including a large school of squid and plenty of luderick in the shallows.

All in all the dives were a very enjoyable way to kick off a laid back Sunday.

PHOTOGRAPHIC NOTES

MACRO TUBES AND FRAMERS.

Last month I talked about close-up lens this month I will explain Macro tubes and framers.

A macro extension tube fits between the lens and the body while the frame projects out from the lens. By using one or a combination thereof the photographer increases the magnification of the subject being viewed.

For a reproduction ratio of 1:1, the extension tube has to be twice the focal length (the distance between the primary point of focus and the film corresponds to the focal length). This is the case for a 35mm lens on land using a 35mm extension tube. However once underwater the apparent focal length of the lens increases by a factor of 1.33. This is because while objects appear further away underwater the magnification ratio stays the same. There are several makes available on the market, Nikon, AquaSea and gates to name a few. In order to prevent one forgetting the settings used with these tubes print them out onto Dymo tape and stick them on.

Examples are:

1:2 + 35mm lens using ASA 100 f22

1:2 + 35mm lens using ASA 50 f16

1:1 + 35mm lens using ASA 100 f16

etc

You will need to experiment with the settings as some animals and backgrounds can be more or less reflective.

For a better idea on settings see page 284 of The Manual of Underwater Photography by H.Gert de Couet and Andrew Green

In order to test the alignment of your framers fill a tub with water and place a piece of grided paper at the bottom and take several frames Once corrected you can shoot perfect pictures.

There a re a couple of methods you can use to align your shots:

Gun sight – over the top of your camera

Sideways – cut one framer off slightly and use it to set up the shots

Or point and run (not the most effective but sometimes, especially in current situations it's the only thing you can do)

A final point "When using close-up equipment, the depth of field is equally distributed in front of and behind the plane of focus"


