DIVE REPORTS

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE & AORE RESORT.

The family and I have just come back from Santo. I had dived the President Coolidge before in 1990 but I always wanted to go back and do some more adventurous dives.

We left Wollongong on the morning 16th October to get to the airport, only to be told when we got there that the plane had been delayed due to a major breakdown in Brisbane. We spent the next 36 hours in a hotel courtesy of Oantas.

We arrived in Vila at 1.30 am and Santo at

11.30am the following day. We were booked in at a new resort on Aore Island 3km from Luganville across the channel. Unknown to me there was a lot of ex SPD members staying at the Deco-Stop. However if you are going with your family I can't recommend the Aore resort enough.

Aquamarine picks you up at 8.30am and 2.30pm for dives. You can get a variation on the Henry Boneaud, Reef dives, Shark dives and of course the Coolidge.

I did 9 dives on the Coolidge, including the engine room twice and the galley deep inside the wreck at 55 metres.

Aore resort has bungalow or fare accommodation but only one place to there. You can get the punt across to the mainland for dinner in the evening at a cost of 2000vatu return (\$A26.00).

Things have changed a lot diving wise; the guides all use twin tanks with technical B/C's and there is 50/50 nitrox available as a deco gas. The latter makes it lot safer. There are also long ocky hoses of up to 8.

PHOTOGRAPHIC NOTES

FILMS FOR CLOSE-UPS AND SOME TIPS ON LIGHTING.

As the distance between camera and subject is only a matter of some 1 to 9" the photographer is able to utilise small f stops and as result of this is able to use slower film speeds. This means that the images produced are of a higher sharpness and resolution.

There are several films and brands available on the market that covers these requirements. For example Fuji, Kodak and Agfa all produce slow speed films. However it is mainly Fuji and Kodak that are used in Australia.

Kodak makes ASA 25, 50 and 64 films. The ASA 64 has been discontinued as an amateur film and is now only available as professional film outlets. This and ASA 50 are Ektachrome films, meaning they can be processed at any lab. The ASA 25 is Kodachrome and can only be processed by Kodak and some selected companies in Australia. (check in your camera

mags to see who in your capital city processes Kodachrome).

Fuji produces an ASA 50 or Velvia, which is best for this type of photography.

All these films give good colour saturation and sharpness on images photographed. Which film is best for your needs is up to you.

The f-stops used in Macro photography generally range between f/16 and f/22. However depending on the camera used and the reflectivity or lack of it may require the photographer to use f/11 to f32.

Example:

For a white nudibranch on sand a photographer using ASA 50 Velvia and a Nikonos with a 1:2 macro tube may instead of using f16 at infinity, decide to use f/22 to reduce the amount of light that will reach the film plane, or change the angle of the strobe.

LIGHTING

A properly lit macro subject is difficult as the camera/subject is small and the positioning of bulky strobes is difficult. Many people use two small strobes or one and a slave to produce even lighting in their subjects. If this is not an option then the careful positioning of one and the use of a diffuser can at least minimise the shadows in your macro shots.

Ideally to produce a soft overall light one could use a ring flash. Unfortunately no one produces one that can be used underwater as yet. However with some inventiveness a land based model could be adapted to housing.

It is also possible to use TTL strobes for macro work as it provides reliable and accurate exposures. This could also compensate for some manual errors that may arise on for example a highly reflective background.

ARTICLE OF INTEREST

Rebreathers currently seem to be a topic for discussion among divers and in the diving press. Their popularity in other countries is significant and on the increase and their use by Australian divers, although still small, is clearly growing. Although this technology is not new it is becoming more prevalent due to availability and the increase in the 'technical' diving market.

As with any new technology, understanding and awareness, usually in the form of standards or modes of acceptable practice, take a while to catch up with popular use. Understanding is the first step to awareness with regards to safety issues and rebreathers.

Perhaps the most important point is that rebreathers, although technically Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus (SCUBA), are totally unlike common open circuit scuba where gas of a fixed oxygen percentage is inspired and exhaled directly to the water. The oxygen content of the gas you breathe is not changed except by the pressure of depth.

In rebreathers, because the gas is rebreathed, the oxygen content can change. It can rise due to adding more oxygen, or fall by failing to add oxygen to replace that which is metabolised by your body. In either case there is a potential for a dangerous level (high or low) which is not inherent in normal open circuit scuba. Add to this the increased danger of CO2 build up, which can occur with the failure of the CO2 scrubber found in all rebreathers, and it is clear that these two modes of diving are very different.

A few points to consider could be:

- 1) Always carry adequate open circuit bail out. This cannot be stressed enough as the time you need it and don't have it only happens once.
- 2) Always know your PO2 the level of oxygen you are breathing. (oxygen sensors are commonly used)

- 3) Always be fastidious with recommended checks and maintenance. Many equipment failures can be avoided through proper care. Failure to do loop integrity checks can lead to failure of the breathing loop through leaks and flooding. Failure to check mouthpiece one-way valves (the only two moving parts in the breathing loop) can lead to hypercapnia (CO2 build up). Failure to check gas supply and addition can lead to dangerous oxygen levels both high and low. A thorough log needs to be kept of the usage, or running hours, of the CO2 scrubbing material, the batteries that may be required for the electronics and the oxygen sensors if these are used.
- 4) It is important to receive proper manufacturer recognised training and also to supplement that training with additional 'home study' and information on the design, or type of rebreather being used (there are many different types) and it's idiosyncrasies.

Finally, the fact rebreather use is growing, particularly in the areas of scientific research and filming, is testimony to their usefulness in many diving situations. If they are used in an informed manner they can provide great benefits, but uninformed or careless use of this mode of diving apparatus can be extremely dangerous.


