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

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MOLA MOLA WITH BANNER FISH

Breakfast smells drifted from the kitchen as we entered the water, it was something to look forward to later. The water was warm, 29C, a slight current flowed through our legs as we geared up. It was flowing in the wrong direction so I hoped it was ending not just beginning.

We drifted with the current until our marks lined up, then descended quickly to the steeply sloping sand bottom. Now the current was stronger, and across our direction of travel, making swimming down the ridge more difficult. At 100 feet, (30 metres) my vision was blurred as I swam into a thermo cline, clearing only when I had entered the colder water on the lower side, the current ceased which made the cold water on my lycra suit more bearable.


Our navigation had been spot on, two large white anemonies materialised on top of the sand ridge. Around them the bottom life was lush, barrel sponges, sea whips, soft corals and a myriad of fish. Despite all of this beauty, I was filled with disappointment, as the creature which was the purpose of this dive was not in attendance. Rather than waste all the effort we had consumed to get to this depth, I quickly framed up the gorgonian and took a light reading on the background. I took two frames and turned down the slope. I could not believe what I saw. They did exist, a sighting few days earlier by another photographer but none since, despite his daily visits to this location had us keen to dive this site. We had deferred doing however until the discoverer had his opportunities and had gone home, (well almost, he will leave today for the airport), as we didn't want to disturb his potential photos.

Ten feet (3 metres) from me hung a Mola Mola, head towards the surface, fins outstretched, being cleaned by a large school of banner fish, Heniochus diphreutes. This was why we were here! This was the ultimate cleaning station, one for the "big boys". Cleaning stations are common for smaller fish where cleaner shrimp and wrasse remove the parasites, dead tissue and other

unwanted bits from the smaller fish. Who grooms the big fish? It appears that in this location the big fish are cleaned by a school of banner fish I turned and looked back down the slope to the banner fish, they were still there, cleaning two more Mola Mola which I hadn't noticed!!!

Despite the excitement, reality told me to check all of my life support systems first, 180 ft, decompression requirement not too severe, air, not brilliant but manageable. I moved closer, the original Mola Mola had come into the group, I checked the strobe positions and began to shoot. Frame after frame, vertical, horizontal, closer, they remained, but I was out of time. Air was fast moving into the not manageable region of my gauge, so I began the long haul up the slope. The warm water and the current hit at the same time and despite the effort the quickest way to the shallow water was across the current not with it.

The photos are still to be processed but the experience is one that will forever remain imprinted on my mind.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

From the book: History of Spearfishing and Scuba Diving in Australia. The first 80 Years 1917 to 1997

1959

For the first time in Australia, training began under the Guidance of ex-RAN frogman Wally Reynolds. The object was to free dive to a depth of 100 feet (30 metres). Reynolds said it had been done before, overseas, but not in Australia. Many divers thought it was suicide.

Ben Cropp's was the first Australian spearfisherman to compete in the World Spearfishing Championships. They were held in Malta and Ben Cropp placing was 9th over all. He was a one man team from Australia. Heron Island on the Great Barrier Reef held its first Annual Underwater Convention in November 1959, and has held the same event every year since then.

The Shaft, a giant sink hole at Mt Gambier, was explored by scuba divers for the first time during mid 1959.

Australian made "Porpoise" regulators were sold to an ever increasing number of divers in this country and exported overseas.

The Underwater Skindiver's and Fishermen's Association (USFA) affiliates with CMAS the world body for divers.

Edward du Cros wrote the first Australian book about the early history of skindiving in New South Wales.

In the early 1960's hundreds ot underwater fishermen and scuba divers started to take out fishing licences to collect abalone, and the great rush was on to harvest this tasty shellfish for the overseas market. Popular areas were Eden in New South Wales, Mallacoota and Warnambool in Victoria, Port Lincoln and Streaky Bay in South Australia and also around the Tasmanian coast and Bass Strait Islands.
