

Our first dive was The Arch, an unusual rock structure that was discovered more than 37 years ago by a group of local divers. I was invited to dive the location a couple of weeks after its discovery. The Arch ceiling was covered with millions of colourful anomonies, however as the dive location became a popular site, expelled air from regulators slowly killed any growth that existed on the rock arch ceiling.

Steve and Simon saw it for the first time a couple of weeks ago and the dive location blew their mind away. It was a perfect day, warm water, flat seas and visibility almost unlimited. To add to the excitement we were accompanied by a couple of seals throughout the dive.

During the afternoon seas became smoother and our next dive was at Bowen Island at a dive site named East Bowen Wall

For fixed growth, fish life and reef structure this dive site is one of the best on the eastern side of the island. Once again the water was warm, clear and alive with fish life and fixed growth.

The drop off is a buzz, the reef beyond covered in all sorts of growth, there are small valleys, caves and swimthroughs, add to a wonderful days outing.

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LEAVING BOTANY BAY

It has always given me great joy, due to my mum's birthday; I was given the weekend off and this weekend the weather was perfect for a dive or two. I am at the moment building a block of units with a view of Sydney Harbour out toward the heads, so for five days a week I watch boats plying their trade up and down this great waterway. During the week the sea seemed to get flatter with each passing day So when the chance came to go for a dive this Sunday I jumped at it, we were looking at doing two dives leaving from Botany Bay to the sponge gardens at Henry Head and a second dive to a real favorite of mine the wreck of Malabar. I started to ring a few people as we still had room on the boat I rang our esteemed editor [AGAIN] to see if he wished to join us and he was not able to as he was going to be away again to Jervis Bay. Well I guess that's how the other half live and after all I thought how can you compare Jervis Bay to Botany Bay? That's what I though anyway but this turned out to be one of the best dives I have had in Sydney for many years.

As I waited on Sunday morning at the small beach near Bare Island I noticed how cold the wind was and it seemed choppy out on the bay how many times does this happen perfect all week and at the weekend, well that's how it goes. Even the sun seemed to be late turning up then low and behold the sun came out, the wind dropped and boat turned up. As Bob motored slowly toward the beach I looked to see who was onboard and could not see too many divers, only Bob the skipper and John and with myself a total of three. After placing my gear onboard we three brave merry men set out for Henrys Head as we headed over the smooth water we passed Bare Island to our left with its normal amount of divers and the mandatory dive school.

One of the best dive sites in the area was waiting for us and it looked to be free of any other dive boats. As we slowed the boat down to line up the dive marks we saw much to our dismay that the water was green. We held a quick onboard conference and headed for the south side of the bay. We were pleased to see upon reaching the other side clear blue water! We set course towards Cape Bailey Light, it was at this point due to only having the three of us onboard we decided to switch on the depth sounder and see what the bottom contour looks like and boy did we get lucky.

As we moved towards the Black Streak dive site the reef, which was still a fair distance away to the south, noticed the bottom jump straight up from 22 to 15 metres, we then turned around and motored back the other way.

Anchoring over the drop off we noticed the water was crystal clear.

As we geared up I noticed the mermaid line was still lying in the same spot, we had no surface current.

John was first to entre the water, I followed him a short time later and as I descended the line could see John on the bottom about 18 metres away and a huge school of fish that almost obscured the sea floor.

As I reached the bottom I was in awe of this reef that seemed to be running parallel to the coastline. I swam

toward the wall and started to peer into the small cave and overhangs, which seem to be everywhere. It was at this point I noticed John calling me to come and look at something that was on a sea fan, he pointed to some Sea Fleas, there were no less that five. None of us had a camera

At this point I started to swim north along the wall all I can say it was fish city, as you looked under ledges and overhangs nannygai were everywhere. In dark recesses, caves and small valleys were all chock-a-block with fish life.

To the south the wall line was similar to the north, so I followed the drop off which was as good or better than the north section. My air was now running a little low so I followed Bob's comeback line to the anchor. As I ascended the anchor line I could see the reef fading away in each direction and clouds of fish that hung in the clear water above the dive site.

This is the best reef I have dived in the last 20 years so close to Sydney.

The first competition will commence next year.


