South Pacific Divers "Slay-it at Seal Rocks"

A story from the past

A hastily organised trip to Seal Rocks paid off for the 7 Club members who attended on the 25th and 26th of March 1995. The prime objective was to dive the S S Catterthun, a 300 foot long steamer which sunk on the 8 August 1895 (almost 100 years ago), and now rests upright on the sand at a depth of 190 to 200 feet. The secondary objectives were to dive with the famous Seal Rocks Sharks or the wreck of the Satara.

All week phone calls to Seal Rocks told of dream like calm seas, 22 degree water, no current and great visibility. Our hopes and expectations were somewhat dashed when on Friday the bureau forecast bad weather and rising seas on the weekend. Arriving at Seal Rocks about 10pm we could clearly see that the sea was dead calm and there was not a breath of breeze.

We settled into our rented unit looking over beach No 1 with the usual lack of maturity normally associated with a school camp, then followed by two hours of intensive dive gear and camera set-up and preparation. A bucket of water became our "wishing well" with the twist tops from a few beers which were almost praying for perfect conditions. Our prayers must have been incorrectly mailed because about 4.30am I awoke to a light breeze from the south. By 6am it had freshened and although Seal Rocks Beach was "mill pond" smooth off shore was blowing at 20 knots plus. Like fools we geared up, 6 divers with twin tanks, twin regs, cameras, videos in two local fishing boats and off we went. Well we should have stayed in bed as the seas had risen to mountainous proportions making 50 minutes of deco a death trap. At this point it was cruel to hear Steve, our captain, say the words that peeve divers the most. 'YOU SHOULD HAVE COME HERE LAST WEEK. IT WAS PERFECT!"

Scott and Rebecca on the second boat weren't as close to suicide as us and dived a reef to the North in the lee of the swell. Yes its a true story - Scott LEIMROTH went REEF DIVING On their return boasted how good the dive was but the damage had already been done for the day and depression had set in. The only one thing to do to salvage the day was go to Forster and EAT. With the best calamari, fish and chips in town we dined on the wharf and then in another childish public display JF and I commenced feeding seagulls above each other with the obvious result, Yes that's right, poor innocent Nela, was shit on.... We thought it was hilarious... Nela didn't...

Late Saturday the weather was abating and we again planned to dive the CATTERTHUN. By early morning the weather was acceptable but there was only 2 takers. Soon after there was 4 for the CATTERTHUN and 3 for the sharks,

Steve hooked up the anchor on the second pass, deco ladders, mermaids, and hang tanks soon set up and JF and I set off. At 70 feet down the wreck could be clearly seen below. We were "picked in" rear of the engine, viz was superb and equivalent to late afternoon light with absolutely no current. JF took his video and commenced filming as we explored towards the bow. The wreck is quite open having collapsed leaving the engine, boiler and large winches prominent. Amongst the steel plating and lumps of coal the wreck is covered with bottles, small fittings, crockery and piles of sheet aluminium. Towards the starboard bow area is a very large pile of animal bones and many bottles some still full can be seen. I saw very little in the way of fish life that make this a fishing Mecca. Narcosis made the 20 minute bottomtime pass in a hazy flash and we were soon ascending away from the best dive I've had in years. Tethered off to the deco ladders JF and I passed the fifty minutes of deco with a game of boxes. Scott and Rebecca soon joined us and claimed that while on the wreck that they heard a Killer Whale! At 200 feet narcosis does odd things.

Back aboard our boat it was difficult to get a word in with all having oneupmanship tales (and the rehash of the Whale Tale...!) after a great dive. We absolutely slayed it and now with Steve our local contact supplying boats as required, diving at Seal Rocks and the wrecks of the CATTERTHUN, SATARA (and some other wrecksites) and the sharks will become far more regular.

What Clothes To Pack

Just now I've returned from my trip to Vanuatu. Two weeks of blissful diving. That was my twentieth overseas diving trip. So I think I have it down to a science on how to pack and what to bring when doing a dive holiday.

The key word when packing is "MINIMAL". Bring only the bare necessities, anything more is a waste unless you like dragging luggage through the airport! If the dive resort or live-aboard is your only stop on your vacation, these are some tips of what to bring.

Clothes, who needs clothes! Tee shirts, shorts and swimsuits. That's it! At a dive-resort, that is pretty much the dress code. Since you are diving so much, why bring anything else. If I bring long pants, I usually wear them on the plane although it is good to put a change of clothes in your carry-on. This way you can change into something cooler before you get off the plane. The long pants should be of a light material as you can wear them at evening in Malaria infected areas for protection. Sandals, thongs or surf shoes are good for walking around the resort or boat, but if you plan to do some land tours, bring socks, hiking shoes or runners. Be prepared for that sudden rainstorm, a poncho, light raincoat is a good thing to bring. And do not forget your hat and sunglasses. The sun in the topics can burn you to a crisp!

Speaking of sunburn, here are some extra things that are good to bring:

Sunblock – In some of these places the sun is strong. You don't want to get sunburned after your second day! Panadol – Pain relief is a good thing.

nothing but my helmet. My suit and gear were tied to the bell.


