

Rebreather Convert

Back in September 2001, I successfully completed a 'TDI

Australia & New Zealand' ATLANTIS 1/DOLPHIN SEMI-CLOSED REBREATHER course kindly donated as a prize to the Jervis Bay 2001 Photographic Shoot Out by Gordon Harris of SCUBA ADVENTURES at Port Macquarie.

Gordon was my instructor and (at the risk of over praise) he really impressed me with his enthusiasm, knowledge, teaching skills, dedication to the sport and sense of humour.

He's the type of bloke that all the guys want to shake his hand and all the gals want to kiss him (or is it the other way around?)

and all the gals want to kiss him (or is it the other way around?) Our four ocean dives were with John Duggan of ACTION DIVERS at Tuncurry, another guy who runs a very professional service and also a guy whose hand you would like to shake or to kiss him depending on your gender or your inclinations. Anyhow, to the course.

Prerequisites of the course were Nitrox qualifications and a recent dive medical. Fortunately there are units for hire and for the short term I will be looking into this.

Journey to Pulau Aur

Last August Terese and I decided to visit friends of ours in Singapore, Jerry and Veronica. Jerry for a short time was a South Pacific club member until he was transferred to Jakarta and then Singapore in the early nineties.

After a few days of sightseeing in Singapore, we got onto a bus leaving from Newton Circus, to begin a trip to an island off the east coast of Malaysia called Pulau Aur. The bus left at six o'clock Friday night, a few miles down the road we had to go through the Malaysian Customs. We were made to go through twice because an official turned up and wanted to see how things were running, then one of our group had too much alcohol – all our bags were then sent back and thoroughly searched and our passports reinspected – this was the beginning of a very long night.

Our coach travelled from the customs border checkpoint and travelled about 60km an hour.. We arrived at our next transfer at a fishing village called Mersing, it was now midnight and raining. Because of the low tide we hopped onto long boats (without our luggage) and were then taken out of the river and transferred to what I can only describe as a 60ft long refugee boat. Inside the boat were two long racks with foam laid out on them; this was where approximately sixty of us had to sleep for the next four hours. The smell inside was of a diesel/salt mix, and body odour. I made sure that Terese and I stayed close to the rear door - if this thing was going to sink I wanted to be able to get out of there quickly I was thinking to myself "I am too old for this, but what an adventure!"

We safely arrived at our island 4.30am as the sun was just showing its rays over the horizon. What a sight, Pulau Aur, tropical island paradise jutting out of the South China Sea.

We climbed onto the jetty and were Divers Lodge and told first dive in instead, the sun had finally come the coral reef and that brilliant pink and it's only Saturday morning.

This took ten minutes as the islands are really only palm tree covered rocks sticking out of the ocean. The dive briefing was very professional and we were made to introduce ourselves around. By the end of the day we would all be friends.

It's been a long time since I have worn a light wet suit and I liked it. Down the anchor rope to a depth of fifteen metres, it wasn't as clear as I thought it would be from the surface but still had ten-metre visibility. The bottom was a combination of granite rock and coral, plenty of parrot fish, other pelagic fish and clown fish. I have never seen so many clown fish in one place in my life, and they were very colourful, different somehow. Even the parrot fish were like no other I have ever seen before; I was then regretting not bringing a full camera kit.

We did another boat dive just before lunch at another part of the island, still just as beautiful, more clown fish and a couple of black tip sharks. The diving was just great. Two more dives after lunch and a night dive.

The night dive was uneventful but Jerry found a lot of crayfish, also sea hares and coral shrimp, it was a nice dive but after forty minutes going in one line I thought it was about time that the dive master turned back towards the boat, we just kept going. I was getting concerned here and so was Jerry. I decided to ascend and to have a look; I took my time and when I surfaced I sighted about three fishing boats. I can't tell you what was going through my mind. Censored! Here I am

swimming around in the South China Seas with

fishing boats all around. The dive master came up, gave a signal with his torch and one of the boats came over and picked us up. That's how they do it. It wasn't so bad after all.



When we got back to the resort a bar-b-q and smorgasbord was waiting for us and the party was about to begin. Dinner was excellent; as usual the food was full of oriental spices. Chicken, pork, seafood and salads. Anthony brought out the wine. He had got it though Customs somehow. We proceeded to have a riotous good night.

The next morning I thought I had the bends; I am not going to admit to a *hangover*. The boat did another two dives before we departed for home. Pulau Aur is only operated on weekends and the Singaporeans put a

Team Work Effects Rescue

Two exhausted scuba divers found after disappearing in rough seas off the Queensland coast are lucky to be alive, rescuers said.

The divers, a couple in their mid-twenties, were spotted in choppy conditions almost two hours after being reported missing while diving at Flinders Reef, northeast of Brisbane.

They were being swept out to sea by the outgoing tide when a Queensland Government rescue helicopter spotted them about three nautical miles east of their original position.

An air and sea search was mounted for the pair just after midday when they failed to return to their boat during a Pro Dive outing to the Aarhus shipwreck, north-east of Cape Moreton.

Queensland Rescue air crewman Greg Beer said the helicopter dropped a smoke flare as a guide for the dive boat to make the rescue.

Mr Beer said the divers, both locals, were extremely lucky to have been spotted six nautical miles offshore.

"It's a long swim in. It was highly unlikely they would have made it to land," he told AAP.

"They were floating out to sea. There was an outgoing tide.
"It was choppy which made spotting quite hard, with a lot of white caps."

Senior Constable Andrew Gale, of the Queensland Water Police, said the divers were unhurt but exhausted from their ordeal.

"There are a lot of very strong currents in combination with heavy sea conditions and strong winds," he said.

Pro Dive owner Steve Hills said the man and woman were certified divers.

He said both divers had been issued with safety devices to be used to signal the boat if they became lost.

"The story they tell us is that they lost those ... and they were unable to signal the boat," Mr Hills said.

He said an emergency plan was activated when the divers failed to surface from the dive.

"We've contacted Workplace Health and Safety. The diving inspector there said the emergency procedures that we have in place worked effectively," Mr Hills said.
