

# A Dive in McCavity Cave

The air in the cave is cool but I am sweating. The exertion of crawling through to the Telephone Booth, clad in a rubber wetsuit, is only part of the reason. Anxiety, this being the first dive of the trip, has my heart rate thumping as I check each piece of equipment one last time.

Two people in any telephone booth is a crowd, this aptly named cave chamber is no exception. Squeezed together, an assistant is needed to help each diver with equipment, then into the Birth Canal, a tight flooded conduit leading to McCavity cave below. I breath deeply to regain my calm, as I prepare to dive.

Air from the surface supplied regulator tastes different from the musty cave air, I clench it tightly with my teeth to prevent it being knocked from my mouth as I pass through the restriction. With my arms over my head gripping a safety rope, I wriggle into the Birth Canal. Cooling water seeps up into my wetsuit, my face slips beneath the swirling, orange, muddy water, psychedelically lit by my helmet mounted lights. I wriggle



on. I can feel my fins emerging from the bottom of the Birth Canal into the clear waters of the main chamber, my body and mind settle, I am through.

Cave Diving is dangerous. For the foolhardy, the untrained and the inexperienced, entering a water-filled cave is a death wish. Between 1969 and 1974 eleven people died in water-filled caves in Australia. Some of those who have died were scuba diving instructors, skilled diving teachers but not trained in special dangers and techniques required to safely penetrate a water filled cave.

Very specialised training is available through the Cave Divers Association of Australia (CDAA). Progressing through the CDAA's four training levels from the basic techniques of Cavern Level to the exploration extreme of Penetration level is not for the faint hearted. Each level is exponentially more difficult and stressful, divers must refine their skills diving in caves for months sometimes even years before presenting for the next course.

Techniques are important but when it all goes wrong, knowing panic is not going to cloud these well learned procedures is the difference between life and death.

Experiencing personal endurance levels is simulated in controlled conditions during the courses. Students spend hours in cold, dirty water, navigating along a guide line only by the feel of the line on their fingers, as the face masks they wear for training have black glass. They have the regulator though which life giving air is supplied removed without warning, forcing them to locate their buddy and share their air supply. Most traumatic of all, they are tangled in the very item in which they should have absolute faith, the guide line.

Pushing the students close to panic is achieved by task loading, creating situations where all of these incidents happen simultaneously as could happen in a real cave.

For some, the experience can be horrendous but dying must be worse. Since this training began in 1973, only two divers have died, they were untrained.



With my underwater light extinguished I am engulfed total and absolute Turning it on, darkness. the pencil thin beam penetrates the gin clear water revealing cream coloured limestone passage. From the roof cling earthen coloured stalactites and shawls. Speleothems (cave decoration) which indicate McCavity was once a dry cave. Speleothems can only develop in air not underwater, so in the world of caves, McCavity is rare,

no other decorated water filled caves exist in Australia and there few others around the world.

Beneath me the floor is silt, smooth and soft like grey velvet, until a misplaced fin stroke swirls it's deadly choking particles into the water, reducing the visibility to zero. I avoid the floor, choosing instead to following the guideline which has been previously laid along the centre of the passage. I enjoy the beauty of McCavity's speleothems and it's gin clear waters.

Cave divers enter flooded subterrainian passages for many different reasons. With few places left unexplored on this planet, water filled caves still provide a real avenue for exploration. During the past twelve months, one Australian Cave explorer and his team have discovered 4000 metres of new cave passage in the Nullarbor and North Western Australia. At Jenolan Caves, west of Sydney, cave diving is being used by Sydney University Speleological



Society (SUSS) to link the northern and southern cave systems hoping to reveal the longest cave system in Australia. The excitement of going where no one has ever been, not knowing what discovery awaits passed the next restriction, of being first, is an instinct known since primeval times.

A water- filled cave is one of the most hostile places on earth, no light, no air, therefore no life.....wrong. Caves are also a place of exploration for the scientific community, whole new forms of life are there to be found.

A small "centipede - like" crustacean was found in McCavity, this previously undescribed species lives it's whole life in total darkness. It has no skin pigmentation nor any eyes. Yet it scurried around, adapted to it's world on the floor of the cave, feeding on microscopic isopods among the silt particles.

A species of bacteria has been found in a cave in

Western Australia which feeds and lives in the sulphurous layer created by the mixing zone of fresh and salt waters which exist with in the cave. These rare finds excite scientists as they are dealing with new species whose behaviour is unlike any previously known life forms. Caves have become a living laboratory to learn from these colonies.

Moving along the main passage my light reflects from an air pocket in the ceiling, as bubbles from my regulator disturb it, it quivers like Quick Silver floating on he surface of the water. In a small alcove, a formation of Stalactites and Stalagmites give the impression of a dragon's jaw filled with vicious teeth. Near the ceiling, in the zone where the water level fluctuates, grow the delicate, chaotic, Helictites, Calcium crystal straws which defy gravity, growing like thick tangled vines. Ahead hangs the icon decoration for McCavity Cave, Rapunzel's Trusses, a drapery covered, broken column, ten metres high and three metres in diameter, surrounded by smaller Stalactites.

Light sources within the cave are very directional and continually moving, the play of light and shadow on these carved stone structures is mesmerising. As a photographer this is what I enjoy and try to capture on film.

Cave diving by nature is an adrenalin pursuit, however along with Adrenalin, body movement and levels of fear must be controlled to safely execute a cave dive. Cave diving equipment is heavy and doesn't magically appear at the dive site, it must be dragged, lowered, lifted and hauled through dry passage. Cave divers need a high level of both mental and physical fitness, a reflexive knowledge of their equipment positions and calculated reactions to dangerous situations, all of these traits only comes with experience.

There are no accidents when cave diving, only fatalities, but when executed correctly by properly trained divers, the rewards, the sense of achievement, the discoveries and the fun justify the accepted and calculated risks.


