





transfers a sealed sperm package to a pouch beneath the female's mouth with one of his arms. The female then moves to a suitable area and removes the egg from herself and passes it over her sperm-filled pouch finally securing it under a rock. These eggs then hang there in a rubbery state. There is a little embryo within and then a lot of white stuff for protection. As the embryo develops the little cuttlefish starts growing on one side of the egg, it sucks on the yolk, the yolk gets smaller, the cuttlefish gets bigger, after four months the new Cuttlefish pops out!

While we were in Whyalla we were fortunate enough to meet with a marine scientist who had traveled to Whyalla for the fourth year running to study these Cephalopods. The scientist commented that Whyalla was the only place in the world, that he is aware of, where the Giant Cuttlefish aggregate in such large numbers. Pretty mind blowing when you think about it.

While in town getting air fills one day we noticed a promising cafe. Cappuccino, We sat and spoke with the owner while savoring our coffee telling her our reason for visiting Whyalla. She was very interested and mentioned that her partner was a Cuttlefish fisherman. She then suggested we may like to meet with him to hear his side of side of the story. This was a great opportunity not to be missed. Next morning we met the fisherman at his boat and we invited ourselves onboard for the day's fishing.

First stop on the way to the Cuttlefish was a visit to one of the local fish farms not far up into the gulf where they farm Yellow-tail Kingfish. I couldn't help thinking that Neil would have loved this opportunity to view the operation so closely. I photographed the

circular fish pens. It was an eye-opener to see thousands of yellow tails on the surface just stirring up the water. Next, we were greeted by a few dolphins, they took a liking to the boat and decided that it was time to play. I was euphoric as these magnificent mammals just glided back and forth in front of the boat. Definitely not a time to run out of film so I learnt quickly that a speedy film change was vital.

Soon we were at Lowly Point, close to where we had been diving. He fished right on the border of the closed reserve. Using coloured jigs, which seem to mesmerize the Cuttlefish, he began hauling them on board. Without going into too much detail it was a big eye opener to see the Cuttlefish caught, unceremoniously dumped into fish bins to die. The catch is then used for both human consumption and for fishing bait. Watching how easily they were caught made me realize how very vulnerable the Giant Cuttlefish are. More research is definitely needed to establish the effects of fishing as the taking of Cuttlefish when they are gathering to breed must have an effect on future populations and possibly the actual existence of this species. This is the reason why the Whyalla Dive Club and other concerned individuals have kept lobbying the South Australian Government for a complete closure of the Cuttlefish spawning grounds. Some areas have been closed from March 1<sup>st</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup> but maybe more is needed.

So as you can see it's a happening thing in Whyalla at Cuttlefish time. According to the locals, May through to August is the best time to see the Giant Cuttlefish. I know I'll be going back and I know that Neil won't hesitate to get among the action since hearing Angie and my stories and seeing my photographs. I've just re-fuelled his obsession!

#### Picture this;

The cramped crew cabin was just 4 feet tall and 3.5 feet wide.

Power plant consisted of a crankshaft turned by seven men and linked to the propeller by a chain. A large fly wheel increased efficiency: as the crew cranked, the flywheel's momentum helped sustain speed.

Keel ballast in the form of iron blocks bolted to the bottom of the vessel could be jettisoned if the vessel became disabled on the bottom.

Snorkel pipes and a bellows drew air into the vessel, but could be used only near the surface. To see how long they could go without fresh air, crewmen in training once sat on the bottom for two and a half hours, though their candle wouldn't burn after just 25 minutes.

Seated at the helm, beneath the forward hatch, the Captain used a compass to stay on course, but had to surface and sight through a view port to locate targets.

Bow tanks in the bow and the stern were flooded to make the vessel sink and pumped out to make it rise.

Packed with 135lbs of black powder the barbed torpedo (mine) slipped on to a nearly 20ft long spar. Rammed into a ship, the charge held fast as the vessel backed off, spooling out a line tied to a detonating trigger.

This was the grandmother of submarines. The H L HUNLEY. On the 17th February 1864, this submarine attacked and sunk the steam sloop USS Housatonic some 4 miles to sea out from Charleston South, Carolina.

Alas the Hunley never made port again and all aboard her perished for unknown reasons. She was discovered by shipwreck hunters in May 1995, approximately 1000 yards from where she sank the Housatonic. On the 8th August 2000, this vessel again saw daylight as a salvaged, intact historic relic.

Although this submarine killed 21 of it's own crew in it's short life and only accounted for 5 of the enemy, it is considered to be to submarine warfare, what the Wright brothers were to aviation, without doubt changing the course of naval history.

The July 2002 National Geographic Magazine has a great story on this Confederate "Infernal Machine".

### Would you like to share GPS coordinates?

This is an interesting article which I thought many of you may well be interested in.
This came through SCANS

#### Dear fellow divers and GPS enthusiasts!

We invite you to submit your favorite GPS dive sites and other locations of interest to GPScape (http://datamining.anu.edu.au/gps) which is a novel search engine specializing in locality-aware information retrieval.

#### What does this mean?

If you search for the word "coffee", say, on google you will get close to a million results. With a location aware search engine, such a query can be restricted to a search center and a radius and thus return far fewer but presumably more relevant results.

Such a search hinges, of course, on the availability of location information in the underlying database. Hence this request to get started.

By submitting your waypoints to GPScape you make them available to the community at large and your name (only if you wish) will appear with each point such that people who make use of your waypoints can give you feedback.

#### TO SUBMIT:

Collect your waypoints in a file, preferably in XML (see below) or OziExplorer format, and email to Ole.Nielsen@anu.edu.au along with your name, email, whether you will allow your email to be published along with the points (we will respect your privacy), and any comments or suggestions you might have. Try to put in descriptions for each point - this will make it more useful.

#### BACKGROUND:

When I went to Fiji last year I was searching the WEB for interesting waypoints in the region. I was especially interested in marks for dive sites but also tracks, ATM's, summits and points of interest in general would have been useful. I didn't find anything. Therefore I decided to create a free on-line database of GPS coordinates where everyone interested can share their favorite locations.

Examples include: locations of speed cameras, public toilets, geocaches, moorings, dive sites, trail heads, summits, etc

#### SEARCHING:

The database can be searched by specifying a search center, a radius and optional keywords. Here are some search examples that will yield results with the data currently available in GPScape.

To find all waypoints related to skiing in the Australian alps: Center: S37, E148, Radius: 200km, Keywords: skiing

To find all ship wrecks off the Australian east coast: Center: S30, E150, Radius: 800km, Keywords: wreck

To find all dive sites near the island Nananu-ira in Fiji: Center: S17.30, E178.22, Radius: 50km, Keywords: diving

#### DOWNLOADING:

When you are satisfied that you have found a useful collection of waypoints for your purpose, you can download them to your own computer - and then subsequently upload them to your GPS unit for use in the field.

We support an XML format containing all available information and the format used by OziExplorer 1.2 for use

with OziExplorer and ease of communication with your GPS. OziExplorer - as the GPS units - does not support all the information available in the database, so with that format you will loose some of the descriptive data.

#### PERFORMANCE:

The waypoints are indexed by an R-tree which makes use of locality. A search with a small radius can be very fast irrespective of the total number of coordinates.

We have stress tested the GPScape engine millions of artificially generated points and still been able to achieve fast response times.

XML FILE FORMAT (uploading and downloading): GPScape works with an XML format (see example below). We require for the time being that all points are given in WGS84 and altitudes are in meters.

Latitudes and longitude must be given in the formats [N|S|E|W|-] {DD.DDDDD | DD:MM.MMM | DD:MM:SS.SS} i.e. one letter designating the orientation and then either degrees as a decimal number, degrees and minutes or degrees, minutes and seconds. Examples of valid coordinates are N34.17342, E148:34.743 and S17:32:6, W150:12:6.32 and -17.123, 148:23.

The minus sign indicates south for latitudes and west for longitudes.

#### GEODESIC DATUM:

No waypoint is complete without a reference to the geodesic datum. However, an emerging standard on most units is the World Geodesic Society 1984 (WGS84) datum and this is the one we assume for all coordinates within GPScape. Most GPS units and GPS software is able to do the conversions, so we ask you to ensure that any point you upload follows this standard before submitting. Future versions of GPScape might take of other datums.

#### CAN WE TRUST THE POINTS?

We assume no responsibility for the accuracy of points downloaded from GPScape. However, we strive to ensure correctness as follows:

- 1 Anyone uploading points must identify themselves.
- 2 Anyone who find errors or wrong information is entitled to upload corrections and the waypoint deemed wrong as well as its creator will be flagged so.
- 3 Anyone who can verify the correctness and usefulness of a waypoint are encouraged to do so. The waypoint and its creator will be flagged with positive points as will the person

volunteering the information.

In the long term waypoints appear with different scores based on their perceived correctness and users who are actively supporting the system will become known as reliable sources of information. At the moment - we request this process to be carried out through email to Ole.Nielsen@anu.edu.au.

#### **SOFTWARE:**

GPScape is written in the programming language Python using WebWare for the interface. The underlying engine is a combination of Python and MySQL. The platform is Debian Linux and the Apache Web server. All components are licensed as open source with all the benefits of affordability, robustness, quality and generally good karma. Needless to say the source code for GPScape will be made publicly available once it has matured.

#### **BUGS/TODO:**

GPScape is by no means finished, but now at a stage where we can start entering waypoints. Hence this mail. In the near future we will setup a user account system to allow registered users to directly upload points to the data base and give scores to existing points and users.

The keyword searching will be improved to allow advanced queries using OR, AND, NOT, exact phrases etc.

In the more distant future we plan to hook GPScape up to other search engines where locality information is available.

"Yeah, that doesn't surprise me", replied the guy. "He still eats Everything in sight, but ever since the cue ball incident, he measures everything first."

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
