

I am not sure which species the cover shot is.

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
PRESIDENTS POSSIE

Awesome Field Guide to Australian Sharks & Rays

The CSIRO Marine Research Unit have had the above publication produced on WATERPROOF pages The publication is 84 pages and is distilled from that classic big hard cover text Shark & Rays issued way back in 1994. This one is specifically for the commercial fishers so that they can identify species as part of their by catch reporting program. Page size is half way between A5 & A4.

I have managed to secure a copy and it fulfills its intended role admirably as a field guide. As such it would make an absolutely brilliant divers companion.

As we know sharks and rays do not receive good "box office" listing so and that is why as divers we get such a thrill to encounter them on dives. Due to their slow reproduction strategies they are vulnerable to fishing pressures.

I have contacted the CSIRO to encourage them to arrange another print run of the field guide as I thought divers would be most interested in securing a copy of the publication. So hopefully they will rise to the bait as it were and we will have access to a great publication hopefully at a modest cost. If your club thinks its members would buy some copies (assuming price is reasonable) let me know.

PROPOSED NEW DIVING STANDARDS

SCAN along with our South Australian and Victorian counterparts via David Turner (SA), continues to liaise with Carol Foster, Projects Manager of Standards Australia's SF-017 committee (Occupational Diving), regarding the proposed AS/NZS 2299.3 & .4 . The comment period dates for 2299.3 (Occupational diving operations Part 3: Recreational diving and snorkeling at a workplace) are not yet available but the comment period is apparently soon approaching. Current drafts for both proposed standards are not available. The current draft for 2299.4 (Occupational diving operations Part 4: Film and photographic diving) is still being reviewed by the SF-017 committee. The target date for the draft of Part 4 is later this year and the release date for Part 3 is the same. Prices for the published standards have not been set yet. We are told that "health & safety considerations should not vary depending on

whether a person classifies themselves as an 'amateur' or as a 'professional'.". (from SDFSA)

HOBART ON TARGET FOR 2002 SCUTTLING

Hey now there is another reason to go to South Australia besides the wineries! The former Royal Australian Navy vessel *Hobart* is just about finished being cleaned up ready for scuttling in November. Our SA dive mates are hoping this wreck will steal some of the march that WA has experienced with their wrecks.

The Hobart will be scuttled, four nautical miles off the Fleurieu Peninsula coast near Yankalilla.

Luckily a large number of ships accessories will remain on board the submerged vessel, and the fact that many areas normally sealed off to divers will remain accessible, including the missile launcher, gun turrets, both smoke stacks and an engine room, will prove popular spots to check out! Watch this space for an exact scuttling date. The *HMAS Hobart* will eventually lie in 30 metres of water, providing a five-metre clearance at low tide for small vessels to pass over the top of the ship. (From SDFSA)

WWII Shipwrecks - A pollution Threat to the Fisheries, Marine and Coastal Environments of the Pacific.

It has been more than half a century since some of the greatest naval battles of history raged across the Pacific. Battles for the Coral Sea, Guadalcanal, Midway, Philippines, Gilbert & Marshall Islands are a few notable examples.

The Pacific war lasted 1354 days and many nations lost thousands of military craft of various classes and sizes from aircraft carriers and battleships, to destroyers, oil tankers, landing craft and merchant vessels.

In the sea battles around the Solomon Island of Guadalcanal, hundreds of vessels were lost and the strait between the islands was renamed Iron Bottom Sound, because of the number of WWII shipwrecks littering the sea floor. In Truk Lagoon, Micronesia, dozens of vessels were sunk. This amounts to approximately 200,000 tonnes of shipping being lost to a lagoon which is only 40 miles wide.

The oil, chemicals and unexploded ordinance still on board many of these vessels, poses a grave and imminent danger to the people and fisheries of the region, as well as the marine and coastal environments of many small island nations in the Pacific. The recent oil spill from the sunken oil tanker the USS Mississinewa in Micronesia, is an example of the problems presented by deteriorating WWII wrecks across the Pacific.

In August of 2001 a State of Emergency was declared in Yap State following a significant oil spill from the USS Mississinewa in the remote and environmentally sensitive atoll known as Ulithi Lagoon. A complete ban on fishing within the lagoon area had also been imposed by the Environment Protection Agency and Marine Resources Department of Yap State. The spill occurred over a two month period between July and August of 2001. A request for assistance to the South Pacific Regional Environment Programme (SPREP) was made by the President of Micronesia for an independent study on the wreck and environmental impacts of the oil spill from the USS Mississinewa.

The objectives of the SPREP Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) were:

- (a) To dive the wreck and confirm whether all oil leaks from the sunken USS Mississinewa oil tanker had ceased.
- (b) To determine the resources at risk in the area of the spill and any ecological damage.
- (c) To assess the extent of remaining oil on shorelines, with particular focus on environmentally sensitive islands known as the "Turtle Islands" to the south east of the lagoon.
- (d) To determine priorities and requirements for any shoreline cleanup actions or restoration.
- (e) To observe and assess the impacts of oil on any wild life in the region.
- (f) To document any ecological constraints on oil spill response or cleanup operations.
- (g) To provide an overall recommendation on any necessary actions relating to the remaining oil on the USS Mississinewa.

From my dives on the wreck I concluded there was major doubt and uncertainty as to the structural integrity of the sunken vessel in the long term. It is not a case of "if " the next oil leak occurs from the USS Mississinewa, but "when".

From the surveys carried out on a number of islands in the atoll in September 2001, it was apparent that no major foreshore oiling remained in Ulithi Lagoon. Some oil had impacted the Turtle island of Pau. The western beaches of Falalop, facing the lagoon, were probably the most contaminated with oil during our surveys. Oil tar balls and mats were concentrated in the upper tidal zone region near the concrete boat ramp and the boat harbour.

No signs of any abnormal crustacean or mollusc mortality were apparent on tropical foreshores and no dead turtles examined showed any sign of oil contamination and the deaths were attributed to natural causes. The bird population appeared to be diverse, healthy and very active with no signs of oil contamination, oil intoxication or behavioral changes.

The ban placed on fishing within Ulithi Lagoon by the Yap authorities during the height of the recent oil spill was seen as a prudent and sound measure to protect the health of it's citizens. Since the immediate spill source had been contained and sufficient time has passed for most fish species to depurate (detoxify) from the effects of oil components I recommended that the Yap Governor lift the ban on fishing in Ulithi immediately.

Due to the increasing incidence of oil spills from WWII shipwrecks in the Pacific, SPREP was requested by the Pacific Island Countries to develop a strategy for a regional approach to assessing the risks of oil pollution potential and minimising the marine pollution potential from WWII wrecks in the Pacific. The strategy currently being developed will address the technical, political. legal, salvage and economic risk aspects of WWII shipwrecks of the Pacific. In conjunction with SPREP we have logged the position of over 1000 WWII shipwrecks across the Pacific using GPS.

Of particular interest to Australia, during the battle of the Coral Sea in 1942, the giant "USS Lexington" aircraft carrier, a large oil tanker the "USS Neosho" and the destroyer "USS Sims" were sunk within the Australian EEZ in around 2500-3000 metres of water. The ships' exact location have never been found, but are suspected to be only around 200 nautical miles from the environmentally sensitive and protected Coral Sea territory of Lihou Atoll and Cays.

The 25000 ton USS Neosho oil tanker (which is in the same class as the USS Mississinewa) had a capacity of 146,000 barrels or approximately 19 million litres of oil products when it sunk within the Australian EEZ. It is not known how much oil is contained within the wreck slowly deteriorating on the seabed offshore from the Great Barrier Reef. Like the USS Mississinewa a significant spill from this vessel could be only a matter of time.

When I first read this story, my immediate thoughts were this is good material for the wetrag, especially as Noel has enlightened many of us, either practically or via slides and movies, to the great diving in the area this story covers.

As I transcribed this story I started to get a feeling that this story was more about agenda and future funding than actual practicalities.

Don't get me wrong, I felt the story had a sound basis, hence the reason I still included it, but it's interesting to note, that there are no apparent biological, or ecological anomalies, the fish are edible, the birds are healthy and active, the turtles die of natural causes, the only real oil debris seems to be in the boat harbour and near the boat ramp where one would expect to find such detritus.

No real mention of the necessary course of action required, if in fact there is a need and that is, pump out any large quantities of known oil now. I would have thought that the solution to the problem would have been a paramount inclusion to a story such as this. The omission of a solution is conspicuous by it's absence. If this oil is such a threat to these Pacific Nations and their environments, then do something constructive. It takes no Einstein to work out that any ship sunk to the bottom of the sea 50 odd years ago could not have it's structural integrity guaranteed as secure.

It is surely better to take the oil from one shipwreck at a time, but actually do it and slowly perfect the system, than spending all the time and resources in locating and cataloguing all the Pacific's spots of doom. Surely if the quantity of oil within these hulks is such that there is a significant threat, then it would be economical for oil interests to recover same and profit by saving the day, both tangibly and in the eyes of the people threatened and the public in general

The Coup De Theatre of this whole thing is that there is an innuendo that the Great Barrier Reef may now be threatened.

I feel a grant coming on Mr Howard.


