GUEST'S OF MEMBERS ARE WELCOME TO ATTEND OUR CLUB MEETINGS AND DIVE OUTINGS

South Pacific Divers Club is a social scuba diving club whose members have a common interest in scuba diving and in particular underwater photography. Club dives are on our web site. The club also organises weekends away at Jervis Bay and Nelsons Bay as well as other dive areas. We also organise once a year the Australasian Underwater Photographer of the Year Competition, open to all underwater photographers in Australia and Overseas. We also have a slide show after every meeting.

South Pacific Divers Club holds monthly meetings at the Bankstown Sports Club on the third Monday of every month. Meetings start at 8:00 and generally a slide show follows.

History of South Pacific Divers

South Pacific Divers Club was formed about 1958 and held its first meeting in the backyard garage of Denis Robinson at Beverly Hills.

Denis was its first president and held that position for a number of years until he left Sydney to take up residence in Western Australia.

During the first few years of the club there were many exploratory, exciting and sometimes dangerous dives that took place among its young members. These were the days that everything was new and exciting and in many situations we dived where no one had been before. We were some of the early divers to explored the many sink holes at Mt Gambier in South Australia including Piccaninnie Ponds, The Shaft and The Blue Lake and others.

Those days there were no permits to dive these areas, you just explored as many sink holes and caves as possible without restrictions, everything was free and easy.

We mapped many new dive sites at that time along the Southern New South Wales Coastline. Jumped into the Blow Hole at Kiama many Sunday mornings, creating excitement among spectators until the police came and threatened us with arrest if we continued. Rafted down the Shoalhaven river when it was in flood, that was exciting. Tested scuba diving equipment, taught new members how to dive, this was before instructor agencies were formed in Australia. Some of our members discovered Shiprock Dive site whilst others commenced deep diving to eventually set an unofficial deep diving record at The Peaks that lie some kilometres off Maroubra Beach.

When seas were rough we did a lot of dry caveing. We were involved in locating a cannon and anchor from the shipwreck of the Clipper Dunbar that lies south of Sydney Heads. Many of the early members were expert

photographers, they made their own underwater camera housings and were leaders in submitting photos and articles for the early Australian Skindivers Magazine. Denis Robinson and myself became movie stringers for a Sydney TV station making a number of short underwater films for "Sunday Afternoon News."

As time passed the early members slowly left the club, new people entered and it changed from the times of free and easy diving to more controlled types of activities. Just before Denis Robinson left for Western Australia he asked me to organize a small film festival, we named it, "New South Wales Underwater Film Festival". This became the forerunner to The Australian Underwater Photographer of the Year that commenced in 1980 and has run through two decades to become one of the major events on the Australian diving calendar.

Today South Pacific Divers Club is a lot different from its early days. The club is independent from any dive shop or dive organization, it is run by a committee of five, elected once a year by its members. The club conducts local dives twice a month along with social activities and dives away weekends to locations such as Jervis Bay, Terrigal, Foster and Seal Rocks, Ulladulla, wrecks at Eden, seals at Montague Island, Nelson Bay, local night dives and day charter boats dives as well as overseas scuba diving trips.

Whilst the club promotes safe diving its members are free to dive the way they wish. However its newly certified members are buddied with more experienced club member. Morning shore dives are generally followed by a BBQ and get together. Boat outings, particularly wreck diving, are for the more experienced members. Age among club members range from under 20 to 60 years and over, so you can see there is an age group for just about everyone.

Experiences among members range from Open Water Divers through to Instructors.

Among its many members South Pacific Divers Club has a cross section of active divers, some enjoy shipwreck diving, others underwater photographers, new divers would rather dive on shallow reef sponge gardens, others are interested in marine biology, and many prefer to dive from charter boats.

If you want to meet other divers and enjoy the wonderful sport of scuba diving, mix socially with people of the same interest as yourself, go away on weekend outings or day diving trips, perhaps overseas diving, then join SOUTH PACIFIC DIVERS CLUB Inc.

COMPETITION RULES

- 1. The competition will be conducted over three months.
- 2. Each month's competition will close at 10.00 p.m. on the night of the Club meeting for that month:

Late entries will be entered into the following month's competition.

1_FEBRUARY 2003
2_MARCH 2003
3_APRIL 2003

- 3. The competition is open only to members of South Pacific Divers Club who are currently financial.
- 4. February Competition is open only to those people who have not gained 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any competition with the exception of past George Roberts Novice Sections.

March Competition is open to any person except those people who have won 1st, 2nd or 3rd open in past S.P.D. Competitions.

April Competition is open to all members.

- 5. Each entry may be up to five slides per month. They will be judged and only the highest scoring slide counted.
- 6. There will be a prize-winner each month and a major overall prize-winner.
- 7. The winner and entrants each month will receive a score for the place they achieve (different from their slide score). This score is cumulative through the competition. The highest cumulative score at the end of the competition will be declared the overall winner.

DIVE REPORTS

Boat dives

Dive Site: Minmi Trench Viz: 6-8 meters Boat name: Divercity Depth: 25 meters

Do you know the difference between sand and rock? Neither did our skipper who, when asked assured us that yes we were definitely picked into rock, and that we were off the marks but he had just let out a lot of line. Imagine our surprise when we descended to find not the promised Minmi Trench but lots of sand and a long tiring swim at 20-30 meters through surge to our dive site. Eventually we did find the anticipated rock shelf and scattered boulders and at the end of the dive the start of the trench. Difficulties aside this dive site promised to be an interesting one and worth a second visit, and of course we can now advise the driver where to drop anchor.

Shore dives

Dive Site: The Leap - The Steps

Viz: 3-5 meters Depth: 23 meters

After the climb down the cliff to the entry point the water sure looked inviting and with a fairly decent swell running the name of our dive site suddenly took on more significance. As I was camera bound, timing the entry was important, clutching my trusty housed Nikon I did a lovely giant stride and totally mistimed the swell. After dropping about 12 feet concern for a flooded camera was foremost in my mind but all was well. The viz looked good, right up until we descended where it dropped to about 3 meters. We allowed the incoming tide to carry us along over the bommies that lay scattered along the interface of rock and sand. The usual collection of nudibranchs, sponges, soft corals and friendly Groper were all out in force and begging to be photographed, if only my strobes had been working I am sure I would have taken some lovely shots.

Christmas Day at Inscription point

Dive Site: The Steps

Viz: 5 meters **Depth**: 14 meters

Turned out to be a nice easy dive with plenty to see. I entered at the Steps and made my way around to Inscription Point, as I had just missed the tide so the viz dropped a fair bit about half-way through the dive. Those giant nudibranchs were about and had been busy laying their unique pattern of row at frequent intervals amongst the bommies. After my dive I caught up with Noel and Bernie who had dived the Leap to the Steps respectively and had both enjoyed good dives. We sat down to a fine lunch and washed the lot down with some lovely Christmas pudding.

Dive Site: Bass Point, Bushrangers Bay
Viz: 6 meters Depth: 20 meters

We walked to the southern tip of the outer bay and entered in a small cove protected from the north east swell. We dived along the wall that leads to the mouth of the outer bay then dropped down to the center of outer Bushranghers then headed back to finish our dive at the pebbly beach at the foot of the stairs in inner Bushrangers Bay.

The outer wall proved to be a really nice dive with the usual friendly blue groper and plenty of large morays inhabiting abundant nooks and crannies.

The center of the bay has several large rock outcrops that support a healthy variety of sponge life and soft corals. The Inner bay was pretty ordinary by comparison with outer due to low viz and not a lot too see, but proved to be a better snorkelling dive than scuba.




