CAVE EXPLORATION GROUP (SOUTH AUSTRALIA)

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your consideration the following report covering the activity of the Group during the year ended 28th February, 1957.

MEMBERSHIP.

Following the Consolidating Annual General Meeting of 1956, the Group set off to a good start with three Honorary Life Members, 26 Full Foundation Members and many Associates. The final figures to the end of this financial year are:-

- 3 Hon. Life Members
- 26 Foundation Members
- 12 Full Members
- 24 Associate Members
- 65 Total Membership

Although suffering heavy losses in members travelling overseas and particularly Messrs. Hamilton-Smith, Taylor and Textor moving interstate on business, membership has still increased at a steady rate. Following the first difficult year of existence, it is expected that there will be a slight fall in membership, but new enrolments are expected to continue at the old rate and any loss will soon be recovered. A complete list of membership is published with this report.

CAVING ACTIVITIES.

The year has been most successful in all respects with a sometimes alarmingly high rate of new discoveries coming to light. Covering the year's activities by regional grouping:-

- l. Yorke Peninsula and Adelaide: Three trips were organised to Curramulka to both the Town and Correls Caves. Mapping has been commenced at Correls Cave and with the technique of underground camping being developed to a high standard, many new extensions were discovered in the Town Cave. Of major importance would be the Pearl Chamber with the first recorded occurrence of Oolites in South Australia. A quarry between these two caves is uncovering occasional fissures but no more entrances have been found in the surrounding country. A search conducted along Myponga Creek for caves also proved to be barren.
- 2. Eyre Peninsula: No caving was done in this area but there are promising reports of caves at Lincoln Gap that will be investigated shortly.
- 3. Flinders Range: The caves at Mt. Remarkable were again visited and the first official visit to Arcoota and Good Friday Caves was made to the northern Flinders Ranges. A second

trip to the active Mairs Cave at Buckalowie Creek was made at the end of January. This is the only wet cave so far discovered in the north containing a wealth of formations and fossil beds, and has been shown to exceed 650 ft. by mapping.

4. South East: At Easter 1956, an unusual trip was organised combining boating with caving to the Glenelg River. Several small caves were found including the "Snow-flake" and a visit was made to the Victorian Tourist "Princess Margaret Rose Caves".

Several trips have now been made to the Naracoorte region with scientific work and mapping progressing steadily. Many new caves have been found and the recent discovery of the remains of a cave lion in the area together with the acquired use of the Tourist Bureau Hut will no doubt inspire many more visits.

- 5. Kangaroo Island: From the highly successful second Kelly Hill Expedition held the previous year, emerged the first detailed map of these caves. A third expedition Christmas 1956 extended the main cave still further and many more minor openings were discovered.
- 6. Nullarbor: Under the leadership of E. Hamilton-Smith, the largest scientific party ever to explore the Nullarbor Caves has just returned from a most successful expedition, with members of most interstate societies participating and numbering more than 60 with 4 vehicles.

The work of organising and consolidating the field data is enormous and it will be some months before the full fruits of their discoveries are made known.

MUSEUM MEETINGS.

The continuation of these meetings has proved successful and we are indebted to several distinguished speakers - particularly Professor King of South Africa and Dr. Hossfeld and Mr. Tindale of Adelaide. The inclusion of a Members Paper Night at the end of each quarter has provoked further research amongst the members and some useful information has emerged from several very interesting evenings. Most of these papers have been retained in C.E.G. files for members' information.

Our thanks are due to the administration of the Museum for the use of this Lecture Room.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES.

As it was found early that it would be necessary to separate Museum Meetings from General Business, social activities were introduced to follow the General Meetings. A.B.W. Clubrooms were ideal for this purpose but these were closed during the year.

The new National Fitness Rooms were made available and although renovations made things difficult for a period, their completion will give us use of one of the finest meeting places in Adelaide. Our thanks again are due to the National Fitness Rooms.

Many post-meeting entertainments were devised through the year ranging from rope instructions, cave first aid, cave muscle nights and slide showings to general discussions, and as well as being educational towards better caving, they provided a most necessary social occasion for members to meet informally. The evening holding the greatest potential was undoubtedly the Photo Competition and it is hoped that this will become a keenly contested annual event.

CAVEMANS DINNER.

Already recognised as an annual event, the second Cavemans Dinner was held at Rigonis Restaurant just prior to Christmas with about 25 members present. An enjoyable night was had by all and if nothing else was accomplished, it at least confirmed financially the appetite and thirst of the South Australian Troglodyte.

SEARCH AND RESCUE.

A highly efficient Search and Rescue team of the Group's leading cavers has been organised under the leadership of R. T. Sexton. Carrying specialised rescue equipment, a fully equipped team can now be called together on very short notice and the same organisation is on call from the South Australian Police. A successful trial "scramble" was held during the year in which our Prosident was rescued from a very dark future.

FEDERATION.

Christmas 1956 saw the formation of the Australian Speleological Federation and this Group was privileged in being the Host Society.

There was representation from almost every caving body in Australia and the new Federation promises to fulfil a long needed want. The retiring President, Mr. E. Hamilton-Smith has been elected Secretary for the Federation.

The programme and budget for Federation is expected during March, 1957, and for its absolute success we must pledge our wholehearted support to this movement.

RECORDS.

The task of stabilising a system for recording results and accomplishments for an activity such as ours is a difficult one. Only now is it becoming obvious, the nature of results returned for permanent record and these are being accommodated thus:-

- 1. Basic trip accounts and scientific reports of caves are filed in C.E.G.S.A. Records held at the S.A. Museum together with original maps. This has grown steadily during the year.
- 2. Lesser reports, Members Papers and articles for publication are at present held by the Secretary and will require a more permanent method of preservation in the near future.
- 3. Printed Journals and Papers from other Societies have been accumulating and a modified library system will have to be instituted during 1957.

TOURIST BUREAU.

Again C.E.G.S.A. has worked in close collaboration and harmony with the Tourist Bureau. Permission to explore in the

Kelly Hill region led to the rediscovery of the first known chambers of this system with considerable tourist potential.

At Naracoorte, no major finds have been reported but the use of the first Guide House grahted from this Department to the University, Museum and ourselves will prove invaluable whilst working on scientific material in the area. Our gratitude is extended to the Director and Deputy Director of the Tourist Bureau and their two South Australian Guides Messrs. Seton and Wyld for their co-operation and encouragement shown through the year.
