# CAVE EXPLORATION GROUP (South Australia)

# Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Committee once again has much pleasure in submitting for your consideration the following report covering the activities of the Group during its third year ending 25th February, 1959.

# MEMBERSHIP

The membership during this last year has shown little change. The overall numbers are similar to those in the previous two years, but the percentage of full members is somewhat higher.

Although the total membership figures are similar, the city-country comparison shows the lie. We now have exactly one-third of our voting members resident either in the country or out of the State. During the year we have lost 12 members and gained 13, but several more are expected to join with the coming financial year.

# CAVING ACTIVITIES

During the past year some 18 successful caving expeditions were carried out. This has been concentrated mainly in the South Eastern Section, with only 7 brips to other areas.

# 1. York Peninsula and Adelaide

Three trips were organised to Curramulka to both caves. Progress can be reported in both the exploration and the mapping of the Town Cave.

The Curramulka Quarry has ceased operation, hence no fossils have been recovered from this location recently.

Thylacolco and other vertebrate remains have been identified from the Town Cave.

Intensive mapping to be undertaken in Corrells Cave during the coming year will perhaps give some indication of the origin of this system, particularly in the light of recent observations in Tasmania.

# 2. Eyre Peninsula

The Group spent Easter in the Lake Hamilton area. Two major caves, both reaching the water table, and several shallow potholes were investigated. The latter holes are unlikely to yield results. The two major caves still represent considerable work. A third - reputedly the best - has been bulldozed in during a recent antirabbit campaign.

# 3. Flinders

Although the Flinders Ranges are out of comfortable range for a normal weekend, three successful trips were made. The first and third were made to the area north of Wilpena, where the Orraparinna, Bunkers Range (Eyries), two caves and Narinna Creek caves were visited. A search made for other caves reported in this area had mixed results. The second Flinders trip was made to the Arcoota area where the Mt. Sims, Arcoota, and a new cave two miles south of the main Arcoota cave were further investigated.

#### 4. South East

By far the most important section within easy reach of Adelaide. The large number of trips in this area have been well repaid in discoveries. Several caves near Mount Gambier have been reinvestigated, and the South East caving area can now be traced as far east as Warrnambool. Trips this year have been made to Tantanoola, Mount Burr, Rendelsham, Mount Gambier, Naracoorte, Marcollat, Beachport and the Murray River.

Recent discoveries in the Naracoorte area include "Lost Cave", lost for some forty years, and it is believed the "Zeitz Fossil Cave", as well as large extensions to other caves in the area.

Identified fossils recently found in the area are protemnodon, sarcophilus and Thylacolco.

# 5. Kangaroo Island

No official trips were arranged for this area during 1958, but a trip is being planned for 1959.

# 6. Nullarbor

No official trip was arranged for this area during 1958, but a trip may be planned for 1959. The massive report on the 1956 trip is nearing completion. It is expected that an air-photo coverage of the plains will be available soon from the Lands Department, and this should indicate plenty of scope for future exploration.

# 7. Interstate

The only trip organised this year was to Tasmania for the A.S.F. Conference. Participants in this trip were greatly impressed by the Tasmanian Caving. The areas visited were Maydena - Florentine, Hastings - Ida Bay and Mole Creek. In the first two, the very thick scrub is a surface deterrent. Much exploration and surveying is yet needed in all of these areas.

Two private parties have visited caves in W.A. this year, including some of the newly discovered Augusta caves.

A third party made a visit to Yarangobilly in N.S.W.

# MUSEUM MEETINGS

A year of interesting speakers, which featured Dr. Hossfeld of the University, Dr. Daily and Mr. Tindale of the Museum, and Mr. Swan of Waite Institute. Seven members' papers were given during the year by some of our project workers. The average attendance of about 20 has justified these meetings, for which our thanks again to the Museum administration.

#### SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Following a few of the General Meetings, Members' slides were shown. Owing to the volume of business at these meetings, not as much time as we wished was devoted to the social side, but this should improve in the coming year.

The third annual photo competition was successfully held. Two showings of members' slides to friends and contacts were held during the year. The first was at Curramulka and the second at Tantanoola.

#### NARACOORTE RESEARCH CENTRE

This hut has been used extensively during the past year by members and by the Museum. Some improvements have been carried out during the year, and more is planned for the coming year. Our thanks to the Tourist Bureau and Mr. Wyld for their help in this valuable centre.

# RECORDS

Good use has been made by trip leaders during the year of the field notes for various caving areas, copies of which are now kept in the C.E.G.S.A. Library. Originals are held, as previously, by the S.A. Museum. Unfortunately it is necessary to report that there are now 13 trip reports outstanding, which in turn means that much information is not available for future reference as yet.

The card index has increased at a much lower rate than last year, and cards are now held for 105 caves: an increase of 12.

# LIBRARY

In contrast to records, the Library is increasing in material more rapidly than previously. This is principally due to C.E.G.S.A.'s membership of the Cave Research Group of Great Britain. Other overseas publications received were current issues of the Bulletin of the South African Speleological Association and a copy of "Cango" bought from South Africa.

As usual, copies of publications of other Australian Societies were received, including two issues of the Tasmanian Caverneering Club Bulletin and an A.S.F. publication, "Caving in Australia".

Of special mention is R. T. Sexton's paper, "Cave Survey in South Australia", which, together with any of the material in the Library, may be borrowed for a limited time.

# TOURIST BUREAU

During the year the group obtained the use of a display window of the Department. A well set up display of equipment and material, together with maps and slides, did much to publicise our work. Our thanks are due to Mr. L. R. Watson for his help and advice on this project. Our congratulations go to Mr. P. F. Pollnitz on his appointment as Director of the Bureau. Again our thanks to this Department for its generous assistance, and to their three guides, Messrs. Seton, Wyld and Jones, for their co-operation through the year.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

The Statement of Accounts provides some interesting figures in relation to the question of Members' Subscriptions, these being much less than general expenses plus subscriptions to A.S.F. and C.R.G.

#### GENERAL

Cave survey has continued as in the past and seven caves were completed, with a further twelve under way at the moment. Three caves of considerable size were mapped during the recent A.S.F. trips in Tasmania.

Metal and cloth badges are still available for sale.

Three papers have been prepared during the year; one has been published and the other two pending. They are:

- 1. "Cave Survey in South Australia" R.T. Sexton.
- 2. "Some possible explanations of Helictites" J. Marlow.
- 3. "Cave Forms in South East Type Limestones" A. L. Hill.

On the whole, we can be most satisfied with the results of the year's work. The critical early years of the group are now passing on into history. The Committee take this opportunity again of thanking the numerous "volunteers" of the group, and also the State Departments and Organisations for their favours, and finally the typistes whose thankless job it is to do a quick copy of this or that for the good of a group to which they may not even belong.
