

Ladies and Gentlemen.

Your Committee has great pleasure in submitting the following Annual Report covering the Group's Membership, Activities, and Finances in its eighth year, ending 26th February 1964.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I have much pleasure in reporting an increase in activities in South Australian caving this year. Included among these are bone digs in the Haystall Cave, Earth Resistance Surveying, and an increase in map production. I hope that the present series of Seminars will encourage other people to develop activities along these lines. During this year there has been a considerable increase in attendance at meetings, but "on the debit side of the ledger" there is still a lot of work to be done.

Some caves have been located at the end of Yorke Peninsula, but these have yet to be explored and surveyed. Again this year Avenue Range was neglected. This could have been due to too many tiger snakes or too few tough trogs. Mt. Gambier, Mt. Schank, Naracoorte, and Curramulka were mostly visited on tourist trips. Caves have also been discovered on the Murray Banks, at Bowhill and Murray Bridge. We have heard rumours of caves at Myponga and Yunta.

The number of working trips is starting to compare more favourably with that of a few years ago. A large amount of work is now being done on private trips, which indicates that the official trips are falling down in their purpose.

I would like to thank the Committee for the strong support they have given me, and I hope my successor has equal suport from the next Committee.

CAVING SEMINARS, 1964

This year the Group started a course of seminars for the purpose of teaching the newer members that there is more to caving than straight-out exploration and tourism. From the interest that is beginning to develop within these ranks this has been a worthwhile project. There have been four seminars, held at fortnightly intervals, on the various aspects and interests that arise from caving. The Seminars were given by people who are associated with particular pursuits within the Group. The subjects covered by the Seminars were as follows:

A General Talk on Caving (F. Sanders)

Geology in Caving (Dr. B. Daily)

Cave Surveying (R.T. Sexton)

Caving Gear and A.R. Jackson)

Photography

These people gave their time willingly to lecture to us, and without them the Seminars would not have been possible. The organizers wish to thank them and the Museum for allthe help they have given us. We also hope that in the future the Seminars will become a regular part of the year's programme.

SEARCH and RESCUE

Two Search and Rescue scrambles were held this year, the first for many years. They were both held on official trips, and proved to be good practice, as well as showing the need for much more practice, both in organization of rescue and personal efficiency. The Police Force is very interested in this field, and they could be very useful when heavy equipment or high speed transport is needed. It is planned that during the coming year we demonstrate our abilities to them, and they theirs to us.

AUSTRALIAN SPELEOLOGICAL FEDERATION

The Group has withdrawn its resignation from A.S.F. Athol Jackson represented the Group at the last Committee Meeting, in Melbourne, in January of this year.

CAVING ACTIVITIES

This year has shown a considerable increase in the caving activity within the Group. Although several programmed trips have fallen through, either through lack of transport or numbers, there has quite often been a nonofficial trip on the same weekend. There has been a gradual increase in the useful work done in caves by members during the year, and if numbers on trips were not so dependent on students, then the amount of work produced would be enormous, for most of these people lack the time not the enthusiasm. There were 15 programmed trips this year.

WORK DONE in the CAVING AREAS of the STATE

1. Adelaide and Yorke Peninsula

Correll's Cave, Curramulka
A new extension was found off the Ram's Horns early in
the year, and at the same time passages behind the Big
Stalactite were explored. The Paleantologists have taken
some specimens out for study, and a dig has been started.
Late last year a Search and Rescue was held in the Cave,
and for safety measures the entrance to the New Extension
has been widened. Rubbish, partly from our parties, and
partly from visitors to the Cave, is building up underground, and future parties in the Cave should begin
collecting it for removal. On the last trip a byepass
around the Rope was discovered.

Windmill Cave, Curramulka A grade 2 map was made of this Cave on a recent trip to the area.

Quarry Cave, Curramulka A preliminary exploration was made of the Cave, but there was no time for a survey.

Caves at the End of Yorke Peninsula Preliminary work has been done, but the area warrants further exploration.

Reynella Quarry Cave Several parties have been to this Cave during the year. The trips have been for sight-seeing, and as yet there is no report or map of the Cave in the Records.

2. Eyre Peninsula

There have been three unofficial trips to the Lake Hamilton Caves. Two new caves were discovered, and Grade 2 maps were drawn. The rest of the time in the area was spent in active exploration.

3. Flinders Ranges

Narrina Lake Cave
There were three trips to Narrina during the past year,
and on one of these further extensions of the lake were
discovered and partially explored.

Buckalowie Area
Both Clara-St. Dora and Mair's Caves have been visited
during the year, and considerable digging has taken place
in Mair's Cave. The bones brought back proved to be of
considerable interest, and included the skull of a
Marsupial Wolf.

4. South East

Mt. Schank - Mt. Gambier Area A cave search in this area on the Easter Weekend provided the Group with a considerable amount of material. Mitchell's Crossing Cave, Elap-Elap, And the Slit Cave were visited at the same time.

Naracoorte Area A considerable amount of work has been and is being done in this area. A dig has been started in the Haystall Cave. and for this reason the Cave is out of bounds to all. except the Paleantologists. Athol Jackson has started Earth Resistance measurements in the Reserve, and has located a cavern north-east of the Big Cave. The Bat Cave has been visited during the year by Elery Hamilton-Smith, and in December a party from C.E.G.S.A. took temperature readings in the main chamber where the bats breed. A new cave was found behind the Joanna Bat Cave, and a Grade 2 map was drawn. On the last trip several new caves were located behind the Victoria Tourist Cave. In December another Search and Rescue was held, and thanks to Mr. Duffy's fine acting, everybody, but those 'in the know', thought that the worst had really happened. Our thanks to Mr. Wylde and Mr. Duffy for all the assistance they have given us through-out the year.

Naracoorte Research Centre Some preliminary work has been done on the renovation of the Hut, but future work cannot go ahead until the required materials have come from the Museum.

Tantanoola Area
The Lake Cave was visited twice during the year, and on
the last trip Doug Seton explored the lake bottom. This
must now be the most photographed cave in the State, and
soon we won't have to hold any more trips there, instead
we can hold a slide evening - armchair trogs? Several
new caves have been found in this area.

5. Kangaroo Island

No trips have been held to the Island this year, but there is one programmed for the coming Easter Weekend.

6. Nullarbor Plain

The Sydney University Speleological Society ran a three week trip to the Plain in January 1964. They discovered with the aid of air-photos, north-east of Madura, an immense cavern 2½ miles long. The party did not see the full extent of the cave. Several new sinkholes were discovered, and the main caves were visited.

MUSEUM and TOURIST BUREAU

This year the Cave Exploration Group officially affiliated with the South Australian Museum. Their Representitive on Committee has been of great assistance to us throughout the year, as has the Tourist Bureau.

Our thanks to both these Departments for their continued support and assistance.

QUARTERMASTER S REPORT

During the past twelve months, there have been approx. 17 trips for which gear and carbide were used. Over 1cwt. of carbide was used on these trips, which indicates that either a lot more people have carbide lamps, or that those who have them are not conserving carbide by using the sieve when emptying their lamps. It is in the interest of everyone to have a carbide lamp, as they give a very good light, are cheap to run, give an indication of foul air, and besides every member on a trip is charged for carbide, whether they use it or not.

Very little money has been spent on gear in the past year, except for the purchase of a nylon rope, some water containers, and a new tripod to use with the Miner's Dial in surveying. It is hoped that in the new year some money will be spent on some specialised equipment for bone collecting and other such projects.

THE CAVEMAN'S DINNER

This year the Dinner was held in the Rughy Union Hall, at Edwardstown. We had a record attendance of 65 members and their friends.

Leather Medals were presented by Dr. Crowcroft to Bill Rouse, Phil Connard, Vic Linke, and Judd McLean-Smith. Garry Brown received a can of bitumen to aid his studies as a Rhodes Scholar. The Photographic Competition, this year, was divided into two sections. One for Caving Photography, won by Malcolm Walter, and the other for Caving Personalities won by John Bishop.

The food and atmosphere were excellent, and the Dinner was one of the best the Group has had.

SURVEYING REPORT

This year there has been renewed interest in Cave Surveying. A large number of members have shown genuine interest in the 'art' of surveying, and are becoming accomplished Jigger operators, linesmen, and draftsmen. Surveying may not be as attractive as plain trogging, but at least all of the cave is seen.

The Punyelroo Cave has been surveyed for approx. half its distance, and is to Grade 6. This was done on two trips, that were held for the specific purpose of surveying the Cave. The Haystall Cave (Naracoorte) has been surveyed to Grade 6, and on a recent trip the Windmill Cave (Curramulka) was mapped to Grade 2. Maps (Grade 2) of four of the Lake Hamilton Caves have been drawn, including two new caves which were discovered on a recent trip.

LIBRARY

The Library has received considerable attention in the past year. A large ammount of material previously uncatalogued has been transferred into it from general and secretarial records, for ease of reference. Instead of cave and surface maps being placed in an envelope in the appropriate trip report folder, making it difficult to keep a check on the contents, they have been placed in separate folders which must be signed for. The Library now contains about 170 items of general interest, including books, papers and articles on such subjects as speleology, geology, natural history, 160 trip and specialized reports, filed in 19 separate folders on an area basis, 80 South Australian cave maps plus a number of sketch maps, 20 interstate cave maps, and 57 topographical and geological maps, plus air-photos. There is also a large collection of journals and newsletters from caving societies in Australia and overseas. There has been a pleasing increase in the use of the Library; over 60 items being borrowed in the past year. A catalogue has been prepared and will be published shortly.

RECORDS

The year has seen considerable field work, and most of this is being placed on record, although many reports are still outstanding. Surveying has continued to fill in many important gaps. To familiarize newer members with South Australian caves, a checklist of known caves has been published. Caves in each zone now number - South East 101, Kangaroo Island 18, Yorke Peninsula and Adelaide 7, Nullarbor 34, Flinders Ranges 20, Eyre Feninsula 7, a total of 187 Caves.

There is considerable work yet to be done to explore, describe and record these caves, but the large bulk of the existing reports makes it difficult to see where effort is required. The card index has been in the form of a loose leaf foolscap book for several years, and this is being used to summarize all known data on a particular cave, and act as an index to all references in records and librarys. With this as aguide the trip leaders are being briefed before trips as far as possible to help them plan the trip. Standard Trip Report Forms have been issued to assist in the collection of field data. These are given to each caving party on the spot.

MEMBERSHIP

The growth of the Group in 1963 has continued with renewed vigour. The number of application forms handed out is double the 1962 figure, and a record 24 new members have joined. Overall membershiphas increased by 30 percent, and now stands at a total of 80, consisting of:

C.E.G.S.A.'s voice is heard from country members through-out Australia, on the West Coast, in Western Aust., the Territory, the South East, Kangaroo Island, and even as England. The enthusiasm of the younger members has resulted in record attendances at meetings and trips; several meetings have had 40-odd members present, and one recent trip had 45 applicants.

The Committee now takes this opportunity to thank again all the various people, Government Depts., and volunteers who have made our work possible and interesting.
