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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year has been one of change for the group. After the loss of the Hut at Naracoorte the number of trips appeared to decrease. The Hut used to be a focal point for cavers in the area. Negotiations are under way for some facility at Naracoorte and it is hoped that these may bear fruit in 1982.

The membership of the group has remained static this year, but this is no sign for complacency. When people join the group they expect to go caving and expect to be led by cavers with experience. We need people willing to lead trips, to train people in the correct way to cave and to explore caves.

Caves are still to be found if we are willing to look. During the year new caves were found on the Nullarbor, at Penola, Padthaway and around Mount Gambier.

During the year we attempted a change of venue for meetings but the hall proved to be unsuitable. It was too damp for storage of the library and records. The meetings were then resumed at the Museum. The records are now housed at 10 Chapman Street, Torrensville where Committee meetings are now held.

National Parks have now enforced their permit regulations regarding research in national parks etc. Now to do any surveying, photographing etc. we must have a valid permit. No permit is required for tourist type trips. In the long term this should serve to protect our members.

I would like to thank the 1981 Committee for their assistance during the year.

CAVING ACTIVITIES

NARACOORTE : FOSSIL EXCAVATIONS

In 1981, there were five trips to excavate in the Henschke Fossil Cave on the weekends of January 10-11; January 31- February 1; February 28- March 1; March 14-15 and December 5-6.

A number of good finds were made, including more bones of the giant mallee fowl *Progora naracoorteunis*, teeth of the cow-sized *Zygomaturus*, a partial koala skull and most of the shell of a long-necked tortoise (*Chelodina longicollis*). The outstanding discovery was the partial skeleton (disarticulated of course) of a large swan-like bird which may be a new species. Apparently, the carcass of this bird was washed the full length of the cave to where it was buried behind a rock, or possibly the injured or trapped bird made its own way there to die from thirst and starvation.

At the end of the March 14-15 trip, it was estimated that only one day's work by four people would be needed to finish all safe and practicable digging, and it was therefore left until such time as a large party in the area could spare people to finish the job. Attention was therefore turned to the salvage excavation of a cave near Comaum (U118). Fred Aslin had made initial collections in June 1980 and the second trip took place on April 4-5, 1981. A third trip was scheduled for December 5-6, at which time Fred took some of the party back to Henschkes. There they received a shock, for the site had been vandalized by amateur collectors who had churned up the last area remaining to be excavated, scattering broken bone everywhere. In their zeal, however, they had tunnelled even further into areas previously unexpected. Consequently, Fred and his helpers spent the whole weekend, rather than one short day, in retrieving the remnants of the vandalized areas, and continuing the excavation into the new region. A halt has now been called, not because the cave is worked out, but because of the difficulty of access to the extremities.

The Comaum dig is a contrast in many ways to the Henschke Fossil Cave. It is more open of access, with good daylight. The cave is much smaller and the fossil deposit sandier and therefore easier to excavate and sieve, but much poorer in number and quality of specimens. However, it is of particular interest for the contrast in faunal composition, having a relatively high proportion of carnivores, suggesting it may have been used as a lair. The presence of some koala jaws, that seem to be different from those at Henschkes and modern ones, suggests a somewhat greater age. Some charcoal samples have been taken in an effort to establish the age.

The Comaum digs have shown that the original cave was small and almost completely filled by sediment washing in. This has been partly cemented, and was in fact responsible for an incident on December 6th when one of the volunteers was hit a glancing blow by a large chunk of cemented fill that unexpectedly fell from the ceiling. Fortunately, no serious injury resulted.

As ever, the number of CEGSA members who have participated on these trips has been low. Admittedly, this is partly because the trips often have not been organized in time for inclusion in the programme, but possibly also because the work has not the "sporting glamour" of other aspects of caving.

NEVILLE PLEDGE

KANGAROO ISLAND

The only trip to the Island this year was a private honeymoon trip. The Island still has potential and needs cavers. The ranger at Kelly Hill would appreciate the chance to go caving.

MURRAY PLAINS

There was no activity in this area this year.

NULLARBOR PLAINS

This region saw quite a conglomeration of caving trips this year. The Polish expedition presumably visited the area in April. During the trip at Easter, the mapping of Madura Cave was continued and is all but completed. Thampanna Cave was explored and a Grade 2 map prepared. This cave warrants further mapping. Witches Cave was explored and extensions doubling the known extent of the cave were found. Further work is required to fully explore this cave and map it. New caves have been found near Koonalda. One has been reported to the S.A. Museum because of hand prints in the cave. Levelling in the Easter Extension was continued at Christmas time. During the October long-weekend a group of Scouts were led on a condensed guided tour of the Nullarbor from Eucla to Nullarbor National Park.

UPPER SOUTH EAST

Activity in this area was considerably less this year. Despite a down turn in activity several new caves were discovered near Hynam, Padthaway and Penola. The dinner at Naracoorte in June was well patronised by CEGSA personnel.

LOWER SOUTH EAST

Most trips to the Lower South East were primarily concerned with updating location data for caves. As a result the numbers are leaping ahead. It's a long slow process of transferring information from Fred's files to CEGSA files. Fred has been kept busy with his snail collections from not only the South East but they rest of the State. The management plan for Tantanoola Caves Conservation Park should be published some time next year. Plans to modify the Tantanoola Lake Cave gate to allow breathing were submitted to National Parks and the work should be done during 1982.

ADELAIDE REGION

Several field days for S & T training were held during the year. However despite requests for these and rescue exercises they were poorly attended.

Several visits were made to Carrickalinga Cave and the Cave near Mount Compass. A map was produced of the cave near Mount Compass.

YORKE PENINSULA

Corra-Lynn continued its role as an introductory cave for novices for both CEGSA and others. Some surveying was done but the surveyor/draughtsman was pre-occupied this year with other places.

Town Well Cave received a couple of visits, one to show the Police Special Tasks and Rescue (STAR) Force how a cave so close to another – Corra-Lynn - can be so different in character. One is dry with dirt fill, the other is wet with flowstone-cemented fill. It was agreed that CEGSA's help would be required for anything but a simple cave.
