SAFETY AND TRAINING REPORT

In what was almost a repeat of the incident at Naracoorte in 1984, two locals were once again reported in being overdue from U14. They were found in relatively short time by the local emergency services. One had to be assisted out of the cave. They had simply run out of light.

CEGSA was involved in a search for a missing caver near Adelaide. One of our members was reported overdue from A2. He was found later that day, safe, but totally unaware of the efforts to find him. He aborted his visit to the cave and travelled along the coast, forgetting to inform anyone of his change in plans.

No matter how experienced we are, the rules of safe caving conduct must be adhered to. The correct amount and type of equipment should always be carried. Somebody should be informed when we enter and leave a cave.

After several aborted attempts a training day was finally held at Morialta during the year. It was well attended by both new and older members. Laddering, belaying and abseiling techniques were practised. Everyone who attended learnt something on the day. More are planned for 1986 so I hope they are as well attended.

RECORDS REPORT

The club's records continue to increase in volume and significance. Three decades of data is stored, and to those not familiar with the system, this may appear to be a huge mass of paper with letters, numbers and strange lines and squiggles on it. However, the group's records are a valuable knowledge store and data base, which is accessible upon request to club members and a wide variety of other groups and government departments.

In moving with the electronic age, much effort is being made to convert records into a format which is able to be stored in computer mass storage systems, and thus be retrieved in various user definable formats

Already, Graham has cave survey co-ordinates, cave locations, cave descriptions and other data for a considerable number of caves of the Nullarbor region on computer file. The club's newsletter, is stored on disk, and publications will be on disk, thus making future updates and corrections (if needed) considerably easier. The maps and early records were microfilmed during the year.

The main aim of a good records system, is efficient retrieval of information, and nowadays with computers at our side, this task is lessened. However, much of our data is not yet on computer files, and thus the appeal is out for willing people to help update Records, by assisting at Records evenings.

ADELAIDE REGION

Once again this area received little attention during the year, despite being our closest caving area. A trip to Burnside Mines was the only programmed trip. There were however other trips to Carrickalinga Cave and Reynella Quarry. A State Emergency Service exercise with CEGSA members as observers was to have been held at Carrickalinga but a change of ownership has now prevented access to the cave. The exercise was subsequently held at Reynella Quarry. The locks on the access gate to Reynella Quarry have been changed by someone so our key is now useless. Chris Hales and Jack Hayward have been surveying some of the sea caves at Second Valley. Which of these caves is A8 or A9 appears very hard to determine and is causing a few problems in numbering caves.

A successful training day was held at Morialta. The annual Hobby Fair at which the Group participated provided good public exposure for the Group.

EYRE PENINSULA

A trip to Eyre Peninsula during the Easter period by Max Meth and George Parker investigated caves in the Lake Hamilton region. Several sea caves were found as well as about 15 dry features. Some of these were known caves but those that are new features are being added to the records system.

FLINDERS RANGES

The Flinders area was popular in 1985. Two major trips to the Northern Flinders took place, and several were made to the South Flinders

Searches in the Gammon Ranges, resulted in the discovery of three new caves - F52, F51, F50 - in an area pocketed with dolomite and limestone.

Caves were discovered on the Wilcowie Homestead and Holowilena South Stations - F56 and F54. Old reports of caves referred to in Records, were followed up, and significant caves were found along Walpunda Creek - F55, F53, - an area richly endowed in Archaeocyatha limestone and dolomite.

A cave search in Telowie Gorge in hope of finding F22, was unsuccessful.

KANGAROO ISLAND

There were several trips to Kangaroo Island this year but only one involved CEGSA members. George Parker visited the western end of the Island at Christmas time to check the burnt out areas of Flinders Chase National Park for caves.

Neville Pledge reported a new cave at Pelican Lagoon. There are reports of other caves in the area. Although they may not lead to a vast network of passages very little is known about caves on the eastern end of the Island.

Several interstate groups caved on the Island and in many cases found extensive cave systems in what have often been regarded as only poky little holes by us.

The Island is probably the best area we have for new cave potential (after the Nullarbor of course) and with little organisation can be just as accessible as Naracoorte or Yorke Peninsula.

LOWER SOUTH EAST

There were only a few recorded trips to the Lower South East this year. Despite the lack of trips the amount of work accomplished has been relatively high. Rendlesham Cave was revisited and a new map of the cave prepared. Negotiations were started with Woods & Forests to preserve caves in the Mt. Burr Forest. Several members have been tidying up loose ends on some outstanding surveys.

In the later part of the year CEGSA was involved with discussions with several government departments regarding access to caves and conservation of caves on crown land.

MURRAY PLAINS

A trip to the Waikerie area was made subsequent to an examination by Bill Parker of the book, River Murray Pilot. Two new caves were recorded in what is shown as Cave Cliffs on the maps. Several other reports were investigated on this trip but were not numbered. Another new cave near Waikerie was found in a Department of Environment and Planning heritage survey of the area. Chris Hales and Jack Haywood have been inspired to undertake surveying of many of the side passages in Punyelroo Cave.

NULLARBOR PLAINS

Several visits were made to this region by CEGSA members; other caving societies led many others. Quite a few additions and updates to the Nullarbor Caving ATLAS were collected but the highlight of the year has to be the mapping and exploration of **Old Homestead Cave**. Last year a report had come in about an extensive Mullamullang-style extension off the south doline. It was only 170m long with 200m of smaller side tunnel, but it was off the end of a 300m long Mullamullang-style tunnel that was already known. Fortunately, CEGSA did not have the data for the old nor new cave. A trip to assess the potential of the cave and map what had been found took a Corra-Lynn style look at the north doline and broke through into several km of cave. Not only did the find make Old Homestead the second-largest dry cave on the Nullarbor, but it differs from the accepted meaning of large Nullarbor cave so significantly as to question the whole concept of what a "large" cave on the Nullarbor means. It is multilevel; essentially free of breakdown, being in native rock (but with small sections of Mullamullang- style tunnel, especially near the entrance); has the first conclusive example of a second doline entrance that is now only a surface claypan (bone deposits lie below it, otherwise it looks just like another roof-collapse); and runs horizontally at 65m depth, 75m? above water level. Another important feature is the number of side passages. Exploration was made by compass direction, not by tunnel size, and some side tunnels which were larger than the path taken may have been the "main" route. Warning getting lost is easy, with no main tunnel like Mullamullang, the way out is not obvious.

Many trips are planned for the coming years to find out just what we have got ourselves into

UPPER SOUTH EAST

The number of trips to the Upper South East remained at a low level again this year. Highlights of the year's activities were a trip to the Kingston Avenue Range area during Easter. Quite a few new caves were recorded and several unnumbered caves were finally given numbers. U64 was remapped and it was of interest to find that part of the cave appears to have collapsed since the last visit about 20 years ago.

CEGSA was invited to participate in a seminar organised by National Parks and Wildlife to discuss the proposed draft management plan for Naracoorte Caves Conservation Park.

The CEGSA-VSA dinner returned to Naracoorte after a spell in Mt. Gambier. The event was quite successful despite the fact that the Victorians outnumbered us.

In September members of the group took part in the filming of a segment on caving for "Storyline" by Channel 9. The event did not quite go as planned but turned out to be quite successful. Many thanks to the staff of National Parks at Naracoorte for their assistance. We have been given a copy of the segment by Channel 9 for training purposes by the Group.

YORKE PENINSULA

A trip to **Coobowie Corner Cave** lead by Chris Hales produced a complete map including the underwater section.

Most work was again directed to **Corra-Lynn Cave**. With Dayle Gilliatt on his way back to Canada via Qld, exploration slowed down this year as I insisted on mapping what we had to an acceptable standard. The length still managed to increase by 2km to 13.3km. All but 150m of the new cave is now mapped but 2km of early exploratory survey needs upgrading. The conclusion of the year's mapping was a Radio-Direction-Location survey that will enable a complete map to be produced next year.

The highlight from Corra Lynn was the finding of bone deposits which are probably 5 million years old or older. This helps us to age the cave as well; the passages have only minimally changed since the deposits were laid down showing that cave formation probably ceased millions of years ago. But does it also show that the cave is infilling much slower than has been assumed?
