PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The change to the Group's management of shrinking the Committee and expanding the role of co-opted Office Bearers has been a very effective way to distribute the paper work. It has enabled members to have a better focus. In 1993 it is hoped that the sharing of tasks will be expanded to include more of the Group's members.

This was the inaugural year for the South Australian Speleological Council even though it had existed informally for over a year. The SASC now represents the Australian Speleological Federation within SA and speaks on behalf of the ASF. We no longer need to wait a year for each (remote) decision and can offer more locally applicable solutions to local topics as they arise.

One such local issue is that of caver accreditation, mainly for use by the SA NPWS so that clerks in Adelaide and new Rangers can assess the appropriate experience of strangers who turn up asking for permission to cave. Until now it was who you knew or the letters behind your name that got you in. Not always to the well-being of the caves.

The accreditation issue has now gone Australia wide and the ASF has had to step in to co-ordinate the caver response. 1993 will see the first attempt at implementing an accreditation scheme, using SA for the trial (he who pushes gets pushed). We should all be grateful to those few who have done so much to ensure that caver qualifications are under the control of those with caving experience, and that includes the NPWS.

I thank those who helped us get through the year without mishap - all you cavers out there - as well as the core of paper pushers that kept the people happily ignorant of the effort needed to run a group like ours. My special thanks to Peter Horne who stepped in to fill the post of Secretary and then did the job "beyond the call of duty" acting as the now defunct Vice-President as needed.

To sum up 1992, I would say that a revival is in hand with cave access now taking an equal rather than dominant position along with the joys of caving.

SAFETY and TRAINING REPORT

During 1992 the energies of the Safety and Training Officer have been diverted mostly into the new caving leadership committee of the SA Speleological Council, in which all the Safety or Training Officers of each of the SA caving clubs are represented.

This committee developed a National Caving Leadership Proposal which was presented to caving representatives in Tasmania, after a National Outdoor Leadership Conference hosted by the Tasmanian Department of Recreation and Sport, in July 1992.

This proposal was also handed onto the ASF Working Committee on Caver Accreditation.

At the ASF Council meeting at Launceston in January 1993, the SA Speleological Council was authorised to conduct the ASF National Caving Leadership Scheme as a pilot program over the next two years, and to work with individual clubs or States who wish to be involved in this piloting process.

To assist this, Alan Jevons has been asked to be the convenor of a new Commission of the ASF, the National Caving Leadership Standards Commission, and Peter Kraehenbuehl has been co-opted onto the ASF Executive as a non voting Vice President, to oversee the implementation process.

One Caving Skills course was run towards the beginning of 1992, which was reasonably attended by members. This course will continue to be run in conjunction with the Scout Caving Group at this stage and may include other clubs in the future.

Two accidents this year have highlighted some problems for members in conducting trips.

The first involved a member falling several metres off a ladder when he thought he was being belayed, fortunately without further incident.

Although many theories on communications on "difficult-to-hear-pitches" were put forward as the reason for the incident, a more enlightened analysis suggests otherwise.

There were too many people on the trip, a number were inadequately experienced to safely ladder the pitch length, and there was no clearly defined "leader" to sort out these problems as they occurred. To the credit of those on the trip, the problems were rectified, however it pointed out that on a trip where people of lesser experience attend there is a need to ensure they know clearly what is going to be the procedures of the trip. Whether we are prepared to accept it or not, the more experienced cavers in a party must provide guidance to novices who cave with them.

The second incident occurred on a walking track from Mystery Creek Cave in Tasmania, where a member slipped on mud covered logs and did some soft tissue injury to his knee.

A late exit from the cave and fatigue of the injured contributed to the accident. This is a warning to those on extended caving trips, where accumulated fatigue can cause accidents in unlikely situations.

The member was able to be assisted, and later carried with an improvised stretcher to transport. The rescue ran smoothly and was greatly assisted by a team who came back to check on the group, when it was thought that they were overdue.

In 1993 there will be more emphasis on training existing Full Members so they can be qualified under the Caving Leadership Scheme. Many of these members will be able to seek exemption for parts of the course because of their previous extensive caving and leadership experience.

MUSEUM REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

Eddie Rubessa and Gary Woodcock brought in a small collection of bones from Wandillo Forest cave 5L74. This included jaw fragments of the extinct short-faced kangaroos Simosthenurus occidentalis and S. maddocki, (which are well known in some Naracoorte caves) together with the bones of the ordinary kangaroos (Macropus) and brushtail possums (Trichosurus).

Bones collected some years ago from SOS cave 5U132 by Tony Calhoun are being studied. Jim McNamara of the South Australian Museum is looking at an unusual kangaroo skull which may not just be a new species but a new genus! Gavin Prideaux of the Flinders University is describing a specimen being referred to as a new species of Sthenurus. We look forward to Mark Sefton et al. finishing the survey of this cave so that we can properly locate the site of these specimens.

This year has seen the publication of two cave-related papers by the writer.

"The weird wonderful wombat Warendja wakefieldi Hope and Wilkinson" (from Comaum Forest, 5U118)

"The Curramulka Local Fauna: a late Tertiary fossil assemblage from Yorke Peninsula, South Australia" (from Corra Lynn cave, 5Y1)

Both are published in The Beagle (records of the Northern Territory Museum of Arts and Sciences), Volume 9.

EQUIPMENT OFFICER REPORT

Fortunately no equipment had been lost during the year.

The club purchased three new fifty foot long Ladders complete with traces, Which are available to members for hire. Thanks to Paul Harper, who arranged for the purchase of these ladders at a very good price.

I am making the following recommendations from my observations as Equipment Officer;

- 1 That the club cuts one of its fifty metre long eleven millimetre diameter (50m x 11mm) Dynamic Ropes in half, to provide two lengths of twenty five metres. The reason behind this is that most pitches only require a shorter length of rope for belaying.
- 2 That the club purchase at least one more PVC Rope Bag, preferably large for members to borrow.
- 3 That the club purchase at least two gear bags for members to carry hired equipment in, especially ropes.

Equipment hire went smoothly during the year, without any hang ups. There were twenty one requests for hire equipment, with the biggest demand being for keys followed by ladders.

Clara St. Dora Cave 5F4 is now fitted with the spare Abloy padlock.

CAVING ACTIVITIES



ADELAIDE HILLS

A few members of the club have visited Sellicks Hill cave during the year with little other reported activity in the Adelaide Hills area.

EYRE PENINSULA

Several new caves which were discovered in the Coffin Bay area were revisited this year and surveyed. Several more new caves were discovered in this exciting new area that has a similar geomorphological make-up as Kelly Hill on Kangaroo Island. As access is by four wheel drive only, some planning and coordination is required. I am quite sure our efforts will be well rewarded on the next trip that ventures to this wildly beautiful stretch of coastline.

FLINDERS RANGES

The Flinders Ranges showed their wetter side this year with much higher than average rainfall transforming a semi-arid area into a luxuriant area of knee deep pastures.

A number of significant trips were run to this area during 1992. Trips tend to favour the Buckalowie and Arcoota Creek areas with the popular Mairs and Clara St. Dora caves getting a high visitation.

Some historic changes in the ownership of Bagalowie Station has changed the situation of access and responsibilities for control of caves on that property. Mr Peter Rasheed, grandson of the original owners, is the new owner and his enthusiasm for the continued care and conservation of Karst features is warmly encouraged. Further karst areas have been reported on the property and these will be investigated early in 1993.

Some new features were discovered and numbered, taking the tally to 105.

KANGAROO ISLAND

By all accounts, no formal CEGSA caving trips were run to Kangaroo Island from Adelaide in 1992. A "Claytons: trip to the island was run by Peter Horne (with some overseas visitor friends) in December, where an exciting time was had by all in the tourist area of Kelly Hill cave ... but seriously, it was very useful liaison and discussion trip.

As a result of some very fruitful discussions with the Park Ranger, Robert Ellis, plans are now being made to make 1993 a very important year for the caves of Kelly Hill area if manpower can be found to undertake a number of suggested tasks, and we are looking forward to working with Robert in the coming year.

LOWER SOUTH EAST

Activities in the Lower South East have, as usual, consisted of numerous weekend trips and a wide variety of tasks of a relatively minor nature, with no particularly spectacular discoveries made this year.

Several digging-related trips were run from Adelaide for the purposes of further penetrating 5L74 (where quite a few extra metres of passage were found after many hours of hard work by Eddie Rubessa, Stan Flavel and others), and a fairly major effort by about half a dozen dedicated members resulted in Hunters cave 5L220 being protected by a sturdy circular rabbit-proof fence.

"Locals" Kevin Mott and Fred Aslin continued with their levelling work at various sites, and Kevin also undertook a bit of local surveying around Gran Gran Corner to try to sort out some confusion there. In addition, Kevin and Fred were heavily involved in the running of the search and rescue exercises in the region, as well as assisting with the formulation of the "G3 Activation Plan" for emergency call-outs.

Other work undertaken during the year included Peter Horne's "cave entrance" visits (mainly for photography purposes for his illustrated South East cave reference book), involving some 88 caves and associated karst features, and some recreational trips in places like Morgins cave and 5L304.

Peter and other members of the Cave Divers Association of Australia and the South Australian Underwater Speleo Society were also involved in numerous underwater mapping and research projects, including Little Blue Lake 5L9, Allendale Sinkhole 5L11, The Pines 5L61, Alleyns cave 5L84/85, Tank cave 5L230, Iddlebidy cave 5L250 and Nettle-Bed cave 5L290, and many of these projects are still ongoing.

1993 looks like it will be a relatively busy year again!

MURRAY PLAINS

During the year, members of CEGSA made a number of visits to Punyerloo cave. A number of these trips led by Mark Sefton had the objective to complete the survey of the cave. It took four such dedicated trips, each in excess of 8 hours to bring this, the most detailed survey of the cave to conclusion (however, see below). All of the data has not yet been processed but the survey should be available soon.

In addition to surveying, other tasks were carried out, such as the photography of the main features of the cave and detailed examination of the inscription at "Randells Rock". A full report is in preparation.

During the last surveying trip, a small draughting hole was noticed (blowing out) and in a later visit, Steve Milner and Nigel Dobson-Keeffe excavated the floor. After half an hour of digging they entered approximately fifteen metres of virgin cave. At the end of this cross rift there is yet another draughting hole and it is currently the subject of a great deal of attention. So much for having thought that we had completed the survey of the cave!

NULLARBOR PLAINS

Several trips have been run this year, mainly to traditional Western Australian areas around Eucla, Mundrabilla, Madura and Cocklebidy. Two brief trips have also been run to areas in the Nullarbor National Park in South Australia. These trips have resulted in many karst features being added to our Records.

As well, this year saw a concerted attempt to sort out the Nullarbor Records. A total of 634 karst features are now numbered. There are still about 400 features which are known, but which are not numbered because location and description data are not adequate.

Rockholes are now being included in Records. About 30 have been numbered, and a further 200 are known. Rockholes are karst features and many have historical interest. Cavers do visit them and these visits could (should) be recorded. Also, in some areas, rockholes serve as useful geographical sign posts.

\$1200 was donated to CEGSA by the Federal Nullarbor World Heritage study team for copies of the Nullarbor Atlas, cave maps, and the latest karst data. After direct expenses were covered (\$400), the balance was used for:- purchase of Nullarbor topographic maps (\$300); extra Atlas copies (editions 1 & 2) for CEGSA Records and as working copies (\$200); correspondence on Nullarbor issues including photocopying (\$100); and sundry costs such as paper & computer disks (\$20); and future data gathering/correspondence costs (\$180). Edition 3 of the Atlas keeps drifting away - about 200 features, most surveyed, were added in the last year! Maybe we can find a benefactor willing to pay for a full-time collator to produce the Atlas?

No major cave mapping was done during the year.

UPPER SOUTH EAST

Naracoorte is a well visited area for Speleo activities and 1992 was no exception. Numerous trips to the area occurred throughout the year, unfortunately trip reports did not appear in the Newsletter for all trips.

Two important projects are currently being undertaken. The first, a distribution and count of cave cricket, Novotettix naracoortensis, and other data impacting upon the cricket's life cycle. This project is being carried out by Ron Simms and his assistants. Ron is recognised by the CSIRO as the only current cave cricket authority in Australia. The second project is an exploratory excavation in Robertson cave by veteran speleo-hound Grant Gartrell and his assistants.

Other activities included the Search and Rescue training course with the CFS and NPWS under the supervision of Fred Aslin and Kevin Mott.

There is, however, a considerable amount of survey work still to be completed but this has lapsed due to personal and work related commitments by group members.

CEGSA members should consider visiting the lesser known caves in the area for their natural value and the possibility that they may contain that unknown extension, just waiting to be discovered.

YORKE PENINSULA

There were 22 trips run to Corra Lynn Cave this year. 12 were by CEGSA, including a trip to help the farmer install rabbit-proof fencing around the cave block, and 2 "collapse" dig trips.

A collapse occurred in mid January 1992 after a faulty watering trough poured water onto the ground for about a week. Luckily the trough and nearby fence were not damaged. After permission and help from the owners, CEGSA led two trips to dig out the collapse to evaluate the prospects of an entrance into the Dreamland area as both an emergency exit on the other side of the Alberta and as a means of extracting some of the 5 million year old cemented sand-bone breccia of the Graveyard area. The prolonged wet spell hampered trips and shoring was delayed. A secondary slump of the dig has already occurred. In 1993 we intend to install a lifting gantry as well as shoring up the soil section. The collapse is evident in Dreamland at about 15m below ground level. Let's hope that the fissure remains wide enough for human access all the way!

Paul Harper and his team have been pressing on with the Guz Off North dig. It is now about 25m in from the initial blockage including 14m of open tunnel discovered beyond the first debris filled fissure.

The required trip to complete the survey of Corra Lynn Cave was NOT made! However, a preliminary three level map of the total cave has been prepared.

To pay for the necessary amenities needed for the Corra Lynn Cave block (a new toilet, water point, fencing, trees etc), a levy of \$1 per person per year will be charged until paid for. It should take no more than 2 years to recover the costs since the Slaters (owners) have paid for the most expensive items - the rabbit-proof fencing and rabbit extermination.

INTERSTATE

The emphasis has been on visits to Tasmania this year for the interstate trips held by members. This was prompted by the TAS TROG conference and one of our members temporarily working in the north of that state.

The most visited area was Mole Creek, but Gunns Plains, Julius River, and Ida Bay all received visits by members. The local clubs were most helpful in providing advice and running trips either as part of the pre or post conference trips and at other times. A particular thanks must go to the Northern Caverneers, and to the Savage River Caving Club.

Members also assisted the Karst Officer in Tasmania, Ian Houshold in post conference work trips to Little Grunt at Ida Bay, and track cleaning in Kubla Khan cave.

It has even been rumoured that Eddy Rubessa has had a cave named in his honour, Crow Cave, at Julius River.

During the year a few members of the group visited the Mount Eccles area of Victoria to experience the Volcanic karst features found there. Members of the group also visited the Nullarbor Plains, Western Australia.
