



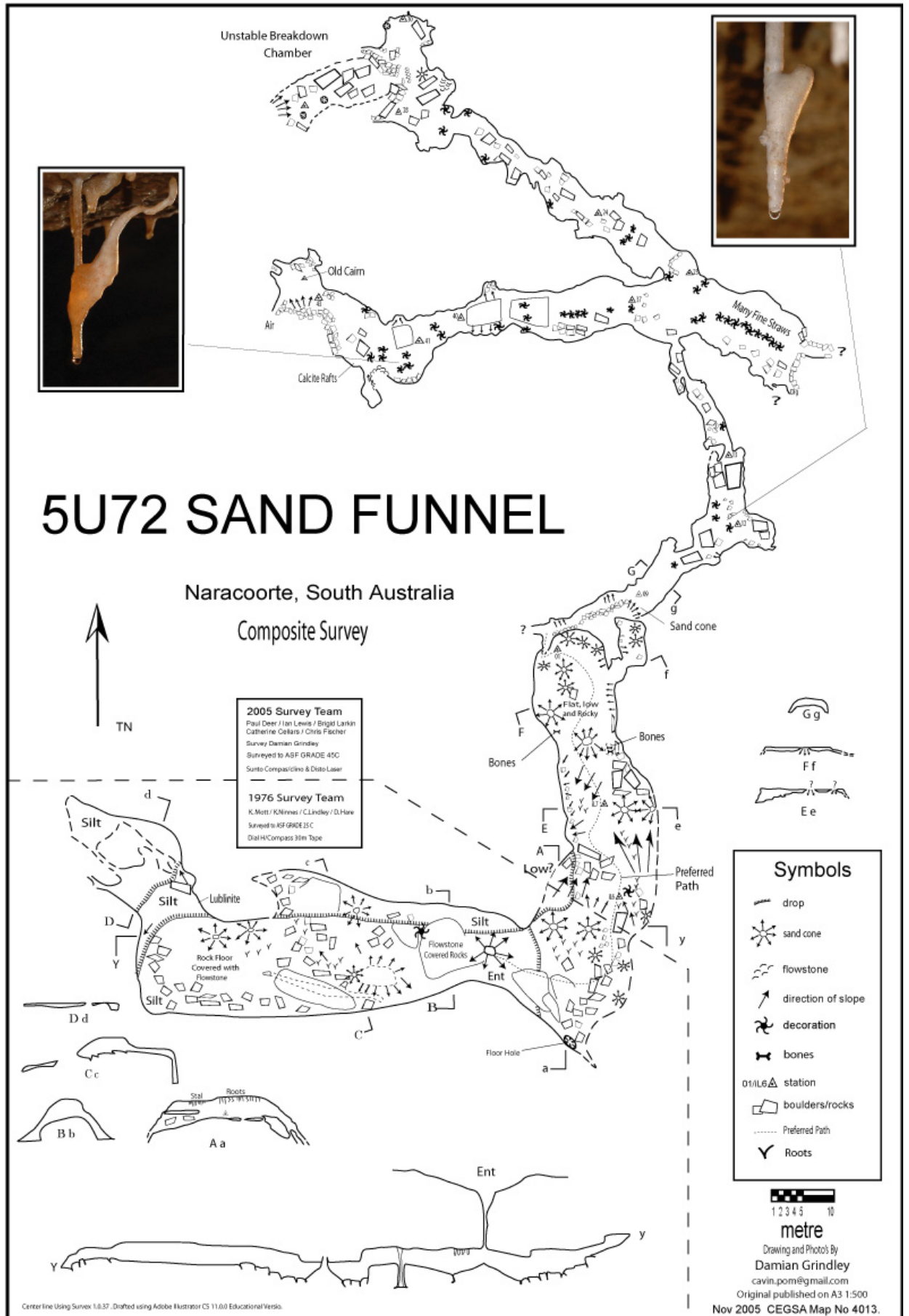

Thylacoleo's proper name – just the fex and nothing but the fex!!

Well, you could have knocked me over with a wet bat, just like the time one flew right into my face in a passage in the Flinders Ranges! There I was, confidently sitting in the chair as Secretary and reading CEGSA minutes to the floor, discussing the discoveries by Ray Gibbons and others in 2002 of some amazing Nullarbor cave fossils including the astonishingly-intact skeleton of the *Thylacoleo* "Sleeping Beauty", when (thanks to howls from the floor from certain pedants) I was mortified to learn that for all these years I had been misspelling the scientific name of our famous extinct Australian "marsupial lion", *Thylacoleo carnifex*, as "*carniFLEX*"!

Carniflex instead of carnifex?? Why on earth hadn't I picked that one up before? What was the reason, I wondered (apart from my obviously poor grasping of the English language!), why I had automatically thought that it had an "l" there? There must be some major scientifically-interesting reason for this kind of thought process – I mean, "flex" is a sensible word, but "fex" just doesn't want to roll off one's tongue; kind of feels like it is missing something and is even unpleasant to say! I pondered and pondered this issue (as members know, I like ponds!) for ages as I was so embarrassed to have made such a blunder ... then, bowl me over with a sleepy lizard, I chanced to stumble across the probable answer in early December in the form of an Internet article entitled *Dealing with those confusing fish names* by Kevin Thurston (*CAS Newsletter and Aquarist*, Colorado Aquarium Society at <http://www.coloradoaquarium.org>; article found at http://www.aquarticles.com/articles/literature/Thurston_Names.html):

"... One of the problems with handling (scientific) names has to do with the way people read. Most people read by word recognition ... they don't parse every letter in a word, they just recognize the general form of a word and assume that the word they see is the one they recognize. This doesn't work very well in the world of scientific names because few people recognize them when they see them and just give up. Some they alter to suit their perception. Consider that there is no "l" in "Tubifex", yet so many insist on pronouncing it as Tubiflex. The way to overcome the difficulty in reading scientific names is to go back to your first grade teacher's admonition to sound it out. It may seem embarrassing, but it is far better than mangling the name in the horrid ways that have resulted in a major label calling their product Tubiflex".

I was intrigued about this – was it such a common problem that Tubifex actually changed its name to include the "l" to accommodate the lazy public?? So I used the Google Internet engine to see what other examples of this kind of thing happen – and discovered that there were HEAPS! A LOT of people called Tubifex "Tubiflex", and the same went for Hardifex/flex, Durafex/Duraflex and Luxafex/Luxaflex. AND just to make my day, I found FOUR other entries with *Thylacoleo carniFLEX* too (and one of these was a Spanish encyclopedia)!

So there you have it – it really goes to show the effect of carelessness in cave research work, and it's equally important to realize that there isn't a great deal of **flexibility** in our scientifically-related pastime!

TRIP REPORTS

Murraylands 26th to 30th December 2005

Participants: Lance Hoey, Barbara Wiesner, George and June MacLucas, Stan Flavel and family.

Caves visited: M1 (Swan Reach Cave), M7 (Bakara Well Cave), M8, M9 (Well It Wasn't There Last Year Cave), M10 (Tobacco Tree Cave), M11 (Sleezy Lizard Cave), M12 (Tapering Cave), M13 (Broken Mirror Cave), M14, M15, M16, M17, M18 (River Road Cave), M19 (Allawah Cave), M20 (Cave Cliffs Cave), M22, M23 (Hawker's Cave), M24.

After having planned a trip to the Riverlands with Barbara over the Christmas break, I mentioned it to George MacLucas and Stan Flavel who both expressed interest in coming along.

Barbara and I decided to meet June and George at Swan Reach Monday 26th December. We arrived at M1 Monday afternoon to find George (very dirty), June and clan coming from the cave. They had shown the cave to their son and daughter-in-law and a couple of George's work colleagues. After this, Barbara and I visited M15, 16 & 17 at the base of the cliffs along the river's edge. We stayed Monday and Tuesday nights at the caravan park.

Stan and his family met us Tuesday morning. They planned to visit M1 & M18 while June, George, Barbara and I decided to head towards Bakara. After another short stop at M15, M16, M17 to show the MacLucas's and to take photos of the entrances we were on our way to Bakara. We found the "Mantung 12 miles" sign post as shown on mud map still there. Near here we met land owner, Greg Caine. Greg was very receptive and helpful, and took us to the two caves on his property, M11 and M12.

The next cave to find was M13. On showing Greg the mud map, he told us it was on the adjoining property, owned by Mr Thompson. He pointed us in the right direction and included advice on how to return to the main road. He was extremely helpful.

Wednesday morning Stan (by himself this time) met us back at Swan Reach. MacLucas's had to return home for George's work commitments. Stan, Barbara and I returned to Bakara and visited M7, M8, M9, M10 & M14 taking GPS readings and photos of all entrances. In the afternoon we headed north, visiting M19 (Allawah Cave). Then, past Waikerie and following some door-knocking, we found M23 Hawker's Cave and M24. The 1841 date and some later 1800's graffiti are still clearly visible but we weren't able to find the Aboriginal engravings known to be in the cave. We camped that night at Overland Corner.

The next day we went looking for M20, Cave Cliffs Cave. We met the landowner at the property above the cave. He was also helpful giving directions on how to reach the river's edge, and then to double back towards the base of the cliff. We were unable to get to M21 without a boat for access, but found M22, also along the river's edge.

With temperatures in the high 30's, Stan decided to head for home, and on our return trip, heading south, we finally gave in to 42 degree heat at Mannum and did likewise.

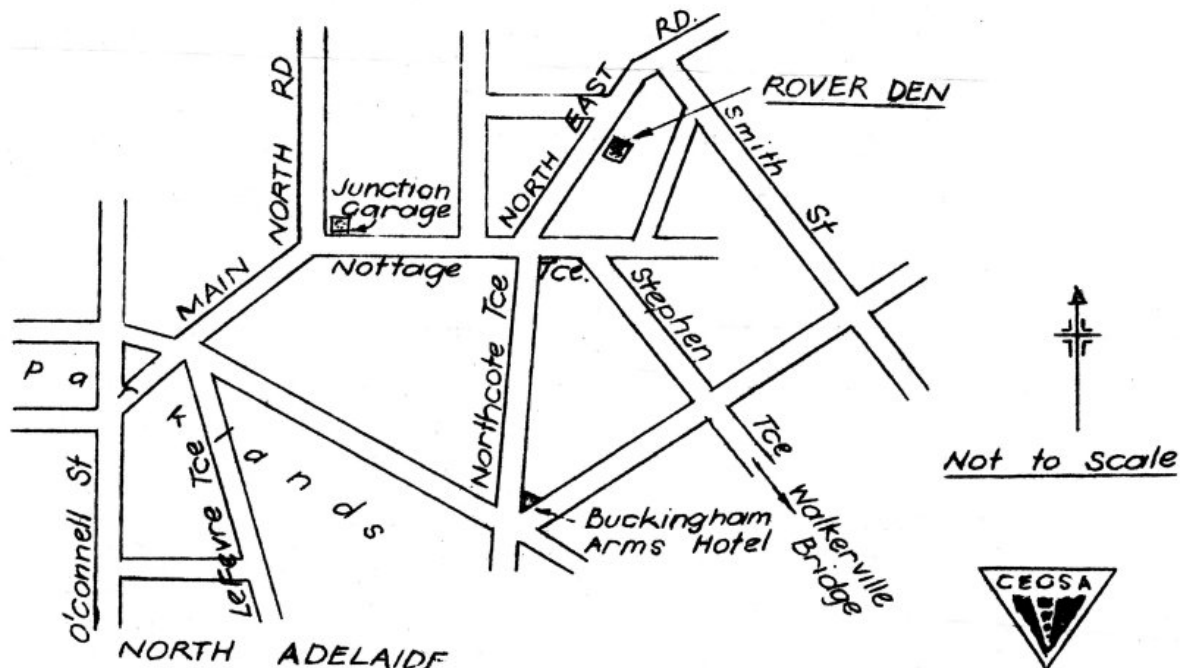

NOSTALGIA 2:- SEARCH and RESCUE NOTICE – June 1956**CAVE EXPLORATION GROUP OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA.****SEARCH AND RESCUE ORGANIZATION.****JUNE. 1956.**

1. The attached list of people have been approached, and are willing to undertake rescue work in any emergency requiring the aid of experienced cavers.
2. In the event of an emergency, members will be contacted, and be expected to make their own way to the rallying point – Gilberton Rover Scout Den – bringing only the necessary caving gear.
 - 1.e. (1) overalls.
 - (2) lamp, prickers, matches.
 - (3) torch and spares.
 - (4) helmet.
 - (5) sleeping bag and ground sheet.
3. Gear is to be picked up from the store at Gilberton Rover Scout den. (which is never locked.)
 - (1) stretcher, blankets, triangular bandage.
 - (2) safety ropes, odd lengths of rope, wire ladders.
 - (3) carbide, shellite, water containers (to be filled before leaving.)
 - (4) matches, gas goggles, prickers.
 - (5) emergency supply of food (in sausage bag.)
 - (6) search and rescue maps.
4. Transport to the caving area will be provided by the police, and the above gear should be packed into the transport by the first arrivals. Vehicle's used to travel to the pickup point can be left on the property if necessary.
