

# **EDITORIAL**

I am most disappointed and annoyed at the lack of interest shown in the newsletter. It appears that very few members consider the newsletter as being an important part of the groups function. The amount of material being presented for publication has been getting less and less with each issue over the last couple of years. Many times I have been promised reports etc. but they never eventuate, even with several reminders. This has meant that I have had to try to source material from external publications etc. with the problems of getting permission to reprint it. In a lot of cases this has not been forthcoming or is a long protracted process and is most frustrating.

I would much rather have local material that is relevant to the general membership. The newsletter is supposed to be a link with the members on what is happening in the group, particularly the country members who cannot attend the meetings. If members will not get off their proverbials and report what they have been doing then I cannot put it in the newsletter. Without the information the newsletter becomes redundant with the result that there are no written records of caving activities and cave visitation (there are never any written reports put into records). The communication channels with the membership disappear, so the membership drops off and the group eventually dies.

Perhaps we should make it mandatory that a trip coordinator submits a written report (even if preliminary to a detailed report) within three months of a trip occurring or lose the right to be a trip coordinator until it is submitted. It would not necessarily (but preferably) be for publication but to go into records so we at least have some record of what happened on the trip and to the cave.

Unless the situation improves in the near future I am just wasting my time trying to put together a newsletter and program with no information from either the membership or the committee. I am afraid I will have to relinquish my position and hope that someone else will be able to make it work, for the good of the group and the members.

Easter saw us heading to Avenue Range to continue work on the caves on what is known as the Gratzs property. Thankfully we seemed to beat most of the Easter traffic, so the trip down from Adelaide wasn't too bad (even with Christy in the car who is currently studying for a diploma of Geoscience at O'Halloran Hill TAFE). Luckily too, we were going to be able to stay in the Thomas's woolshed as the crutching had been delayed, and it's much more comfortable than staying in tents. You don't notice the smell after an hour either! After catching up with the rest of the Thomas clan Marie and I settled in and played rummiking into the early hours. Next morning was a sleep in as we were both quite tired. After a leisurely start to the morning we headed for the caves where we met up with Kevin and Fred who were having lunch on the side of the road. We geared up and headed for the caves but not before Marie had her 10 minute obligatory stuff around trying to figure out how to work out her GPS (heres a hint Marie, try reading the instructions).

On a post conference trip to the caves in January, Marie believed she found some coral encrusted bones in the back of trapdoor cave. So we decided to spend an hour or two in the cave trying to relocate and photograph them. We couldn't find those bones but we found a few other specimens that looked bone like. After taping them off and a bit more photography we decided to head out, but not before Marie took some great shots of an unusual tree root spike protruding through the cave floor. Attached to it was a small white slater like bug (see front cover photograph). With still a bit of daylight left we decided to make a start on one of our new digs G.R.10.

This was one of the many features we had found whilst walking through the bush. It started out as a small depression with a bit of limestone poking out, and looked worthy of a bit of digging. After pulling out several large rocks and chopping a very large tree root we dug out about 20 bucket fulls and called it a day. Meanwhile Fred and Kevin were busy surveying on the surface to tie in all the cave entrances, and how they related to the landscape and water levels. We left our gear at the dig and headed to the woolshed for a feed and a well deserved beer. Marie and I waited up until 1am for lan to arrive from Ballarat, and then we hit the hay.

The next day we heard that Damian wasn't going to make it so we decided to postpone our continuing survey work in Trapdoor cave. On the last trip in 2006 Damian and Kevin managed to add on another 100 metres of cave. Fortunately for them the cave was beginning to open up into walking height passages and was heading in the direction of other known caves on the property, with no end

in sight. For those not aware, Trapdoor Cave is very much like Monbulla Cave. It has a slightly lower roof, with fewer obvious walls supporting the extensive flat ceiling, and it is more heavily decorated. The main area of trapdoors entrance has large areas of floor covered in cave coral, along with numerous rim pools, stalagmites and volcano like formations, with not many walls to be seen anywhere. Another unique feature is the large tree roots that sprawl along the calcite floors with no obvious entry points. After several survey trips a connection was made with the GR9 entrance, where Kevin had spent most of their time surveying (Kevin doesn't quite fit into Trapdoors entrance).

lan, Marie and I headed out to continue our dig at

GR10 with some help from the Thomas girls, whose other halves were busy carving spears, climbing trees and running around the bush. Ian, the great digger that he is, seemed quite keen and hooked in. By the end of the day our small depression had turned into a solution tube at least 1½ metres in diameter and at least 1½ deep. Kevin and Fred continued their surface work and found another feature that Fred says might be worth having a dig at. This was added to our list of other digs going on around the property, one being a small entrance which has a cave of about 6 metres in length with a screaming breeze coming out of it.

On Sunday Christy showed us her wonderful driving skills by managing to bog her car up to the axles on the soft verge, but with a bit of bush mechanics lan managed to get her out using our digging bucket rope. We continued digging GR10 in the hope we might find some cave by the end of the day. Ian worked like a bulldozer and we almost had to fight him off to get a bit of digging done. We were down to about 3-3½ metres and found the lip of the tube. Adam arrived at just the right time in the

afternoon to help out with fresh hands and give us a break, unfortunately, lan had to leave just as Adam was starting to break through into some cave. Ian was in two minds wether to stay for the breakthrough and face the wrath of his wife or to leave. In the end, about 20 minutes after lan left Adam dug out enough to fit about a body length into the cave and take some pictures. Marie and I were both too tired to climb down the hole again after 3 days of digging, so we wait in anticipation of our next trip so we can both see how much cave we have down there. A little more digging is required, but the floor of the cave is soft and silty which will make a nice change from the shredding coral of Trapdoor. There also appears to be several areas of bone deposits.

During our walks to the caves through the bush both Ian and I had found dear antlers, so now I am trying to figure out a way to mount them on my helmet for the next trip. We are looking forward to returning to Avenue on the June long weekend, for more exploration and digging. Anyone interested in exploring and surveying virgin cave or digging out new ones, along with a relaxed social getaway should contact Marie or Kevin about joining us on our June trip.

## THE OTHER SIDE OF CAVING - Part the Three

Lest it be assumed that I am biased towards the South East of South Australia – which of course I am. I offer an interstate item.

#### **CAVE IN THE BROKEN HILL PROPRIETRY MINE**

A curious cave has been discovered in the Broken-Hill Propriety's Company's mine, in the South drive at the 316ft level in M'Culloch's shaft. It was broken into when extending the South drive. As it has only just been discovered, nothing much is known about it, but it appears to be 40ft. long, 25ft. high and 20ft. wide, and there is a good deal of carbonate of lead crystals on the side and walls. There appears to be a considerable quantity of water at the south, towards which direction the cave slopes. It also makes over the back of the drive a little way. Some foul air is still existing in the cave. The latest particulars of the cave to hand are given as follows by the correspondent of the Advertiser: "I visited the great cave broken into in driving at the 316feet level in MacCulloch's shaft. The foul air had been cleared away and we were enabled to make a complete investigation. The cave strikes downward, and there is an immense quantity of water in it up to a few feet below the 316 feet level, so that the extend of the chamber is not known. The depth of water at the extreme end of the cave is not tested being some what difficult to get at. There are beautiful crystals of lead studding the roof and sides. At the time of our visit there were men at work opening out, and the cave is now quite easy of access. The discovery has aroused much interest here, as the 316 feet level at the Propriety mine is the lowest yet reached, and there has been a good deal of speculation as to the nature of the country at that depth"

To do this, the nature and timing of the trip must be nominated to the Trip Liaison Officer and/or minuted at a General Meeting of Members. The member registering such a trip must be an accredited CEGSA Trip Coordinator and must agree to act in this capacity for the trip. There must also be an accredited trip leader with the appropriate skill endorsement to take a dependent party caving.

Also, please ensure that a report (preferably written) of the trip is submitted in a timely manner.

<sup>\*</sup> Please note that trips not arranged by an accredited Trip Coordinator and marked with a # may not be classed as an official CEGSA trip and may not be covered by any CEGSA membership benefits. \*
