## TRIP REPORTS:

# Trip to the Caves of Buckalowie Creek, 8th-10th June, 1963:

The aims of the party on this trip were:

- 1. Exploration of Mairs (F3) and Clara St. Dora (F4) Caves.
- 2. Collection of fossil bones.
- 3. Cave searching in the area.

Geologically the trip was very successful and the dig that was started in 1957 was continued and many specimens were collected for the Museum. The only find during the cave search was a natural adit about a third of a mile west of Mair's Cave and the party thinks that it is doubtful that it extends for any great distance. Two small bats were seen in the area, one in each of the caves explored. It is reported that these caves are well worth travelling the long distance from Adelaide to see. (the slides taken of the hexetites certainly back that up).

## Trip to Punyelroo 5th-7th July, 1963:

The purpose of this trip was to survey as much of the cave as possible and to train sore more surveyors. The cave was also explored in the hope of finding further extensions. On the same trip three more caves were discovered, two at Bowhill and one at Murray Bridge.

## The Discovery of the Bowhill Caves.

Bob Davies gave us his only map and we left Punyelroo on Saturday at lunchtime. The map was hopelessly inaccurate and we spent most of the afternoon looking for the ferry at Bowhill, before finding there wasn't one. At one stage we drove within 200 yards of the caves without knowing it. We finally obtained concrete directions from the storekeeper at Purnong, and located the caves at Dusk. Only two were investigated and there may be others.

PDC.

The Bowhill Caves occur in the cliffs along the Murray and are not very extensive. Y6 contained fauna - white crickets and small spiders. The Murray Bridge Cave is quite extensive but further exploration is stopped by the passage going below water level.

#### EMERGENCY RADIATOR REPAIRS

For the last item, the ubiquitous 'skid' or even 'Dawn' - no more than two sheets boiled to a pulp in a small billy, then top up with soapy water. This mixture is boil-proof, engine safe, non-abrasive, hygienic, odour free and non-habit forming.



#### DIG REPORTS:

Report on the Dig in Correll's Cave, Curramulka 18-19th May, 1963. The Dig in Richard's Extension:



From a longitudinal section of the chamber it seems that the sediment came from the roof at the far end of the chamber. It is thought that the sand may have come down a hole at the intersection of two joint planes and that the chamber might continue on the other side of the joint planes. A dig was started but a rock face was exposed after digging a distance of approximately 5 ft. It is thought that further digging along the rock face (i.e. at right angles to it) might prove more profitable. The dig was also continued upwards towards the surface for about 5 ft.

## Collection of Specimens.

Twenty-one skeletons were found in a small tunnel on the north side of the main corridor in the New Extension itself. These skeletons were complete and lying in natural positions on the floor of the passage.

Five of them were collected and taken back to Adelaide for identification. They were found to be possum and several small jaws collected were rodent. Several specimens of the trilobite <u>Pararia</u> were found in the limestone at the cave mouth.

# Report on Bone Collecting in Mair's Cave, Buckalowie Creek 8-10th June, 1963:

During the recent trip to Buckalowie Creek, many bones were collected from the floor of the main Chamber in Mairs Cave. Collecting was concentrated on skull material. Some time was spent removing two large skulls embedded in the flowstone floor, which on examination proved to be those of an ordinary kangaroo and possibly a bird.

A little time was spent deepening the 1957 dig and two hitherto unseen strata were penetrated, until lack of time and a flowstone layer prevented further digging. All the sediment taken from the strata was collected and later sifted - dozens of small teeth were collected, plus a few small jaws. Although a detailed examination has yet to be made of the bones collected from these layers, it is evident that they contain those of rodents. Previously it had been recorded that the remnants of rodents have not been found as low as this in the sequence.

Perhaps the most interesting specimen collected was a large well preserved skull of a 'Tasmanian Wolf'. This was found on a ledge on a wall of the main chamber, and it has since been ascertained that this was first found by members of the 1957 trip to the cave.

Dr. Brian Daily is in the process of identifying the bones and when this has been completed will send them to the South Australian Museum with a detailed report.
