SAFETY NOTES

A copy of "Equipment for Mountaineering" prepared and published by the Melbourne University Mountaineering Club, has been obtained for the Group Library. This book is worthy of a place in every cavers' bookcase, notable chapters being those on homemade camp gear and first-aid kits. - Available from the Scout Shop (45c.).

<u>Helmets</u>. "All applicants must own an approved helmet...."

Approved helmets are available in several different patterns, made of one of four materials.

Compressed Fibre. Mostly of European origin, these are the "old originals" owned by some of our more senior members. They are generally strong but tend to disintegrate if allowed to remain very wet for long periods. They are not commonly available nowadays.

Fibre Glass. "Protector" Safety Equipment, and "Mining Supplies (S.A. Ltd)". The material used in these helmets is very strong but brittle and tends to flake off a little around the edges. They are made with a full brim which is wider over the back of the neck than in front.

<u>Plastic</u>. "Protector", "Mine Safety Appliances Ltd." These helmets are most popular on industrial sites, being available both in full brim and peaked-cap style. They do not withstand extremes of heat, but wear well.

Aluminium. "Mine Safety Appliances Ltd.". The lightest weight in helmets, these fairly recent additions to the popular market suffer from a very inferior harness and poor brim shape, protruding too far in front and too little at the back and sides. Ex. WW II "Tin hats" are definitely out being far too heavy and insecure on the head. All helmets should have a chin strap for use on vertical pitches. Endless argument could be had over the pros and cons of whether to have a full brim or peaked cap style. The former undoubtedly affords more protection to the neck and shoulders from falling rocks in vertical Pitches. However it is found that in many South Australian caves such a helmet needs to be removed at frequent intervals to negotiate a tight squeeze. Now it is in these very places that a caver is most likely to hit his head against a rock, so a brimless helmet is a distinctive advantage under these conditions.

It is my opinion that the best compromise is a wide brim helmet cut down to give a half inch brim at the sides and rear, and a rounded peak at the front.

I am happy to invite discussion on the above advice. - What's your theory?

Geomorphology of the Nullarbor Plains

Anybody in possession of C.E.G.S.A. Occasional Paper No. 2 - "A Preliminary Report on the Karst Morphology of the Nullarbor Plains" by J.N. Jennings (1961), is welcome on request to a brief follow up paper by that author.

Of five pages, it is entitled "A Note for the C.E.G.S.A. 1965-66 Nullarbor Expedition"; it was written especially for the trip and was intended to modify the early paper and to indicate some of the general points emerging from work carried out after 1961.

Nostalgia Corner - or 10 years (sob) Ago

24th April 1956 - The C.E.G.S.A. Emblem was adopted as designed by Ian Dunlop. At the same general meeting entertainment was described in the programme as "bring cave muscles and ground sheet." It was a trap. Everybody who turned up was sent to Curramulka on our first S&R Scramble as the next day (Anzac Day) was a midweek holiday.

19th June 1956 - in Committee - The President reported on proposed Federation arrangements. Mr. B.J. O'Brien would take the chair and C.E.G.S.A. would handle local arrangements. The Federation Camp at Parnanga was to open on 26/12/56 and arrangements for the Nullarbor and Kangaroo Island trips that would follow were announced.

PAST TRIPS:

Mullamullang Revisited - Easter 1966

Ten C.E.G.S.A. starters led by Alan Hill set out for a follow-up ten day trip to Mullamullang this Easter. Hilly - Tom Wigley - Tony Dillon - Peter Hawkes - Geoff Hamilton - Bert Young - Dennis Shearing - Ian Holt - Tony Barker and John Ford set out in three private vehicles with sufficient objectives to last a month at the cave and to cut the detail - the trip was an unqualified success.

The Blowhole over Camp I had already been visited by Bruce Robinson and party from W.A., and as it had no potential was moved from the top to the bottom of our list.

A traverse was made from the doline to the water at Oasis Valley as a checkout on Ted Anderson's figures and to confirm the depth of the cave from the surface. Except from a constant magnetic zero error, the original survey was found to be excellent and the depth of the cave is now recorded as approximately 390' from the plain to water.

The Smoko Junction by-pass was mapped and several samples and specimens were taken of water incrustations - bats - fossils. The long eared bat Nyetophilus geoffroyi seems to be a common visitor to the cave but the "eyeless cockroach" was not seen alive this trip.

Tom "Ton-up" Wigley insisted on persevering with side passages until he made a mile, most of which was found in the "Easter Extension" leading off the bulge opposite the small pool in Oasis Valley. Most of this was mapped to grade 4.

There was some time for Tourism and a small party went on to Camp 1 and Lake Cigalare whilst sketching of the main cave was completed from the Drop-Off to White Lake.

Outside the cave the elusive "12th Hole" was descended for the first time but again - no real cave was found.

Aneroid traversing was carried out from the sea to Mullamullang and now it appears that the water table there is only 20' above sealevel from our early calculations.

The position of the Blowhole near Camp I was fixed.

Last but not least, about ten minutes of underground film was shot in 16mm colour using the <u>Diprotodon Hillii</u> and <u>D. Hillii var.</u> economy. Stills back already indicate these shots should be most successful and materially add to the film in hand.

The weather was good except in the storm/wind/rain/fog. The storm was frustratingly photogenic, the wind was too much for scout tents, rain was negligible and Tom took a hand with the fog by commanding it to do the right thing.

The trip had its casualties. Bert Young broke a finger in a fall and there is a trail of Rover and Holden parts from here to Madura. The Toyota would have been left there except we carried it backwards for 200 yds out of a coastal sand dune.

In conclusion the trip was a Ball and our special thanks go to the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs Smith of the Madura Hotel. With their help the "Refrigerator" was named, the second blowhole on the right in the doline where our butter and other essentials were kept at a steady $65\,^{\circ}\mathrm{F}$

Beekeepers Cave Naracoorte 19-20th March 1966

Led A.L. Hill and attended by X people (X = approx 20). At least 12 people passed the Sump in Beekeepers for a mapping trip. One party mapped to a better grade part of the main tunnell, and the other party went to the end of the right hand lead and mapped another new 200'.

<u>Diprotodon Hillii</u> was used in the field for the first time in the bigger caves there and produced a few reasonable photographs in the Cathedral, Bat and Big Caves.
