Editorial.

There have been quite a few trips in recent weeks but trip reports are slow in coming in. At Exit Cave exploration and surveying have been centred on the Hammer Passage extension. The total length of surveyed passages in Exit Cave now stands at $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and there is more to be done. Exploration of another side passage in the first part of the cave led to the discovery of another two surface entrances. Surface exploration at Damper Inn has so far located one cave about 12 ft. long but we haven't given up hope. At Mole Creek an exciting new hole has been discovered near Horries Hole and Hidden Cave. It has a strong draught but despite some digging is not yet big enough to enter. Stronger measures are being considered. The material for our climbing pole has been purchased and some members are hard at work to do the necessary filing, marking and drilling. We hope to have it ready for testing in a few weeks.

Australian Speleological Federation - MORIBUND OR DEFUNCT???

Our members have been asking - and with good reason - if the federation is still in existence. Its last newsletter was dated more than a year ago - April 1967. It was well and truly out of date by the time it was published. One of the main aims of the federation should be to keep member clubs in touch with each others activities by publishing a regular newsletter. At the Victorian conference in December, 1966 the member societies reluctantly agreed to increase A.S.F. contributions to 50 cents for every full member in order to enable the federation to finance such a newsletter. The newsletter editor convinced the conference that with more money a better job could be done. Instead things have gone from bad to worse. At the Orange conference the club instructed its proxy to vote against re-election of the editor but never-the-less he was duly re-elected. Since then he has fully jusified our opposition to his re-election by doing absolutely NOTHING.

If we know what went on at the Orange committee meeting it is thanks to our proxy, Ian Nankivell of the Canberra Speleological Society, who gave us a detailed report. Nothing has been heard from the new A.S.F. secretary. No appeal has been opened for the Edie Smith award established by the Orange conference. The A.S.F. treasurer also has made no attempt to do his job. Ever since the A.S.F. committee was doubled in size the amount of work it has managed to do has steadily decreased.

The only A.S.F. committee member who can be proud of his job is the handbook editor who has spent a lot of time and energy to make the A.S.F. handbook a reality. It is to be hoped that the Adelaide conference will take a good long look at the situation. It was here that the federation was launched with great plans for the future. May it not become its last resting place.

TRIP REPORTS.

Mole Creek - Easter weekend (with apologies for delay.)

Party: - Rodney Hughes, Bill Hodge, Dick Chuter, Kevin Kipling, and John Cunningham (Sun. and Mon.) Friday: - We arrived at the Forestry Camp around lunch time and left soon afterwards for Lynds Cave. Kevin went underground for the first time in Tasmania and appeared eager to get back into the swim, literally. That is to say he managed to take up a lot of water during our brief two hours of caving and came out looking rather sodden. Bill consumed far to many goodies on the way up and was temporarily wedged in the talus. He elected to stay at this point and we roused the recumbent form on our way out. It was surprising to note how quickly the water fell while we were on the far side of the rock fall and the appearance of things had quite changed when we returned. Saturday: - The trip to Kubla was underway by 9.30 a.m. (which is surprising) but it took a long time to get everyone down to the river and Kevin, Rodney and Dick did not begin the climb until about 12.30. Kevin seemed rather impressed with the high-level route and has probably ordered his wet suit for swimming next time. After one or two false trails we reached Cairn Hall. A shortage of eye-bolts caused Rodney to do some hair-raising acrobatics before a ladder could be put down at the flowstone bank. We arrived in the chamber of Xanadu at 2.30 feeling rather tired but managed to revive on a brew of coffee. - The trail of garbage along the route(a detailed list can be supplied on request) caused someone to remark "There must be another entrance." - enough said. With the exception of some magnificent leaps from one wall to the other, the return trip via the high level route was uneventful and we were hauled to the surface by Bill at about 5.30p.m. There followed a trip to Lamberts Grotto where we found some members of the S.C.S. and much pleasant caving was done. Sunday: No enthusiasm for caves could be fired. Rodney and Bill appeared to be suffering some sort of "battle-fatigue" and remained in bed for most of the day. John, Dick and Kevin drove out to Caveside to see S.C.S. members but no trace of these bodies could be found and a proposed combined trip did not take place. Later in the day John and Dick went fishing in Lake Rowallan and bagged one Rainbow which was donated to Bill for a very good reason.

Monday: Surface exploration of an area not many miles from the campsite revealed a very tight fissure and some silted potholes.

The largest of these had a very hollow sound and digging was commenced. Example of the bage of the game hill released a strong menced. Excavation at the base of the same hill released a strong cold draught which could lead into a new system. The party left Liena at 4 p.m. for Hobart, an exciting journey in top gear all the way. At least Dick's hub-caps came in handy as dinner plates and somp-bowls, his gear lever was of no use what-so-ever!!

Exit Cave - 20,21 April, 1968.

Party:- Brian and Jeanette Collin, Kevin Maclaine.

Saturday was spent in another attempt at determining the extent of the limestone outcrop to the west of Exit Cave. Horizontally bedded limestone was found in one location and about four small sink holes were found in the dolerite scree that apparently overlies the limestone. The scrub was thick in places, progress was slow and navigation hopeless.

The general impression gained from two trips to this area is that the top of the limestone is lower than that covering Exit Cave.

Further exploration is required and I think this can only be carried out effectively if a blazed trail is first made across the area to enable any features found to be related to each other.

Saturdaynight was spent underground at No.1 base camp and on Sunday approx. 150 track markers were placed in the three high level areas. The markers consisted of small plastic tags fixed to 3" galvinised iron nails.

Damper Inn - 28 April, 1968.

Party: - Albert Goede(leader), Brian and Jeanette Collin.

We left Hobert before daybreak and reached the Scotts Peak Road barrier at 8.40 a.m. We followed the Gordon track to its junction with the Port Davey track and followed the latter north. The first

part of the track is much overgrown with tea tree but further north it enters rain forest and the going is much easier through some delightful country. Damper Inn was reached but since most of the roof is gone it would not be an ideal place to spend the night. Another ten minutes north of here we found a small creek emerging from the hillside only to flow underground after a few yards into a small cave to reappear again on the other side of a narrow ridge. The cave entrance is visible from the track. The cave can be entered only for the first 12 ft. before becoming too narrow. Its only redeeming fartor feature is the presence of cave crickets some of which were collected. We followed the track north to a point a little past a larger stream which may be the one referred to by Denis King. We then returned to our little cave stream for lunch. After lunch we followed it downstream and soon found ourselves on a remarkably flat plain covered by dense tea tree. The creek grew gradually in size and finally flowed through a gap in a ridge several hundred feet high. It then swung north—east following the foot of the ridge. We followed it for a short distance but it showed no sign of going underground. We climbed uphill and found some shallow overhangs in the base of a quartzite cliff. No more caves were found and we had a long walk back to the car. Her we found a note from Bill Hodge and Bernard Howe who had arrived a little later and had attempted to catch up. However, they took the wrong turning at the Port Davey track. They realized their mistake before reaching Mount Anne and retraced their steps.

The vegetation in the area around Damper Inn is not nearly as bad as we had been led to believe but the caves could be better.



Ida Bay Area - 4 May, 1968.

Party:- Brian and Jeanette Collin, Kerin Hall.

Purpose:- To investigate the area near Entrance Cave.

The weather was dull with scudding showers typical of south-west-erly weather in the Ida Bay area. Mystery Creek was carrying about 30 cusecs of button grass water.



The probable fault as shown on the sketch appears to form the northern boundary of the Exit limestone. Water, maybe $\frac{1}{3}$ cusec disappeared in a small sinkhole at point "A". This could be the source of the water flowing at station 107. Further investigation is required in this area. The scrub is reasonably open on the limestone but the dolerite area supports a lush growth of cutting grass.
