### TRIP REPORT.

Flowery Gully - August 17,18.

Party: Albert(leader) and Therese Goede, Brian and Jeanette Collin, Kerry Holloway.

As Brian remarked this was a typical "N.S.W. type" caving trip. A camp in civilized surroundings, fine weather and numerous holes that don't go anywhere. We arrived at Flowery Gully at 10.30 a.m. and met Kerry at the gate to Artie Beams' property. We then proceeded to the paddock behind the kiln and set up camp amongst a horde of curious cows and numerous chooks. The area was still rather wet as a result of very heavy rains the week before. After an early lunch we proceeded to a blind valley behind the camp where a small stream flows underground into a cave. This was explored by Brian and Albert who found some 30 ft. of narrow, twisty, phreatic passages all becoming too narrow to follow. Next we tackled a twenty foot pothole a little further up the hill. This led into a small muddy chamber and several short passages. There was a large population of cave spiders. The next cave sounded exciting. It is reputed to be a 40 ft. drop into a large chamber but the entrance, which is in Beams Bros. No.1 Quarry, had been covered by a "very small landslide" during the recent rains. After two hours digging we had opened up a small hole dropping into a widening fissure below with a large rock sitting two feet above it. We dropped a ladder down but Brian soon found that the ladder went where a body could not go. With an effort it would be possible to get down but it was obvious that one could not possibly get back up again. Rather reluctantly we admitted defeat. Next Brian and Albert took turns at going into several small holes in Beams Bros. No.2 Quarry and discovered that getting in can be much easier than getting out. Again no luck. At the back of the quarry we discovered two small potholes for which the local quarrymen had already found a practical use. We left them unexplored. Brian went up the hill while Albert and Kerry headed for an isolated limestone outcrop on Robert Beams' property. A promising hole on the south side led into a small chamber with a short drop at the bottom. A rope was fetched and we soon found ourselves at the end of that cave. Back at the surface we were joined by Brian who who discovered another pot. He went down to a depth of 30 ft. and reported he could go no further. Coming back up proved far less easy than going down. A characteristic that many of the holes at Flowery Gully seem to share.

On Sunday we visited the B.L.P. quarry at the northern end of the limestone. Therese and Jeanette explored two tiny caves while Brian and Albert went down a promising 20 ft. pot. At the bottom is a medium sized chamber with a talus slope going down another 30 ft. Next we went to a hole near R.Beams' house that is reputed to give access to the Flowery Gully Cave of which the main entrance is blocked by quarrying. The hole looks promising but is block by a large rock to prevent sheep falling in so we left it. We then paid a quick visit to Vanishing Cave to see the formation. Following that Albert explored a small cave with 20 ft. of passage in Sulzbergers Quarry. Finally we paid a visit to a small cave in a quarry diagonally opposite Bob Beams' house and on the eastern side of the road. This was voted the prettiest cave seen on the trip. Brian negotiated a tight squeeze at the lowest point of the cave and found himself at the top of a 20 ft. deep fissure. He went down on a rope but there was no continuation. After lunch we had a leisurely trip home visiting the Batman Bridge on the way.

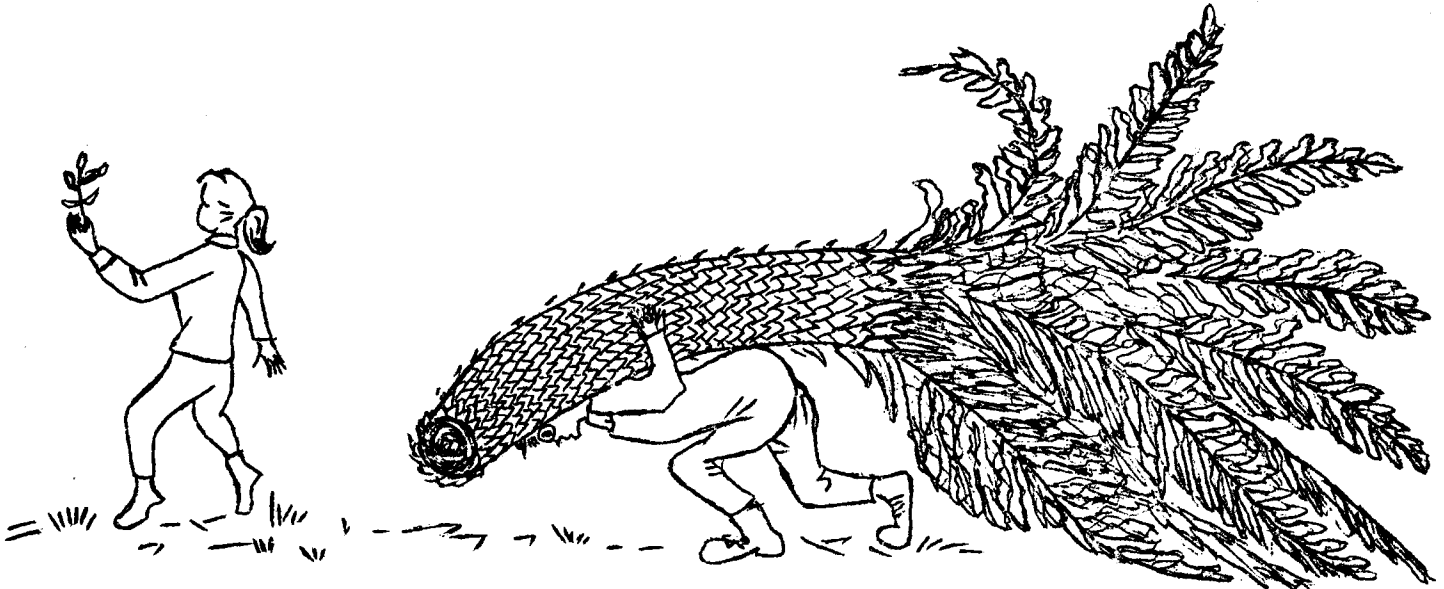
