

# OPERATION WOMGUANO.

Date of Exercise: 27th May, 1978.

GROUPS: Police Search and Rescue Squad.

Ambulance Board of Southern Tasmania.

Southern Caving Society.
Tasmanian Caverneering Club.

AIM:

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To give the respective organizations the opportunity to gain knowledge and experience with problems and techniques involved with stretcher usage underground.

## SITUATION:

Three persons have become immobilized by injuries received by a fall in "Beginners Luck".

# CONDUCT OF EXERCISE:

Three weighted dummies will be placed together in Beginners Luck'. Depending on attendance there will be three main parties each of which will be split into two (a) stretcher parties, (b) relief parties. The stretcher parties will locate victim and whilst the victim is in the initial stages of removal, relief parties will be on the move. Each party will take their victim out through their respective exit, and rotate in shifts of 60 - 90 minutes.

## DESCRIPTION OF CAVE:

'Beginners Luck' is situated alongside Settlement Road in the A.N.M. concession, west of Maydena. The cave will pose many problems in stretcher usage and involves 80% crawling. Duration of practical exercise will be approx. 4-6 hours. The system is centred in a small ridge, has six known entrances all of which are readily accessible. The furthest surface distance between two entrances would be approx. 60 - 80 metres. Length of passages would be in excess of 200 metres.

#### DEBRIEFING:

To be held as soon as possible after end of practical exercise.

## EQUIPMENT:

Personal, normal trogging attire suitable for crawling, 2 x 2.5 metre loop of tape or rope with padding and karabiner.

Club; Cavers, ladders.

Special; Police paraguard, drag mats, Neil Robbie stretcher.

WET WEATHER: No Change.

RENDEZVOUS: A.N.M. Barrier, Maydena.

### TIME OF START FROM BARRIER (A.N.M.) - 8-15 A.M.

## WHO'S WHO, IN CHARGE OF WHAT.

Bob Cockerill, Alex Terauds(S.C.S.), and Bill Nicholson(T.C.C.) will be in charge of each stretcher party underground. Their requirements will be followed through by Frank Brown - surface co-ordinator between the cavers and the police. Inspector Massie will be in charge of the S. and R. Squad on the surface.

The exercise is only on the Saturday but many people will be staying overnight at the Junee Homestead.

For Saturday, gearwise, those going underground - don't overdress,(e.g.) no waterprooofs or thick woolie jumpers. Wear snag-free clothing if you haven't overalls. DO take a few sweets or chocolate underground - preferably Barley sugar. MOST IMPORTANT take a 2.5 metre (8 foot) length of tape or rope with padding for shoulder and karabiner. Also bring along your own food. Trnsport for those staying over weekend to be arranged within the club.

# Quotes from "Trampled Wilderness" (pages 142-144).

".... the precipitous western face of this nountain(Mt. Field West) descends into the valley of the Florentine perpendicularly for over one thousand feet. Messrs. Atkins and Timbs ascended this mountain from the Florentine Valley. At about four hundred feet above the Humboldt Divide they discovered an enormous cave in the Ordovician limestone. This cave is the size of a large building, and a river as large as the Junee pours into it . . . . The cave is a stupendous natural feature which, though without the attractions of stalactites, will inevitably draw the attention of tourists once a track is established." (Growling Swallet ?).

"Other features recorded by Twelvetrees make this report of special interest. He describes Frodshams Cave in the Florentine Valley:
... east of the Florentine River. It is a small natural excavation in limestone near Frodshams Track, about ten feet wide at the entrance and four feet high, sloping down for twenty feet at a low angle into the water. The roof shows the rather thinly bedded limestone striking about N 10°E, and dipping north-westerly."

He also gives a fairly full description of the Junee Cave, and it

is noted that, even in those days,

".... inside a few stalactites still depend, but the larger ones have been removed by visitors and others have been defaced."
