SLAUGHTER HOUSE POT JF X 41?

3rd July, 1982

Another T.C.C. epic in which the level of stuffing around rose yet again to level III.

The last time most of us saw the inside of Slaughter House was one dark wet night in September 1980. The plan for the return trip was to exercise some evil spirits, survey to the bottom, and on into Growling Swallet through the break-through we hoped to make.

The abnormally large number of experienced cavers spent about an hour looking in the wrong place before finding the large doline which marks the entry crawl. A...maze...ing! Some of our number had been right past the doline 2 or 3 times in the past month. The confusion caused some severe attacks of apathy, and some attacks of severe apathy.

Diana and Trevor got things underway by back tracking to Pendant Pot to complete the surface survey before entering the cave. G.F. R.H. A.B. and C.D. geared up and wormed their way through the squeezes to the top of the 90' pitch. Andrew belayed the other 3 down, then waited for the survey party to catch up.

The rigging party pushed on and down the 60' pitch to the bottom of the cave.

It was here that the spirits tried to have their (final?) say. A 100kg boulder leapt at Geoff, but he leapt the other way - quite a nimble chap is Geoff. Careful exploration revealed only muddy boulder chokes, a dry sandy sump, and a tiny stream. No high level development was apparent in the chamber.

As time was short the survey was not completed, and we all headed back up. On the return to the surface Trev. noticed a deep shaft opening some way down the 90' pitch. Time did not permit inspection. Slaughter House is not dead yet!

The numbers of the party who did not feel like getting deeply involved looked about on the surface, and found one small hole, and also lots of small wood for George's trailer.

OFFICIAL NAMING OF CAVES IN THE GORDON-FRANKLIN RIVERS AREA

In recent years a number of caves in this area have been unofficially named after State and Federal politicians in order to attract attention to the fight to preserve South-Western Tasmania in its natural state.

Since such names are not acceptable as official names the Nomence Board of Tasmania has for some time been considering the problem of

assigning alternative names. In view of the archaeological significance of some of the caves it was felt that aboriginal names would be most appropriate and advice was sought from the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre and N.J.B. Plounley, an expert in Aboriginal names.

A decision has now been made and an "Intention to Assign Place Names" was published as List No. 276 in the Tasmanian Government gazette of Wednesday, 16 June, 1982, page 1914. The following names are listed.

<u>Kutikina Cave</u> (<u>not</u> Fraser Cave) - the word Kutikina is used at the present time by the aboriginal community in Tasmania and means "Spirit".

Clinnelare Cave (not Whitlam Cave) - the word 'Clinnelare' means waterfall'. An appropriate name for a cave that has three waterfalls in it.

Payaleena Cave (not Hayden Cave) - the word 'Payaleena' means 'glow worm'. Glow worms are present in this cave.

Pengana Cave (not Bingham Cave) - the word 'Pengana' means 'slit'or 'earth' and refers to the slit banks formed in this cave.

Proina Cave (not Lowe Cave) - 'Proina' means 'large' and refers to the fact that this is the largest cave formed in the area.

Rotuli Cave (not Neilson Cave) - 'Rotuli' means 'long' as it is the longest cave known in the region with over half a kilometre of passage.

Apart from the first name in the list the other five names are taken from Plounley's "A word list of the Tasmanian Aboriginal Languages".

This cave apparently was once joined to King Solomons but due to an extensive rock fall a through route is no longer possible. The cave turned out

to be very boring, consisting mainly of a single chamber with rat holes heading off everywhere. After a short time in the cave we exited and drove down to the Mersey for lunch in the sun, the weather was excellent.

Having achieved very little in the morning Pete Watts and myself decided that Pyrimid Cave would be a good laugh "joke". After finally locating the entrance, thru very thick regrowth away we went. Fun, mud, water and narrowness made for a good laugh and a slide around before we emerged in time to drive back and have a wash in the Marakoopa stream.

TASSY POT

June 19th

Party: Chris Davies, Jeanine Davies and Andrew Briggs.

The purpose of this trip was to examine several holes at the back of the big 220' ft pitch. These holes are shown on a rough survey drawn for the Spiel several years ago. They all had question marks below them, so they looked interesting.

We arrived at the gate about nine am after breakfast in the Maydena shop. A quick trip around to the cave saw us rigging and doing the usual mental activities prior to a caving trip. As this was my 2nd trip to the cave I was to rig and Chris to protect. As usual I rigged from the road side to make the 1st pitch a 140ft free hanger using only 1 protector. This would have to be one of my favorite entrance pitches.


Rigging off the 2nd pitch quickly followed and we continued on down. As usual care was needed at the lip of this pitch because of the pile of logs that perches there. This is another nice 90ft pitch, dry of course! A further 60ft abseil saw us down the awkward chimney and still heading down to Goodbye Chamber which is the top of the big pitch.

Now for the big "let-down". A quick butcher's at the unknown holes revealled shallow, small and chocked holes leading no-where. The deepest of these was about 40ft, and kept going, however, its diminishing size meant that it was impossible to continue.

A leisurely exit was made and we all gathered on the surface at about 3.00pm after the normal scare tactics by Jeanine, who tried to put Chris and myself off caving by throwing "large logs" down the 90ft pitch. It was an excellent trip and a good warm up for more active caving in the future.

SLAUGHTER HOUSE POT (More Disappointment!)

Slaughter House Pot has been the focus of attention for a while now with the possibility of a break through into Growling Swallet, As already mentioned, the large terminating chamber was a let



down although very promising on first inspection. The shaft mentioned in the previous trip report was eventually descended by Chris Davies, Andrew Briggs and our newly appointed apprentice Andrew Cooper. Only Andrew Cooper descended the continueing constricted rift into what he saw as a large passage.

The following trip saw the same party plus Trevor Wailes, looking for the big break through by following the "Large Passage" on a simple walk through into Growling Swallet. However, after following Andrew Cooper down the rift with help from a hand line and viewing the "Passage" myself I considered it wise to wait for Chris to see what he had to say as he was the only one of us to see the already explored large terminal chamber.

Unfortunatly my suspicions were proven and with great dismay Chris confirmed Andrews "Large Passage" was infact the terminal chamber.

However, this huge chamber did have a small stream which is suspected comes from the adjacent Pendant Pot, and sinks between large boulders and gravel. This is obviously not the original sink as broken sections of stream passage occur beyond the limit of the water sink. Also at the furthest, which is also the lowest point in the system, a possible continuation is visible between more large size open talus. (A certain amount of selfconfidence and strong will would be useful) The remainder of this terminal

chamber may be worth scrutinising as the entry point of the trickle of water was not fully ascertained. If this trickle is proven to be from Pendant Pot and by water tracing, key it in with not only Slaughter House but a suspected rising in Growling itself, then our knowledge of this area surface drainage would be greatly enhanced and prove both the Growling and the surface surveys have a high degree of accuracy.

I still feel there is a positive link possible but in the three trips stated in this newsletter it hasn't been found, patience is running out and the concrete slurry is running in. (through one of the many entrance series crawls) Maybe it needs rethinking and a little more effort.
