Introduction

The **Mine Planning** module emphasises that the success or failure of a mine and its associated environmental activities can be seriously affected by the decisions taken during the planning stage of the project.

This module demonstrates how mine planning, at all stages of a mine's development can contribute to environmentally sound mining practices. It also outlines a range of relevant environmental issues that should be considered at the planning stage.


Since each mine site presents a range of different environmental issues, it will be necessary to add information relevant to your location, climate, social structure, regulatory regime or other relevant factors.

This module is based on material presented in the accompanying BPEM in Mining booklet. Trainers using this kit are encouraged to adapt the ideas in the slides and notes to their own national environmental, social and industrial circumstances by seeking similar information and case studies with a local flavour. Site visits, 35 mm slides, or simple videos may be used to add local content to the presentation.

The mining industry is going through a period of rapid change. The issues and the procedures to address these issues are in constant evolution, and the material presented here will need to be frequently updated.

Before beginning the module the trainer should be thoroughly familiar with the accompanying BPEM booklet *Mine*Planning for Environment Protection. This trainers' guide is designed to highlight key points and issues and does not cover all of the material and case studies presented in the booklet.

Try to emphasise participatory learning through group work. The slides provided here are for guidance a1nd to stimulate discussion. Many of the issues flagged may be "new" to participants, and considerable deliberation may be required.
