COLLINGRIDGE (de Tourcey), Arthur (1853-1907): Studied in Paris and worked with Vierge, then came to Sydney in 1877. He and his brother George were the first to paint in the Hawkesbury area, pioneered plein air painting in Australia and founded the (now Royal) Art Society of New South Wales in 1880. Arthur worked as a painter, engraver, illustrator and teacher, the latter in the Lithgow-Bathurst area. He won a number of awards and produced many important works. It is very likely that he drew or painted more at Jenolan than is listed here, but the nature and location of his other Jenolan works is not known.

COLLINGRIDGE (de Tourcey), George (1847-1931): Painter, Engraver draughtsman and writer, with wide European experience as an artist (with Corot, Harpignies and Vierge) and also as a soldier of some distinction. Followed his brother (above) to Sydney in 1879. His 1880 poster of the Underground River at Jenolan is based upon a drawing by his brother, and is a most striking work. Somewhat surprisingly, it appears to be the first published image of the Jenolan caves. He was extremely prolific in Sydney and worked for both the Illustrated Sydney News and the Picturesque Atlas. He won various awards for the quality of his wood-engraving and was also a prolific painter, producing at least 1,000 paintings. Similarly, he wrote many books, of which the most important was his 1895 The Discovery of Australia, was the first to argue for the Portuguese discovery of the continent. See entry by O.H.K.
