Stop Urban Sprawl

International research shows that urban sprawl destroys the natural environment, leads to increased travelling time, increased fuel consumption, decreased public transport use and increased social problems. New land releases should be very strictly limited, smaller blocks should be encouraged, and road reserves in neighbourhood areas should be reduced. Local governments should be strongly encouraged to increase density.

Increase traditional Energy Prices By increasing energy prices citizens will reduce their energy consumption, which will reduce greenhouse emissions

Increase Fuel Prices

Higher fuel prices will discourage private car usage and increase public transport usage.

Provide more incentives for truly sustainable energy Provide more financial incentives for truly sustainable energy such as wind and solar energy.
